

Veteran, Minister Dr. Pat Polis Is Our Veterans Day Speaker

Thursday is a day when our country pays tribute to its veterans on **Veterans Day.** And we have a number of the veterans in the Rotary

Club of Farragut from the various military branches. O u r s p e a k e r o n Wednesday will be **Rev. Dr. Pat Polis,** who served eight years as an officer in the U.S. Army, including two tours in Vietnam as a company commander, receiving the Army Commendation Medal and Bronze Star.



He is the current president of the Vietnam Veterans of America, Chapter 1078, here in Knoxville.

He has a Bachelors degree in Business, and a Masters and Doctorate degrees in Divinity. He has served as president of the boards of Midway Rehabilitation Center and Wesley House Community Center, the supervisory committee of Holston Methodist Credit Union, and is a chaplain with the Knoxville Police Department.

He was inducted into the Army Officer Candidate School Hall of Fame at Fort Benning Georgia in 2019. He is a certified church consultant, certified in Church Revitalization, a John Maxwell Team member and author of the online course "Reclaiming the Church.

Sleep In Heavenly Peace Project A Hugh Success & Big Turnout!

Yesterday's Sleep In Heavenly Peace (SIHP) bed-building project at Fox Den Country Club attracted approximately 30 members of our club and about 10 students from the Hardin Valley Interact Club. President David Retiring in January 2020, Leaving Park West After 32 Years

On Friday Jan. 28, 2020, President David Bluford will join the ranks of the retired when he steps down after 32 years as Chaplain and Guest Services Director at Park West Medical Center.

His father was in the Air Force and when he retired the family moved to Lenoir City. "My Mother was from Vonore and Dad from Greenback, so East Tennessee seemed the right place to be. During high school, through the relationships of friends, I began attending a church where events unfolded leading me into the ministry," David said.

He came to Park West in January 1990 after 10 years as the chaplain at Baptist Memorial Hospital in Memphis. He joined our club in 2003 and until his presidency, he's been a fixture at our Infamous Back Roundtable. And no doubt he'll be returning to his seat there come July 2020.

He earned his Ph.D. in ministry and his master's degree in divinity from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary and his undergraduate degree from Carson-Newman University.

Dec. 17: East Tennessee Children's Hospital Toy Drive/Angel Tree For 20 years, he was a TSSAA high school football official in Knoxville. Bluford joined Farragut Rotary in 2000 and has held various positions within the club in his 21 years.

"Chaplaincy for me is Service Above Self (sound familiar?) played out every day, in ways often unseen but always involving being present with another in times of need – and these are difficult times as well as times of joy," he says. "After officiating probably as many weddings as funerals, I am reminded of the journey of life and how important it is to treasure every day." And after retirement, what will Rev. Bluford do? "My plans are yet to be decided. As I have trusted in God all along my path, such remains my course of action. I may have more time to ride my motorcycle; maybe do some visiting of historical sites not yet seen; but first is to complete my service with the Rotary Club of Farragut for which the members have entrusted to me."

Josh Hornberger and wife Chelsea are new parents. Their daughter is Willow "Will" Josephine Hornberger, born at Park West Medical Center on Sept. 27 but her due date was Oct. 21. She weighed 5 lbs, 5oz and was 18 inches at birth. Josh says she's now up to 8.5 lbs. "We are doing really well and falling into a solid routine with her. We have been showered with love from friends and family members and a great support system around us," he says.

Teri Jo Fox's mother, **Connie Jo**, is still at Tennova West. She says one of her brothers came in from Florida and is working to make her house handicap accessible. Her other two brothers installed a ramp at her house. She is still looking for a rehabilitation facility for her. "She got hurt during her PT on Friday and she's worried about her dogs, her plants, her house and her leg and being able to walk again," Teri Jo said. "She's in a lot of pain."

Ralph Henry's daughter **Katie Sturgil** was taken to the ER at Tennova West on Friday, Oct. 1, with a headache and chilling. Here's the report: She was tested for Covid and influenzas and the tests were negative. But she was moved to ICU with pneumonia and sepsis. Two days later she was diagnosed with the bacteria legionella and was flown to St. Thomas West Hospital in Nashville and put on a ventilator.. She remained on the ventilator until Friday and made great progress. On Friday the lung doctor released her, and she taken off the ventilator Friday evening. She was released on Monday and came home. She is doing physical therapy and doing great. She hopes to go back to work in a couple of weeks. She works at Tennova in the heart lab doing stress tests on heart patients.

Bettye Sisco says she doing pretty well. She returns to Duke Medical Center on Tuesday Nov. 16. She also sees her oncologist on Thursday.

Jeanne Faber is dealing with the pain from scoliosis of the lower spine. She had cortisone injections for it earlier this week, and says it is really affecting her sleep and causing neck and leg pains as well. "The doctor said it may take two to three weeks for the shot to work, so I'm just hoping this starts to ease up at some point," she said.

Here's a good update from **PP Peggy Wilson**: "I am doing pretty good. I will be Sling Girl until December when PT will start. Almost no pain unless I try to do things I am not supposed to do."

Doc Pratt says "I still have a cough but things are better and I feel fine. The pulmonologist wants another scan and see him again in 6 months."
