So much has happened in just the last 30 days. Jennifer Jones was nominated to serve as the first female Rotary International President in 2022 💎 2023.

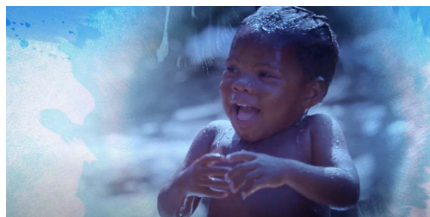

International Day of Peace Events

Is Monday, September 21 highlighted on your calendar?

As a reminder, Rotarians in District 6910 and across the globe will be commemorating the International Day of Peace, informally known as World Peace Day. First celebrated in 1981, the annual holiday, sanctioned by the United Nations, is now dedicated to peace education.

The theme of the day, Rotarians Stand for Peace and Unity, represents Rotary International's ongoing work to bring about positive peace, defined as the attitudes, institutions, and structures that, when strengthened, lead to a more peaceful society. Fostering an optimum environment for human potential to flourish drives many causes for which Rotarians are known worldwide, such as eradicating polio and providing access to clean water, health care, and education.

Along with causing financial hardships from job losses and declines in business revenue, this highly contagious coronavirus initially had everyone on lockdown. Even though most clubs in our district are meeting again to some degree with social distancing, a great number of members have continued to stay away. We encourage extra caution for those who have health risks. Some also have memberships through their employers that prohibit in-person gatherings.

On top of the virus, we are living in a period of civil unrest.

In the best of times, Rotarians are known for solving difficult problems. We♦re ♦people of action♦ who share a go-getting spirit and a wealth of resources that yield results. Instead of fixating on what♦s wrong, we assess our options and get busy.

The same success-minded components, guided by the 4-Way Test, should also apply to membership:



Looking out for one another

Individuals with big hearts for serving others are often the last ones to ask for help. We need to reach out to our fellow Rotarians as well as encourage one another to talk about our struggles and voice our concerns.

Using innovation♦technology and outside-the-box ideas♦to stay connected

Many clubs are hosting hybrid meetings with some attending in person and others connecting via Zoom. We must investigate different ways, times, and places to meet that would accommodate most♦if not all♦members. Grab ideas from other clubs. Moving past the pandemic, the same or similar configurations could help us retain and recruit members who need/desire greater flexibility.

Remaining relevant and nimble by embracing current areas of interest and concern

Does the typical speaker lineup or usual community outreach continue to fulfill the needs and desires of members and those served? In addition to assessing weekly programs and service projects based on their practicality, we need to scrutinize their intrinsic value.

Reevaluating who might be a prospective member

Individuals who were not ideal prospects in the past, perhaps because of a work commute or heavy travel, possibly now have time for Rotary because they♦ve changed jobs or operate from home. Also, major events prompt people to shift their priorities. Realizing that individuals♦ circumstances and perspectives change, we need to rethink who would be a good fit for Rotary♦and vice versa.

Use social and local media to share Rotary♦s positive initiatives

Promoting the theme of Rotary Opens Opportunities is a wonderful way to showcase Rotarians at work♦making a difference and reaping the advantages of fellowship. In addition to showcasing your club♦s endeavors, share what other clubs in the district and elsewhere are accomplishing. Consistently extend the welcome mat. Include your club♦s contact information, and make sure someone is assigned to respond (maybe divide the responsibility by periods of time and social platforms) in a timely manner to requests.

Grooming the next generation

While empowering their ability to make a difference and fostering a sense of purpose, EarlyAct and Rotaract introduce young people to Rotary. We should seek opportunities to get involved with them, whether that entails launching or sponsoring a group via a local school, guiding a group in a project, and/or inviting them to help out with a volunteer project.

If you have other suggestions, please share them.

The great concerns of the day have many people feeling depressed, isolated, and helpless. Rotary membership is a remarkable cure!

Rotary Club of Cherokee County



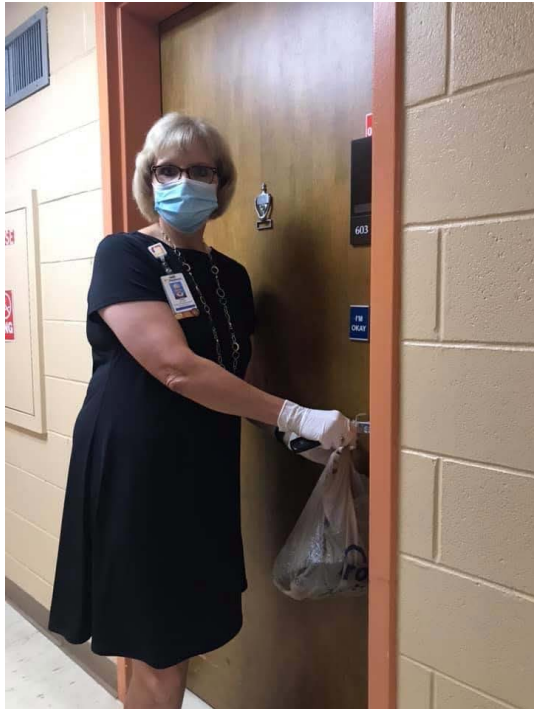

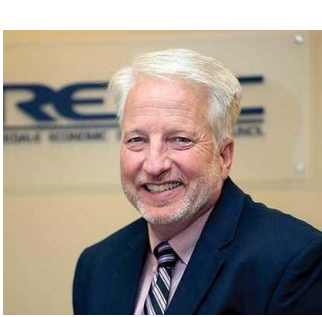

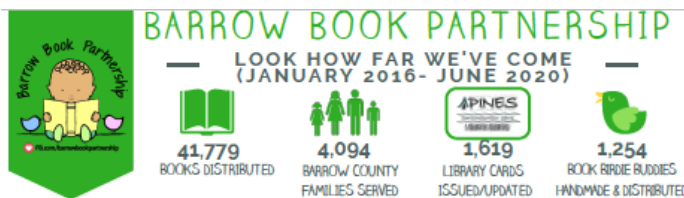


Making Connections Through Literacy

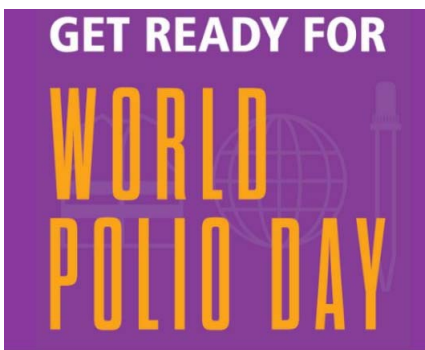

A little about Michele: She, along with her family, offers community outreach with Atlanta Dream Center. They go to low-income housing and provide activities for the children, participating in a compassion night where they go to downtown Atlanta and set up a barbeque for the homeless. After eating, they provide blankets, toiletries, food items etc., as well as offer a moving clothing boutique and shower truck. They have another outreach program called Princess Night where they go out late at night and give roses and encouragement cards to the prostitutes and try to get them off the streets, while also

speaking with the pimps to try to get them off the streets as well.

During the pandemic, Michele continues to go into Atlanta and hand out meals - she also delivers meals daily to GCPS students. Before Michele worked for GCPS, she was an Elementary teacher in Abu Dhabi for seven years. When returning to the states, she applied for a bus driver position, while gathering all required documentation from Abu Dhabi government and the U.S., which is needed to teach in Georgia, since her license lapsed in the U.S. while teaching in Abu Dhabi. Michele has completed everything needed to teach, but says her heart is now with the Special Needs students she transports, and has decided to continue being a bus driver. She shared with us that being a bus driver it is one of the most rewarding jobs she has ever had. As if all of this was not enough, on her available time she is making specialty cakes and cupcakes, and has provided many for her co-workers. Michele always has a positive attitude and great dedication to her students.

I smiled and said, "I didn't know there was one, but I did drop off quite a bit last month, so maybe that is me?" She joyously jumped up and exclaimed **VIRTUAL HUG!** And, she asked me to come behind the desk so she could show me the client log. In the log were lists of clients and a column asking if they needed pet food. She scrolled through pages and there were so many who answered yes. She told stories of how so many were helped and how they came back with photos and stories of how much their pets enjoyed the food. The only sad part is that they ran out. She told me that she didn't know who we did it, but that we need to keep doing what we do because it is vital and often overlooked. It was such an emotional moment, we were both teary-eyed.

No one who is struggling should have to choose between feeding themselves and a pet. No one struggling should have to give up a pet. It IS BECAUSE they are struggling that they NEED that pet more than ever. The pet offers companionship, relaxation, stress management and joy. It is now my **PET PROJECT** to ensure that Never Alone is stocked with pet food. I'll be continuing pet art, using 100% of all proceeds to purchase pet food.

The cancellation of our annual Wing Fling due to Covid-19 caused our club to have to adapt to government restrictions on public gatherings. As you know the relationship between the Rotary Club and the community is more than just raising money. Connecting with the community during local events has always played an essential role in building our community relationships.

In a brainstorm session with several members many ideas were tossed around and several will be implemented in the future. Our first virtual fundraiser was called: *Rotary Hero Fundraiser Challenge!* During this challenge we utilized the GoFundMe platform and asked our members and connections to donate and share. Within this fundraiser we explained how the Rotary helps local organizations with both time and money.

We established several levels of partnership with the fundraiser to encourage participation.

- Donors of \$100 (or more) received a Loganville Rotary Club Hero certificate (see picture below)
- Donors of \$1000 (or more) received a certificate as well as a Rotary Hero Service Above Self lapel pin. (see picture below)
- One Donor volunteered to match donations for 5 days - As a Thank you for his donation of \$4000 he received a Paul Harris 3D Glass Light award. (see picture below)

You might be wary to ask others to donate during a public health crisis, but people and businesses are looking for ways to reach out and help their communities in this time of need. We have raised over \$10K in just a few short weeks. This is a perfect example of keeping the mission relevant to the current situation while helping those in need right now.

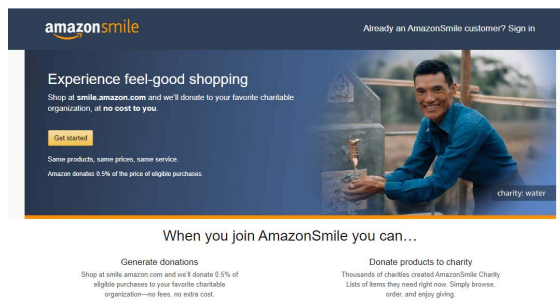


Fundraising Ideas: FREE MONEY with Amazon Smile for Non-Profit

If your club is a 501(c) (3), one easy way to raise funds is to set up an Amazon Smile account for your non-profit. As more and more people are shopping on-line, with a generous amount of that shopping being done on

Amazon, this program (and it's return) provides **low hanging fruit** for strapped Rotary Clubs.



From the Amazon site:

AmazonSmile is a simple way for you to support your favorite charitable organization every time you shop, at no cost to you. AmazonSmile is available at smile.amazon.com on your web browser and can be activated in the Amazon Shopping app for iOS and Android phones. When you shop at AmazonSmile, you'll find the exact same prices, selection and shopping experience as Amazon.com, with the added benefit that AmazonSmile will donate 0.5% of your eligible purchases to the charitable organization of your choice.

The following is the method given by Amazon for setting up your non-profit's AmazonSmile account.

Briefly:

Create an organization administrator account and accept the AmazonSmile Participation Agreement on behalf of your organization.

Verify your email address (we recommend that you use an email address that is associated with your charitable organization).

Submit your organization's bank account information.

Upload a copy of a voided check or bank statement to verify your organization's bank account information.

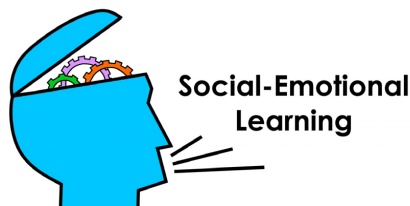

Tool For Schools....Laws of Life

Schools face a daunting challenge for the 2020-21 school year -- how to ensure that every student can reach their potential in the current education environment. Each passing week presents new changes and the stress that goes with them. Most schools will focus on *Social-Emotional Learning (SEL)* programs to help students get the year started from a positive place. The Georgia Laws of Life (GLL) Essay Contest provides high school teachers with a powerful tool to promote SEL along with writing skills.

LAWS OF LIFE ESSAY CONTEST OFFERS VALUABLE TOOL TO SCHOOLS

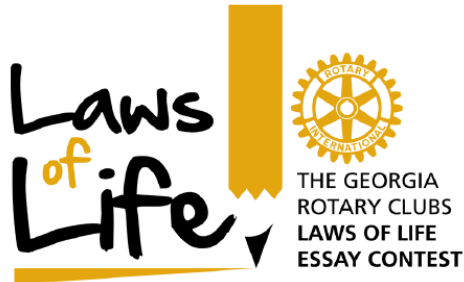
According to *Edweek*, a recently released survey of high schoolers found that a large share of teens struggled with depression, anxiety, and unhappiness during the school closures due to the coronavirus pandemic this spring. The *Collaborative for Academic, Social and Emotional Learning (CASEL)* offers an SEL guide that lays out what schools can do to help students develop the emotional skills to build personal relationships and academic partnerships. This enables them to endure personal challenges, including missed milestones, economic instability, racism, and even the death of loved ones. Research shows strong emotional health leads to improved academic outcomes.

Exploring life lessons in the development of the Laws of Life essay fosters self-awareness for students. As they peer review their work with classmates, students feel connected and supported. All my teachers are amazed at how the assignment to write a Laws of Life essay opens up a dialogue with their students, said Melissa Giggey, GLL Contest Chair at West Hall High School. It is the best way to earn trust and create a classroom environment. We always do it at the beginning of the school year.

Social, Emotional and Ethics Learning is proven most successful when repeated and supported by a broad network of family, community and social reinforcements, said Carol Gray Walker, Executive Director for Georgia Laws of Life. This perfectly describes the community network of Georgia Laws of Life. Students, their teachers, peers, family, friends and local Rotarians are engaged in and impacted by the contest.

To further support teachers and students in this distance learning era, GLL will implement online training for teachers and their Rotary Club partners as well as online essay submission and judging. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, schools and students will rely more heavily on technology for the 2020-2021 school year. Students may spend less time in the school building, so teachers will stay connected via online classroom platforms. A grant from the John Templeton Foundation provides some financial support for this timely technology investment.

GLL invites Rotary Clubs throughout Georgia to join the Laws of Life program. As a Contest Sponsor



your Rotary Club support provides a life-changing program for educators and students which encourages students to reflect upon values like those in the Rotary Four-Way Test. Contest Sponsors may also serve as a School Partner, working directly with a school or schools in your local area. GLL invites clubs throughout Georgia to participate with or without being a school partner.

The average cost per school, including student and teacher prize money, school contest materials, essay publication, student recognition, and administrative costs is approximately \$1,200 per year. Your support provides the program free of charge to Georgia Schools.

Since 1999, the Georgia Laws of Life Essay Contest has impacted over 750,000 students. Inspired by the power of simple quotes, or *Laws of Life*, Sir John Templeton established the writing competition in the 1970s to encourage young people to embrace the wisdom of these sayings and live their best lives. In their essays, students use a Law of Life to reflect on values that mean the most to them ♦ values such as generosity, courage, perseverance, honesty, integrity, and compassion.

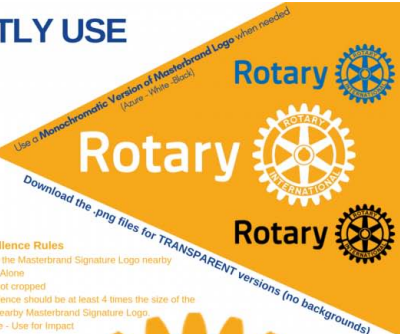

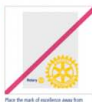
