#### Rotary Program 11-10-20 Doug Bolton - Farmers to Families Program

#### Phase 3 of Farmers to Families Comes to a Close

Rotary Clubs across District 6910 made a significant impact on their communities this year through partnerships with the Farmers To Families program. During the month of October, when phase three of the program took place, our district distributed 11 trailer loads of food. Each trailer contained 1,152 boxes of food that contained meat, dairy, produce and 1 gallon of milk, weighing a little over 30 pounds per box. That totals 12,672 boxes of food.

During phase two, which took place in August and September, the shipments were limited to produce only. During that time the district distributed six loads of produce.

In total, 17 loads of food were distributed in D6910 from the end of July through October. This had tremendous impact in many communities. While phase two loads of produce could be distributed anywhere within the district, phase three loads were limited to only those counties that contained Economic Opportunity Zones. There were only 15 counties within the district that fit into that classification.

Several clubs worked together to deliver the loads and I would estimate that at least 20 clubs were involved. This included most notably, **Rome, South Hall, Braselton, Green-Putnam, Gilmer, Pickens, Canton, Towne Lake, Covington, Lawrenceville, Gwinnett, Gainesville, Hartwell, Duluth, Elberton** and many more. I hate to leave anyone out, but most clubs that requested deliveries partnered with other clubs to distribute the food boxes, and I'm not sure of all of those partnerships that were made. But to all those that were involved, your impact and effort is awesome and you are to be commended. In all, you distributed:

#### 500,688 pounds of food

#### 417,240 meals

You are PEOPLE OF ACTION !!!

As phase three now comes to a close, Rotarians in D6910 have stepped up in a big way to help and to make a difference.







LA CROSSE, Wis. (WXOW) - The local chapter of the Association of Fundraising Professionals typically recognizes those who go above and beyond in the fundraising world with a special ceremony on National Philanthropy Day, which is Nov. 15. But, this is 2020.

WXOW is teaming up with the AFP Upper Mississippi Valley to help recognize this year's recipients.

We start with the 2020 Outstanding Youth in Philanthropy. This category recognizes individuals or a group of individuals who demonstrate outstanding commitment to the community through helping to generate direct financial support, development of charitable programs, and leadership in philanthropy.

This year, that honor goes to the La Crosse Area Rotary Interact clubs.



With membership in clubs at Aquinas, Central, Logan, Onalaska, West Salem and growing, Interact is Rotary International's service organization for people ages 14-18. Interact clubs are sponsored by individual Rotary clubs that provide support and guidance.

In the La Crosse Area, perhaps the most significant philanthropic efforts of Interact come in the form of the annual iFeed event.

The area's largest food drive is held each year in November at Logan High School. Though COVID had other plans for 2020, they adapted with a drive-thru raffle event.

"Still being able to have something similar to it with the way the world being the way it is today, we're still connecting the community together as much as possible," said Isaac Killilea, Vice President of Onalaska High School's Interact.

In years past, the fundraising effort has been significant. Take 2019 for example when the group collected nearly 35,000 food items for local pantries. Also at the event, teams pack more than 75,000 meals to send to hungry children overseas. It's a true collaboration that draws on a hint of school rivalry for some good-natured competition.



"The competition aspect makes you want to work even harder for some reason," said Central Interact member Hailey Constanti. Not only does Interact organize this huge undertaking, they encourage other groups in the community, large or small, to feed their need to pitch in.


Since 1982, the local AFP chapter has covered parts of the tri-state area with membership mostly in La Crosse, Winona and Decorah, Iowa.

# After 80 years, Leechburg Cemetery gets new sign thanks to Rotary Club s efforts

The Leechburg Cemetery has a new entry sign that pays homage to its original.

The sign at the cemetery was scrapped for metal in the 1940s during World War II and it hadn t been replaced. The cemetery was founded in 1864.

Longtime cemetery volunteer Larry Boehm, 47, installed the sign himself Sunday.

The original sign was melted down for the war effort, Source Boehm said. This is a project we wanted to do since we started sprucing up the cemetery.

The laser-cut aluminum sign, posts and hardware cost \$2,600, paid for by the Leechburg Rotary Club.

Leechburg Rotary Club executive secretary Pat Gerheim said the rotary has applied for a grant through Rotary District 7280, which would cover \$1,500 of the costs, if approved.

Rotary tries to do things to improve the community and the sign aesthetically improves the look of the cemetery,
Gerheim said.

The sign was made locally at Omni-Fab in New Kensington by Jim Frank.

The private, five-acre cemetery overlooks parts of Route 66 from high ground off of Pershing and Evergreen roads.

More than 600 grave sites, almost 100 which honor veterans, are cared for and maintained by The Leechburg Cemetery Company, formed in 2011 and comprised of about ten volunteers.


Burials haven t been permitted since 1996.

The project began in August and Boehm said he worked about a week designing the new sign, referencing the original sign which was stamped and enameled and had more ornate posts.

We didnot have the funds or capability to come up with something like that but itos as close to the original as we could get, said LCC vice-president Boehm. Itos a new version of the old sign, which was removed in 1942. We felt it was right to put it back.

LCC operates on a scant budget of less than \$150 annually and relies on donations from the public.

## **Construction begins at Rotary Park**

MENDOCINO Long since a forgotten patch of land on the south end of town, Rotary Park is seeing new life and new activity in recent weeks.

Donot be dismayed if the piles of direct and leaves have gotten even bigger in the meantime, though. It s all part of the Mendocino Rotary Clubos plan to turn the land into a ocrown jewel fo Mendocino, said former Mendocino Sheriff, Tom Allman, who attended the groundbreaking ceremony Thursday.

Allman, as Sheriff, and District Attorney David Eyster helped to use some of the county s discretionary funds when the project was still new, several years ago. Their help eased the way for the club to get the park started.

♦I think (we re excited to) bring some beauty in here and let the public see it so more than an overgrown triangle, Allman said.

When completed, the park will boast a new playground, a sculpture area, ADA-compliant sidewalks and paths, a bike rack and a cedar split-rail fence along the southern end of the yard.

The park is on track to be completed by Summer 2021, said Ray Alarcon, a Rotary Club member.

The land is actually owned by the club \$ 501c3 foundation, so donations to the project are tax-deductible. Community members who wish to support the construction can buy paving stones for \$125, or a minimum donation of \$2,500 to be included in the Founder \$ Circle. Local businesses can support the project and earn a paving stone for \$300, said foundation president, Jerry Karabensh.

Local business owner and innkeeper, Ian Roth, said he is very excited to see the project coming to fruition. Roth has owned the Seagull Inn, across the street from the park, for the past two years.

I remember when it was just a bramble patch of blackberries, Roth said. The Rotary Club brought in Roth, along with other nearby business owners, to be included in decision meetings some time ago rate and a move Roth said he was grateful for.

And if any customers has questions about the construction going on across the street, he said, >1 can tell them it s because of our wonderful Rotary Club. He called the park the Seaguli Inn s front yard.

Many members of the community donated to help Rotary preserve this land for public use, instead of the development of commercial buildings on the site, Karabensh said. We re just so happy that we re able to provide the community and visitors a place to congregate.

We all know Rotary's tremendous power to transform our communities and ourselves. However, in every community, people have been left out, and we have not made a strong enough effort to reach them.

The RI Board of Directors is taking action to make Rotary more welcoming and diverse. We formed a task force to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion to help clubs attract new members regardless of gender, race, religion, age, or other factors. This will help us speed up the change we all want and need. The selection of Jennifer E. Jones as Rotary president for 2022-23 the first woman to lead our organization to is another step in this direction.

At the grassroots level, clubs drive inclusion and diversity. Alia Ali 🏈 who serves on the board of directors at the Big West Rotaract Multidistrict Information Organization and is a Rotary Youth Leadership Awards alumna and past president of the Rotaract Club of Surrey-Newton, British Columbia 🏈 offers her perspective.

I still remember the relief I felt as a RYLA participant four years ago. I had finally found my people: people who cared as much as I did. All over the world, Rotary has the same heart. We serve our communities and take action where others feel paralyzed by the size and scope of a problem.

Let's continue that spirit, especially when the conversation is difficult. Racism, prejudice, and discrimination take on different forms but exist in every country, in every city, and in every person. How do we root it out?

As a diversity, equity, and inclusion consultant, I help organizations create a culture that empowers and attracts everyone using the power of empathy. When we feel with others as if they were ourselves, we cannot hold prejudice in our hearts. When every child reminds you of your own child, when every woman or man reminds you of your mother or brother, you start seeing the world differently.

We can apply The Four-Way Test through the lens of empathy. Are we building goodwill and friendship with everyone in our area, including women? Are things fair and beneficial to people of all ages? Who has to make choices that you don't have to make?

I made a heartbreaking choice between Rotary and my religion when a Rotary convention was held during Ramadan. I wondered: When we ask if this is fair and beneficial to all concerned, did that not include me as a Muslim? Would the convention ever be held over Easter? Only by asking difficult questions can we begin the work of creating a more inclusive and diverse Rotary.

We already connect so many people across the world. Imagine the possibilities when we bring even more people along for the ride. That's the future of Rotary I want to see: one where we are unstoppable in our service, relentless in our kindness, and intentional in the change we want to see.

Rotary has a big enough heart. If we open our door wider, we might find a lot of interesting people with new voices and new perspectives. We already have a variety of clubs offering different styles, cultures, and opportunities � and those who do not feel welcome in any particular club might be great candidates for new clubs created on different models. It's important that we make sure every new Rotary member is a good fit for their club. *Rotary Opens Opportunities* through diversity.

VII. POLICY MANUAL CHANGES Changes to the District Policy Manual may be made by two separate means: A. proposed changes by the Clubs may be made only by Resolution enacted at the District Conference in accordance with procedures established herein; or B. The Board may make changes by motion of any board member at any called board meeting, whether regular or special, provided that notice by publication to the clubs first occurs in the District newsletter �Rotations followed by a thirty (30) day grace period for clubs to comment and/or object, and if no objections are filed with the Board at the end of the thirty (30) day grace period, said grace period being measured from the date of publication of the District newsletter, then the proposed change may then be enacted by the Board.
