

Rotary Club of Cleveland was privileged to have Dennis Tumlin, the Key Customer Officer for the Tennessee Department of Tourism Development, as the speaker for the July 20, 2021 meeting. Tumlin grew up in Rhea County. He has a degree in Business and worked for Coca-Cola for 16 years. In 2010, he joined NCCOG.

Tumlin is not a new name for the area as he was instrumental in Dayton, Tennessee becoming the Bass Fishing Capitol of the South and for bringing Nokian Tire to the area. When Governor Lee was elected, Tumlin was brought on board to aid in the 2nd largest industry, behind agriculture, in the state of Tennessee - TOURISM.

In 2019, there was \$23 billion in travel expenditures in Tennessee with 10 years of consecutive growth. There were 126 million person stays and \$1.9 billion in local and state tax revenue. Then.....COVID hit.

There was a 25% drop in consumer spending until the stimulus checks hit. The TN Pledge was developed as well as the TN Strong Mask Movement. In reviewing all of the drops, there was one county that had a 9.9% growth in 2020 - Sevier County. Visitors were looking for ways to be outside. A 35% increase in fishing licenses was reported with an 89% retention rate of those licenses to date. RV and boat sales are up as well.

During 2020, there were 126,000 jobs lost in Leisure and Hospitality. As a way to boost tourism, the 2020 Recovery included the TN Tourism CARES marketing program. \$25 million was poured into tourism and marketing.

Residents are driving up to 500 miles on road trips. Arrivals to Tennessee from June-Dec 2020 increased from surrounding states. Tennessee became 1 of 7 states to have positive change in consumer spending.

Tennessee is looking forward to restoring and reaching \$81 million in 2021-2022.

Bradley County has received \$200,000 in marketing grants since 2017. The county has \$152 million in direct visitor spending which equates to \$319 less for each resident to pay in taxes due to leisure travel. Bradley is currently #15 of the 95 counties in Tennessee.

This love affair was exemplified as he played three years at Quarterback under his father Randy in high school, and kept official stats year-in and year-out for his mother Janet's college basketball team. Following high school, Ty transitioned into an academic career at the University of Alabama that was void of athletic competition (other than spending Saturday's in attendance at Bryant-Denny Stadium). 
