

District Governor August Message



Happy August Fellow Rotarians of District 6780. Hope your summer has gone well. Now your children are starting school and things are getting busy at the house.

August is Membership and New Club Development Month. If you watched my July video, read the July Newsletter or read my message on the home page of the District website, you know that bothRotary's

and the District's top goal is to GROW ROTARY! Last year the clubs' growth goal collectively was a net +150 members. The District ended the year a net minus 8 members. The year before we were net plus 12 for the year. Only one of fourteen Districts in our Zone 30 gained members last year. On July 1st, we had 3138 members in our

District. Several years ago we were at 3500 members. We have a lot of work to do and we need to increase our membership. I have set a District goal to Grow Rotary by a net +128 members which is a net +2 per club. I

have also set a BHAG (Big Highly Ambitious Goal) of a net +192 members which is a net +3 per club. The goal of net +128 is achievable if we keep the goal in front of us all year. I wear my Rotary pin daily because I am talking to Rotarians every day, but they just don't know it because I haven't asked them.

And, once you bring a member into your club, we must educate them on Rotary and get them engaged on a committee or some other role in the club. New Rotarians need to learn about Rotary and its impact on the local and the global community. **An educated and engaged Rotarian will be more apt to remain a Rotarian.** Have a good orientation program, utilize the Red Badge process, get them involved. People leave clubs for legitimate reasons like job change, moving to another location, and of course, some members pass like our club's president-elect did in April. Others leave because they don't feel they really belong to the club; they don't receive a good orientation, or they don't get involved or thought Rotary was something different than what they were led to believe and as a result they leave without any hesitation. Think about how you process a new prospect into your club. Do some brainstorming at your board meeting or better yet, a Club Assembly.

I want to start a new club in Harrogate TN, the home of Lincoln Memorial University in Clairborne County. I'm working with LMU officials and with contacts I've been given to hold a Rotary Awareness meeting. If a club can be successfully started, the next step would be to start a Rotaract Club at LMU. If you have any contacts with business owners and other community leaders in Harrogate, please let me know so we can accelerate the process. A new satellite evening club has been started in Chattanooga and Morristown is looking to do so as well. If you know prospects in these three localities, please contact me, the Assistant Governor in those areas, or Mike Ayalon, our District Membership Chair. Thanks.

As of August 1st, I have made my official visit to 23 clubs. This is the best part of being District Governor. Meeting with the leadership team at board meetings and meeting the club members at their regular meeting is gratifying and humbling. The clubs are making such a difference in the local communities as well as in the communities around the world. I appreciate the warm receptions my wife and I have received when we do our visit. And the Rotarians show up even though they know the District Governor is their program for the meeting! LOL. I have asked club presidents to provide me with a list of their service projects and fundraisers so a database can be created. This will help

clubs to see what other clubs are doing, generate ideas for their club, and to help to relieve service project or fundraiser fatigue. It also provides an opportunity to partner with other clubs on projects that they may want to do but can't do on their own. This database should be available by mid-September or before.

I look forward to this month's visits. I'm gaining a new perspective on how the different clubs operate and are willing to do so much to make this a better world. Service Above Self is in action at a high level in our District.

Shekhar Mehta of India Selected to be 2021-22 Rotary International President



The Nominating Committee forPresident of Rotary International for 2021-22 has selected Shekhar Mehta, of the Rotary Club of Calcutta-Mahanagar, West Bengal, India. He will be declared the president-nominee on 1 October if no challenging candidates have been suggested.

Mehta, an accountant, is chair of the Skyline Group, a real estate development company he founded. He is also a director of Operation Eyesight Universal (India), a Canada-based organization.

A Rotary member since 1984, Mehta has served Rotary as director, member or chair of several committees, zone coordinator, training leader, member of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers, and district governor. He is also the chair of Rotary Foundation (India).

Mehta has received Rotary s Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation s Citation for Meritorious Service and Distinguished Service Awards.

The President-Nominee has been actively involved in disaster response and is a trustee of ShelterBox, UK. After the 2004 Indian Ocean tsunami, he helped build nearly 500 homes for families affected by the disaster.

Mehta pioneered a program that has performed more than 1,500 life-changing heart surgeries in South Asia. He is also the architect of the TEACH Program, which promotes literacy throughout India and has reached thousands of schools.

Mehta acknowledges that current membership trends are a challenge and says that membership development should be Rotary shighest priority. He believes that focusing on regional plans, successfully transitioning Rotaractors into Rotary clubs, and increasing diversity and female members could yield a five percent net growth in membership each year.

♦ A major brainstorming is needed to find effective solutions suited to different areas of the world, ♦ says Mehta. He adds that regional ethos and culture have to be taken into account to find localized solutions, as ♦ one size does not fit all. ♦ He believes Rotary can extend to new geographical areas and countries.

As a strong proponent of Rotary s strategic plan, Mehta says he will encourage clubs to use action plans and reinforce the core values of Rotary.

Mehta says Rotary needs to become more contemporary and adaptable by focusing on partnerships with governments and corporations, expanding partnerships with organizations that specialize in Rotary s areas of focus, and investing in technology.

He and his wife, Rashi, are Major Donors and members of the Bequest Society.

Club Visioning Provides Clubs a Clear Path to Future Success

District 6780 began offering clubs the Rotary Club Visioning experience in 2012. Club Visioning is a foundation element for clubs that brings members � both long-time and short-time � together to develop a continuity of leadership and consistency in programming. Through this interactive Visioning process cubs brainstorm ideas, condense those ideas, and come to consensus on future programs and activities, thus building solidarity and unanimity in purpose and action. The product of the session is a clear set of goals and objectives that become part of the club�s strategic plan.

A Club Visioning session is generally conducted in a separate meeting about three hours long with plenty of fellowship, fun and food. The process helps build stronger clubs that attract new members

and retain members. It also makes the role of each new President easier.

Since the District began offering Club Visioning, 32 clubs have taken advantage of the opportunity; six clubs have conducted Club Visioning for the second time. Evaluations of the events have been very positive from every club. However, half the clubs in the District have not taken advantage of this opportunity.

Polio Eradication Update



There have been 59 confirmed cases of Wild Polio thus far in 2019. That's up significantly from 33 cases in all of 2018. All of the polio cases this year occurred in just two countries: Pakistan and Afghanistan. The majority of the increase is coming from Pakistan where a major anti-vaccination campaign occurred last year. An intense reeducation plan has been launched there, and recent vaccination campaigns have been much more successful.

Our 10th annual "Pack the Park for Polio" baseball game with the Tennessee Smokies has been

Join with the Chattanooga Breakfast Club to Help the People of Haiti

The Chattanooga Breakfast Club has been installing latrines in the mountain villages of Haiti since the 2011 after the big earthquake and the following cholera epidemic. Typically, they install from 50 to 100 latrines in a mountain village, one per household depending upon how many partner clubs participate.



Anyclub can join in this international project and participate at any level it chooses funding one or more latrines at a cost of from \$500-\$5000; travel to Haiti to inspect the quality of latrine construction; help audit the expenditures which can be a bit difficult; or perhaps just fund a latrine or two and then help call other clubs or organizations for help.

The program works like this: the Chattanooga Breakfast Club works with an in-country organization called Children so Nutrition Program (CNP) of Haiti, a non-profit organization focused on improving the health of children in the region around Leogane, Haiti. Founded by Chattanooga physician Dr. Mitch Mutter, CNP manages the in-country details

using a trusted Haitian project manager.

For many years Dr. Mutter has worked to install latrines in villages in the mountains near Leogane which are very difficult to access. Chattanooga Breakfast Club engineers designed the original latrines and over the years have made many improvements in quality and acceptability of the villagers. After training the project manager on how to build the latrines, he trained some local craftsmen from the village on how to build the latrines. He and the craftsmen he trained from the last village, train craftsmen in the new village and the cycle goes on. As long as the Rotarians can provide funding, inspections, and support, they can install latrines in many, many more mountain villages.

The villagers dig their own latrine hole and transport the building materials up the mountain from a location accessible to vehicles. Chattanooga Rotarians usually spend a week in Haiti once or twice per year inspecting the latrines and making sure their money is spent wisely on the projects.

The Chattanooga Breakfast Club is looking for help with this project. If your club is looking for an international project, this is an easy way to participate. The help can be donations of either labor or dollars.

MCMinnville Noon and Five Other Clubs Partner to Provide Medical Equipment to Haiti

Haiti has suffered challenges in almost every part of life from weather, disease, poverty and hunger, and many Rotary Clubs have answered challenges in all of those areas. The McMinnville Rotary Noon Club has chosen Improvement of Health to Haitian with the purchase of much needed healthcare equipment and supplies with a 2019-2020 grant called **ServeHaiti Medical Equipment Container**.

Five other Rotary Clubs have joined the Multiple Club Rotary District Grant for 6780:

- Club #2 Rotary Club of Hartsville;
- Club #3 Rotary Club of Sevierville Sunrise;
- Club #4 Rotary Club of McMinnville Breakfast;
- Club #5 Rotary Club of Cookeville Sunset;
- Club #6 Rotary Club of Jamestown to complete this \$30,400 grant commitment.

The goal of the project is to improve the basic standard of care for the over 65,000 people in the area whose only access to healthcare is at ServeHaiti�s health center in Grand-Bois, Haiti. Some of the goals are:

- Container full of medical supplies will be shipped to Port au Prince;
- Container will be unloaded and transported by truck by ServeHaiti workers;
- The medical center will have 15 fully functional hospital beds that are safe for patients and caregivers;
- The medical center will receive an ultrasound imaging machine that will be used by the ServeHaiti physician to identify pre-term pregnancy complications, helping identify women who need to be transport Port au Prince prior to emergency situations;
- The medical center will receive other biomedical equipment such as X-ray and lab equipment to help identify viral and bacterial risks for better specificity of prescribing medicine.

The McMinnville Noon Club s first conversation with Angela Gilliam, Executive Director of ServeHaiti, started seriously discussing projects in summer of 2018. ServeHaiti had a major crisis in June 2018 when cholera was discovered in a location about five hours by donkey from the health clinic. Because ServeHaiti is the only healthcare provider for the residents of Grand-Bois, they coordinated the response since that first case. ServeHaiti fought valiantly all summer, and of the 316 patients they saw in the cholera tent, only six died.

ServeHaiti was grateful for the extra resources that they were able to raise to buy more medications, IV's, chlorine tablets and water filtration systems, but they have had one final blow to their budget that was urgent. During the height of the crisis, they pumped many thousands of gallons of water out of their clinic well to clean up their temporary cholera clinic, and they also sent trucks of clean water out to the epicenter of the infection to stave off any further spread. They were successful in their efforts to control the disease, but they damaged the clinic spump and well casing beyond repair.

Together with about 40 other area organizations distributing products, supplies and services to school age children, the Dayton Rotary Club handed out 400 bags

of hair shampoo, tooth brushes, tooth paste, and deodorant.

The club s next youth service event will be the distribution of Rotary 4-Way Test coloring books and dictionaries to 2nd and 3rd grade Rhea County students.
