Daybreak Rotary Meeting - July 23, 2020

Call to Order - President Corey Hamilton

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

PROGRAM:

Martha Smith introduced today's speaker.

Dr. Jan Ramer is Vice President at The Wilds, a conservation safari park in our backyard! Jan earned her B.S. in Biology from Purdue



University and used that education in a 12-vear career as an animal keeper at the Indianapolis Zoo and the Brookfield Zoo in Chicago. While she loved her work as an animal keeper, Jan was drawn to veterinary medicine, so she made a mid-life career change, earning her DVM from the University of Wisconsin in 1995. Jan was a veterinarian at the Indianapolis Zoo for 14 years. She then found her passion in conservation medicine as Regional Manager for the Gorilla Doctors, where she led a team of African veterinarians in Rwanda, Uganda and the Democratic Republic of Congo for 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Jan returned to the United States to start her work at The Wilds in January 2015 as the Director of Conservation Medicine. In June 2017 Jan accepted the position of Vice President for The Wilds and feels it an honor to serve the hard-working and dedicated Wilds team. Jan loves spending time with her family, especially her 3 grandsons!

Jan thanked the group for asking her to share her enthusiasm about what really happens at The Wilds. The Wilds inhabits some 10,000 acres of land in Muskingum County once used for strip mining. In 1991, The Wilds concept of conservation started as a publicprivate partnership of the Ohio Departments of Natural Resources & Development, Ohio Zoos, and the private sector. It is now a subsidiary of the Columbus Zoo.

As part of its conservation efforts, The Wilds works to revive endangered species of animals from many countries. A few examples:

a. The Wilds has successfully brought about the reproduction of 4th and 5th generations of the Southern White Rhino.

b. Its success in reintroducing the endangered Przewalski's Wild Horses has been enhanced with a tracking device being used to follow these beautiful horses as they return to their original environment.

c. Three Scimitar-Horned Oryx born here have been sent to the Republic of Chad for their reintroduction to the wilds.

d. In keeping with The Wilds' conservation efforts, the breeding of Cheetahs has been halted for now. They are full up and have been sharing cheetahs with other zoos.

e. The African Painted Dogs have thrived. Visitors are impressed with their strong social structure.

f. The program to breed, raise and reintroduce

the Eastern Hellbender (a giant salamander) to Ohio and surrounding states has been productive. Many of the returning Hellbenders sport tiny tracking devices to monitor their movement in streams and rivers.

In addition to promoting conservation and reintroduction of endangered species, The Wilds has an estimated \$15,000,000 impact on the local economy due to the number of visitors to the area and increased tax revenue.

A Power Grant is being submitted to bring water to The Wilds, since there is no potable water available on the premises.

Fun and education abounds at The Wilds, including camping opportunities, overnight accommodations at The Outpost, Lodge, Nomad Ridge, and cabins by Straker Lake, along with the famous Zipline, horseback riding, fishing, hiking and biking. Sunset Safaris and Bus Tours are up and running.

The Wilds is operating at about 50% right now and is complying with all local, state and federal regulations to help slow the spread of COVID-19, asking visitors to do their part when they visit. Information on all the opportunities available can be found on its website, the wilds. org.

President Corey thanked Dr. Ramer for sharing her time and enthusiasm with us and promised to put her gift of a cell phone sanitizer in the mail.
