

Crowder peas, blackeyed peas, southern peas...where else in the world can you attend an International Cowpea Festival? NOWHERE, except Charleston, Tennessee!

On August 17, 2021, the Rotary Club of Cleveland were enamored with details about this festival and numerous other responsibilities of Melissa Woody, the Vice-President for Tourism Development for the Cleveland/Bradley Chamber of Commerce.

Celebrating 22 years with the Chamber, Woody was originally hired by Rotarian Jerry Bohannon and now serves with Rotarian Mike Griffin, the President and CEO of the Chamber. Cleveland is her hometown and she is committed to investing in the community and making it a wonderful experience for visitors.

As Woody reviews the recently released 2020 Economic Impact Study, the numbers are much different that they were for the 2019 report. In March 2020, there was a 45% decrease in the lodging tax, while April 2020 experienced a 51% decrease. Woody's budget was drastically affected as it is comprised of 19.6% of the lodging tax. In November 2020, the percentages started to go back up.

Currently, Cleveland/Bradley County is 26.8% below 2019's numbers, but we have outperformed the state average as well as Hamilton County. In May 2021, we were 35% below our healthy year comparison of 2019. In June, that number is at 25%.

As the numbers trend up, Woody continues her focus of promoting Adventure, Heritage and Charm. In addition to promoting annual and unique events in the area, she also is involved in highlighting unique attributes of our area. The Red Back Hymnal Exhibit is a permanent exhibit at the Museum Center at Five Points. This exhibit is part of the religious heritage of Cleveland as printing of the hymnals began here in 1951, seventy years ago. This exhibit put Cleveland on the Tennessee Music Pathways Trail.

August 24th Program: Art is Here with Connie Gatlin and Dwight Richardson

When it comes to the arts in Bradley County, one name comes to mind Connie Gatlin. Gatlin has had a lifetime of achievement in the area of the arts, always working tirelessly to provide programs, training, education and support to her community. She began her career of inspiring and educating future thespians and show choir singers at Bradley Central High School and continued for 20 years. She established a theatre program with 2-3 full length performances yearly with high school performances running the gamut from South Pacific to Little Shop of Horrors, from Grease to Steel Magnolias.

She also founded the education program at the Museum Center at 5ive Points and led a team of fellow artists to create a local council the Allied Arts of Cleveland, celebrating its 25 th Silver Anniversary this year. Through her work on the Allied Arts Council, Gatlin co-founded a fund-raising project called Chair-rees Jubilee which has now raised in excess of \$450,000 for local teacher-written grants for the children of Cleveland and Bradley County in classroom arts-based experiences.

When a long standing dance studio was about to shut the doors, Gatlin purchased the studio in 2005 and continued its tradition of quality and classical dance instruction for children in our community. The Cleveland City Ballet is in its 80 th year of serving our community because of her commitment.

But, of all of her accomplishments in her life, there has never been a prouder moment than when she watcher her daughter, Abigail, dance as Cleveland s first and only Radio City Rockette in New York City!




