SMSD is a 501(c)(3) non-profit with a mission to "Enhance the Physical and Psychological Quality of Life for Veterans with Disabilities by Providing Custom-Trained Mobility Assistance Service Dogs." This is a great organization to help as they improve the lives of our wounded vets.

In 2016 our club honored Mike with our prestigious Service Above Self award for his contributions to our community and veterans.

With Mike was Lori Birt, a Board Member at Large and the leader of the SMSD Community Events Team, and as one who handles the dogs, Laurie works to promote SMSD in many ways. With her was Hooligan, a 7-year-old demonstration dog who lives with her. She gave us a great demonstration of his skillset. He picks up things that drop, including a thin credit card. He is trained to do 40 different tasks, she said.

They try to match 6 to 8 dogs a year with a veteran and can do up to 12 with enough money. It costs between \$22,000 and \$25,000 to train a dog at their Lenoir City facility. They cover an area of 350 miles and every veteran who receives a dog must be vetted and has to have suffered a physical injury or brain injury to receive a dog.

The dogs used are large breed dogs and are usually large in stature. If a veteran is in a wheelchair they may use a dog that is a little smaller, Birt said. "The dogs are usually Golden Retrievers or labs or a combo of both. These breeds are bred for retrieving so they work out well."

SMSD has only five paid employees and all others are volunteers. In 10 years they have only had to take back two dogs. Both times the veteran just couldn't take care of them properly.
