We'll have a superb program on Wednesday that will be presented by **Dr. Charles A. Fowler,** president of Carson



Newman University. Dr. Fowler just completed his first year as president and will join us virtually on Zoom.

He will be talking about his transition into the role of president, the impact

of the pandemic and plans for the coming school year as for the classroom/virtual learning experience and athletics.

Fowler served as senior pastor of Germantown Baptist Church in West Tennessee since 2010 before coming to CN. He is a native of Corinth, MS. Before becoming pastor in Germantown, he served as senior vice president of University Relations at Union University in Jackson, TN. During his 15 years at Union he served as the school's chief development officer and helped raise secure approximately \$150 million in gifts and grants in support of the school's mission.

Along with holding the rank of full professor at Union, Fowler also taught at Mississippi State University and The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. His other leadership roles have included serving on the board of trustees for the International Mission Board, Baptist Memorial Healthcare, Union University, Blue Mountain College and the Leadership Council for the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission.

The Life & Success Story of Derrick Furlow


Derrick Furlow learned three things about life from former University of Tennessee Coach Phil Fulmer that he's never forgotten.

The Latest News About Polio

Amidst this attention on COVID-19, let's not forget about Rotary International's focus on the **eradication of polio**. There's still a

long way to go to banish this crippling disease.



Here is a quick summary of cases as of July 21 from the Global Polio Eradication Initiative:

- Afghanistan: five WPV1 cases and five WPV1 positive environmental samples
- Pakistan: two WPV1 cases and eight WPV1 positive environmental samples
- Cameroon: one cVDPV2 positive environmental sample
- Chad: three cVDPV2 cases
