### Siskin is Tennessee's Largest Rehabilitation Center

At our November 17th meeting, we had the CEO & President of Siskin Hospital for Physical Rehabilitation, Matt Gibson, join us via zoom to share some engaging information about the organization spresence and significance in the local area.

Siskin so Physical Rehabilitation Hospital first opened their doors to the public in February 1990. Since then, the hospital has grown to be Tennessees largest acute rehabilitation center and is one of the largest in the nation to boot. The primary goal of physical rehabilitation is to enhance and restore the functional ability and quality of life to people with physical impairments or disabilities.

Matt highlighted that one of the things that makes Siskin such a standout organization is their aptitude for providing seamless care through all levels of recovery. The primary branches of Siskin include their inpatient rehabilitation, subacute rehabilitation, and outpatient therapy.

Of their inpatient rehabilitation services, there is a wide range of specialized departments and therapies to most adequately serve the patients individualized needs. Some of these include:

- The area s only dedicated Brain Injury Program
- The area so only specialized Stroke Program
- Amputee Program
- Major Multiple Trauma
- General Rehabilitation

The subacute program at Siskin Hospital specializes in short-term rehabilitation at the skilled and subacute level. It remains less intensive than traditional comprehensive inpatient treatment. The program is designed for those who have conditions related to orthopedic surgery (including joint replacement), general deconditioning, mild stroke and other neurological disorders, and elective spine surgeries.

Siskin has proudly established four outpatient therapy clinics in our local area: the main campus in


Marsha dedicates her public service to promoting opportunities for women and making America a more prosperous place to live.

The event was announced at the October 13 meeting by visiting CHS Interact Club Members.






# Program Started by Bradley Central HS Interact Club Leads to \$20,000 for Meigs Families



# Results from last week's poll: Have you lived anywhere less than a year as an adult?



#### Final Results from Dunkin Purple Pinkie Day for Polio **Eradication**

The final results from our third annual Purple Pinkie Day are in, and once again the generosity and support from Rotarians, friends, and families has surpassed all expectations.



Thegoal for this World Polio Day event was to raise \$1 million in a single day for polio eradication, but when the final results were tallied we had raised nearly \$1.3 million • \$1,299,388.86 to be exact.

District Governor Ron Appuhn challenged everyone in District 6780 to participate and set a goal of one box per member, or about 3,000 boxes total. The response was excellent. We had 49 participating clubs and 450 online orders totaling 2,499 boxes. Over \$25,000 in additional cash donations along with matches brought the grand total from our district to \$676,179.

Joining us for the first time this year were Alabama districts 6860 and 6880, and they did great! District 6860 raised \$106,303.86 and District 6880 raised \$216,540. Special congratulations go to the Rotary Club of Dothan, Alabama, who led all other clubs with 327 boxes ordered.

Second year participants Districts 6760 and 6800 showed significant year over year improvements with District 6760 in West Tennessee contributing \$163,926 and District 6800 in north Mississippi \$136,440.

Fund raising is obviously critical to the success of PolioPlus, but this project creates other very

significant benefits that should be recognized. In spite of the many challenges faced this year, several thousand Rotarians were actively engaged in the project, and engagement is key to membership

We also increased awareness of both Rotary and polio with thousands of people through the many connections that were made.

Thanks to all of those who supported this effort, and for the leadership of District 6780 and Bluemont Group, LLC, for providing us with this amazing partnership opportunity.

Plans are already underway for an even bigger year next year.
