

Last week we tried to explain Rotary's Rule of 85. We got it partially right. Several years ago Rotary amended the rule and deleted any reference to the specific age of the Rotarian. Our **Patty Daughtrey**, the District 6780 Secretary, has set us straight on the rule.

Patty said: "Please review the standard Rotary Club Constitution — Article 10, Section 5. There is no age requirement, (65) to request the Rule of 85."

Patty sent along the rule: "The sum of the member's age and years of membership in one or more clubs is 85 years or more, the member has been a Rotarian for at least 20 years, the member has notified the club secretary in writing of a desire to be excused from attendance, and the board has approved."
