

This Week....Amy M. Jacobs - Commissioner, Georgia Department of Early Care and Learning

Amy M. Jacobs is commissioner of Bright from the Start: Georgia Department of Early Care and Learning (DECAL), the agency responsible for helping meet the early child care and education needs of hundreds of thousands of Georgia s children and their families. Governor Nathan Deal appointed her to lead the department in June 2014. As DECAL Commissioner, Jacobs oversees an annual budget of more than \$900 million for programs focused on child care licensing, subsidized child care, child and adult care nutrition, child care quality, and early childhood education, specifically Georgia s Pre-K Program.

Before joining DECAL, Commissioner Jacobs served as Senior Policy Adviser for the Governor's Office of Planning and Budget (OPB). She began her career at OPB in 2001 in the planning, research, and evaluation division focusing on strategic planning and program evaluation. Also while at OPB, she served as director of the Education Division and the General Government Division. Before that, she worked for two years in the Georgia Court of Appeals.

The Commissioner serves on the Georgia S Children S Cabinet (Co-chair), the Georgia Child Fatality Review Panel, the 2020 Complete Count Committee, the Promising All Atlanta Children Thrive Advisory Board, and the boards of the Sandra Dunagan Deal Center for Early Language and Literacy at Georgia College and State University (Board Chair); Georgia Foundation for Early Care and Learning (Board Chair); and the Georgia Partnership for Excellence in Education.

Commissioner Jacobs is a graduate of the University of Georgia. She and her husband, John, live in Cobb County with their two children.

As director of the Carl Vinson Institute of Government, Laura Meadows coordinates the efforts of more than 150 employees who provide technical assistance, applied research, technology solutions, and training and development services to governments in Georgia and internationally.

Dr. Meadows joined the Institute of Government in 2009 and was appointed permanent director in February 2012. She has an extensive career in public service, working with state and local governments on a variety of issues such as planning, housing, infrastructure development, and facilitating community development and economic growth efforts. Prior to her work with the university, Dr. Meadows served in several executive positions at the state and federal levels, including commissioner of the Georgia Department of Community Affairs, the first executive director of the OneGeorgia Authority, assistant secretary of state, and state director of the U.S. Department of Agriculture s Rural Development program.

In a climate of division, politics, pandemics and more, all creating stress and leading toward potential disharmony, District Governors Kirk Driscoll (#6900), Tina Fischlin (#6910) and Steve Barnes (#6920) banded together to create a remarkable joint online video project that was shared on Facebook Live on the morning of Peace Day. This presentation acted as the foundation upon which numerous individual club events were organized and took place across all three districts.

The twenty-nine minute Facebook Live video was an intricately woven thread of insights not only from the three District Governor's, but also from a quartet of very impressive guests that willingly took part in the opportunity to talk about peace. These guests included Rotary International Director, Peter Kyle; Rotary Peace Fellow and Institute for Economics & Peace Global Ambassador, Patricia Shaffer; Brigadier General, USAF (Ret.), Kenn Todarov; and the notable and influential Ambassador Andrew Young.

With a little help from Forsyth County Rotarian Tommy Bagwell and his wife Chantal, District 6910 was the highest giving district to PolioPlus in the world during the 2019-20 Rotary year! Likewise, their home club of Forsyth County was the highest giving club in the world! Can you guess the common denominator here?

Tommy and Chantal are Arch Klumph Society Platinum Trustees Circle members who are very passionate about raising funds for PolioPlus. According to Robert Hall, Vice-Chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Committee, in 2017 Tommy expressed his belief that in Georgia we ought to be doing a lot better when it comes to supporting Rotary♦s PolioPlus fund. After much discussion, he and Chantal decided to make the commitment to put up \$3 million dollars in matching funds over the course of three years. It then became Robert♦s job to find the contributors to put those matching funds to work.

The Bagwells surpassed their commitment giving over \$3 million. These funds will go a long way in Rotary s campaign to eradicate polio from the face of the earth and keep our promise to the children of the world.

On September 17, Robert Hall was on hand at the weekly Forsyth County Rotary Club luncheon meeting to pay special tribute to the Forsyth County Club, District 6910 and, of course, Tommy and Chantal Bagwell. They were joined, virtually, by past Rotary International President and Chairman of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Committee, John Germ. After special plaques were presented to the top club and the top district, John called upon Tommy and Chantal to step forward so that he could thank them in front of the entire club. Tommy was presented a recognition pin and Chantal a lavalier and pin. The entire club quickly rose to their feet to offer up a thundering applause and standing ovation.

Tommy took just a second to express thanks to his club. He wanted sincerely to let them know how much he appreciated how the club rose up to meet a challenge that he set out for them, to become a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club. I can tell you how much it meant to me that the entire club worked so hard to make that happen. I said Bagowell.

The Bagwell♦s were officially inducted into the Arch Klumph Society in the fall of 2019 at the world headquarters of Rotary International in Evanston, Illinois. They visited the Arch Klumph Society Gallery where member♦s portraits are etched on glass plaques. It is a stunning display. In addition, each member has their profile included in an interactive display. With their most recent contribution, the Bagwells became Platinum Trustees Circle members of the Arch Klumph Society.

Hall said that Tommy once told him that he likes to see his donations leveraged to optimize the impact. The Bagwell s matching funds in excess of \$3 million generated an additional \$3 million plus from Rotarians. With the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation 2-for-1 match, their effort and commitment resulted in over \$19 million generated for the PolioPlus Fund to eradicate polio.

After the close of the Forsyth County Rotary meeting on September 17, one of his fellow Rotarians came up to Tommy off to the side to thank him for all that he does to make such a difference! In response, Tommy humbly and sincerely responded that he is very lucky and very blessed to be able to do so and that he looks forward to the day when Polio is history!

Polio, Where Are We and How Are We Trying to End Polio?

Polio cases are still going up in only two countries. Afghanistan and Pakistan are the only two countries left with wild poliovirus. So far this year, we have had 120 cases of wild poliovirus. Afghanistan has had 47 cases and Pakistan has had 73 cases this year.

When COVID-19 hit, Polio inoculations were stopped and everyone stayed at home. But, just recently in Pakistan, the inoculations have started again. Health workers have started going door to door with armed soldiers. There have been some that have spread false rumors about the inoculations. Some were told that the inoculations were to sterilize children of the countries. The End Polio chairs from both countries are working on correcting these false statements.

There are two types of polio vaccines. One was invented by Jonas Salk. His vaccine is a dead virus that is given in a shot. Albert Sabin invented a vaccine that is a very weak virus that is alive. The Sabin vaccine is given with just two drops. Sabin so vaccine is the most cost-effective vaccine in the world. Most people can have this vaccine and never get polio. In mostly poorly vaccinated populations, there will pop up a mutated type of vaccine-derived polio that can give someone polio. Only 1 in 500,000 might get the mutation from the live virus. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation are working on a new polio serum that will not give any children polio.

We are so close to ending polio, we just need your help. When we get to the last case of polio, Rotary will stand with the leaders of the world to celebrate the End of Polio. Polio will be the only second disease eradicated in the World. Small Pox is the only disease eradicated so far.









DG Tina Fischlin had the privilege of visiting Elberton Rotarian George Gaines, who just celebrated his 101st birthday. We hope to share a video of their meeting in the near future. Thank you to George saughter Elsa Ann, his brother-in-law Joe Meyer, who is a member of the Rotary Club of Dahlonega Sunrise, and Elberton Club President, Chris Kubas for the introduction.

Like many who are looking ahead to next year, the Rotary Club of Elberton is preparing for a milestone occasion. Chartered in 1921, the club will soon celebrate its centennial birthday. Not to be outdone, Elberton Rotarian George Gaines had 101 candles on his birthday cake in August.

While too young to have been a charter member of his club, George has a long history with Rotary. In 1946, George S Rotarian father-in-law invited him to speak for his club about George s three years of overseas combat in North Africa, Italy, and Austria during WWII. It was a club for old men, George chuckles, revealing his first impressions of Rotary. The youngest there looked like he was about 55 or 60. With his wife Tootsie, the love of his life, by his side, George further spent most of his career in the granite industry. Starting out as a partner in the Atlas Granite Company, which he operated for 17 years, he went on to work as a quality control manager for the Granite Association. ShelterBox provides Shelter Kits which include a selection of durable tools and materials that are customized to suit the needs of each community. The tools and materials they send provide the essentials that families need to start rebuilding homes right away, ranging from tough tarpaulin and timber, to corrugated sheeting and even room dividers. The versatile tools they provide help with everything from clearing rubble to building shelters and even tending crops. These tools can also be used to build furniture, cut firewood and make repairs.

Since 2000, ShelterBox has provided shelter, warmth, and dignity following more than 300 disasters in over 100 countries. ShelterBox responds urgently to earthquake, volcano, flood,



hurricane, cyclone, tsunami, or conflict by delivering boxes of essential shelter aid and other life-saving supplies. Each iconic green ShelterBox contains a disaster relief tent for an extended family, blankets, a water filtration system, emergency lighting, and other tools for survival. ShelterBox USA is a 2-time Nobel Peace Prize nominee and is based in Santa Barbara, California.





On Monday September 21st, the Rotary Club of South Hall hosted members from the Rotary Club of Gainesville and Hall County to recognize the International Day of Peace and Unity. Club members gathered at Elachee Nature Center afterwork to hear from <u>Gateway Domestic Violence Center Executive Director Jessica Butler</u>.

Each year the International Day of Peace is observed around the world on 21 September. The UN General Assembly has declared this as a day devoted to strengthening the ideals of peace, through observing 24 hours of non-violence and cease-fire.

Although many of us don think about the need for peace in our own communities, this year so organizers recognized that there has been an increased focus on domestic violence in our communities during COVID-19. Local Rotarians wanted to take a moment to hear from Jessica about the changes Gateway has seen over the last few months and the realities of domestic violence in our communities.

Jessica shared with club members the identifying signs and reasons why many victims struggle with getting themselves out of unhealthy situations. She also shared the staggering statistics that they have doubled the number of individuals served this year as opposed to the same time frame last year.

Following the presentation, Rotary discussed the need to continue to promote peace not just globably but locally. Rotarians then kicked off the first Rotary Rocks project in an effort to share peace, unity, and kindness within the community. This project is a spin off of the Kindness Rocks project that uses basic rocks to spread simple messages of hope to public spaces within the community.

Over 40 rocks were distributed to local places throughout Hall County on that night and Rotarians continue to spread these rocks with messages of hope.

South Hall Club President Amanda Groover shared that she hoped this was the beginning of an ongoing project for the clubs. We know that simply spreading positive messages can impact lives that we may never meet and help people in ways we may never know. However, we truly think that it will at least help to put a smile on the recipient s face.

CANTON ROTARY CELEBRATES PEACE AROUND PEACE POLE

In its first in-person meeting of the new Rotary year, the Rotary Club of Canton celebrated peace in Canton Rotary Park around its Peace Pole on September 22. On a beautiful sunny day made for the occasion on the first day of Fall, the spirit of peace and camaraderie was in the air as Canton Rotarians were excited to be with each other in person once again as they "stand for peace and unity."

The reason for this peace program, "Spreading the Message of Peace," on this day was to coincide with International Peace Day the day before, September 21. Past President and Club Historian Rebecca Johnston, who was the emcee for the program, opened by dedicating the meeting in memory of recently deceased "former Canton Rotarian of the Year and state legislator from Cherokee County, Garland Pinholster, who . . . was nationally known as an innovator and inspiring basketball coach, who brought those skills to everything he did, including as a leader of this club."

Recounting the words of President John F. Kennedy that she spoke when the Canton Rotary Peace Pole was dedicated in May, 2017, Johnston said: •I am talking about genuine peace, the kind of peace that makes life on earth worth living, and the kind that enables men and nations to grow, and to hope, and build a better life for their children•not merely peace for Americans but peace for all men and women, not merely peace in our time but peace in all time."

Johnston also expounded on what peace poles represent: "Peace poles are the most recognized monument dedicated to peace on earth. They represent the highest aspirations of peace and goodwill inherent in the human heart transcending race, religion and creed. Peace Poles serve as vehicles to carry the message, May Peace Prevail On Earth, out to every corner on our world. They are planted to uplift, empower and elevate the human consciousness to embrace the oneness of our global family."

Explaining the reason for the 4 languages appearing on the Canton Rotary Peace Pole, Johnston noted: "The four-sided pole, one of almost 200,000 peace poles in over 100 countries worldwide, expresses the message of peace --

"May Peace Prevail on Earth" -- in English, Spanish, native Cherokee, and Latin."

"The Spanish reflects the native language of the Hispanic community in Cherokee County; the Cherokee language was spoken by the Cherokee Nation that once lived here; and the Latin reflects the setting of Canton Rotary Park between the Old and New Courthouses in downtown Canton."

Keynote speaker Cherokee County Sheriff Frank Reynolds highlighted the role of law enforcement officers as peacekeepers, telling the story of a recently identified unsung Cherokee County peace officer killed in the line of duty long ago whose name is missing, but will soon be inscribed, on the Cherokee County Public Safety Memorial standing behind him. Reynolds candidly acknowledged how he frequently comes to Canton Rotary Park to reflect and hardly noticed, until now, the Canton Rotary Peace Pole and all it represents.

The program concluded with Canton Rotary Club Family of Rotary Chair and former Georgia Rotary Student Program (GRSP) student (2002-2003) Francisco Lozano explaining the 74-year history of the program and how it has produced over 3600 "ambassadors of peace and goodwill" since its inception. Canton Rotarians then contemplated peace as they listened to a recording of "The GRSP Peace Song" written by former GRSP Administrator Janis Comer (music) and 1994-1995 GRSP Student Bernard Wong (lyrics).



Canton Rotary Club Past President and Club Historian Rebecca Johnston spoke eloquently about the history and meaning of the Canton Rotary Peace Pole and the significance of its setting in Canton Rotary Park in downtown Canton.

After the peace program ended, Canton Rotarians and visitors from other Cherokee County Rotary clubs gathered around the Canton Rotary Peace Pole for a group photo to represent peace in our community! May Peace Prevail on Earth, in America, and in our Community!


