



FLUVANNA COUNTY, Va. (CBS19 NEWS) -- In response to COVID-19, the Fluvanna Rotary Club is hosting its third food drive at Lake Monticello.

"The fact that some of us are blessed and have more, and are willing to share, I think is what makes Fluvanna such a great community to live in," said the club s Executive Secretary, Rudy Garcia.

To avoid being a super spreader event, volunteers picked up donations at the bottom of residents' driveways.

Food pickup was between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. Thursday.

It's a plan that's growing. In April, volunteers collected 7,000 pounds of food, 8,000 in July, and 12,000 during this third event.

A food drive organizer says the demand is more than four times the average.

"When we started this out, they were doing about 100 families, 125 families a month, at the peak they were doing about 500 families a month," said Garcia.



He says the Fluvanna County Sheriff's Office donated its No Shave November money, while E.W. Thomas and the rotary foundation have also made big contributions.

"Our local rotary foundation stepped up and said that they would match the first \$2,500 in cash donations the community made," said Garcia. "I am pleased to tell you we've already achieved that."

He says the end goal is to donate \$10,000 to Fluvanna s food bank.

By the time the drive is over, organizers say they will have had more than 300 volunteers and close to 1,300 community service hours.

One volunteer says out of the several years she's volunteered, this one feels different.

"I think people are more giving this year. I don't know if it's because of COVID or what," said Barb Ringgold.

As for the future, Garcia says there will be a fourth food drive in April.



"One of our volunteers said 'Hey, why don't you tie all of these to holidays?' We thought about it and said that's a good idea. One Easter fundraiser, one Fourth of July fundraiser, and a Thanksgiving fundraiser," Garcia said.

AN BENITO • In a team effort made by Rotarians and the community, some families received something a little extra special for Thanksgiving this season.

On Friday, the Rotary Club of San Benito provided 21 San Benito CISD families with meals as part of the organization s first Turkey Meal Distribution Project.

Along with a turkey, every meal came with several side dishes, such as cans of corn and cranberries, potatoes, stuffing, yams, bread and pie.

♦It just felt so good to do something like that, ♦ Rotary Club President Dr. Olivia Rivas said. ♦It was the whole community that came together with it.♦

Rotarians partnered with 10 elementary schools who identified families that would receive the meals.

Rivas said Rotarians wrote a �Happy Thanksgiving� note on the box of each meal that let the families know that the Rotary Club is grateful to have families like them in the community and to have wonderful children like theirs in the school district.

♦This is the first turkey giveaway that we ve had and it so so successful, Rivas said. ♦All of our members that went out to distribute came back saying it felt so good to do this for the parents, and some of the elementary schools had the parents there waiting to receive the meals. ♦

Rivas said a member of the Rotary Club from Houston came up with the idea of having the Turkey Meal Distribution Project.

♦Giving away turkeys was something that he had done while he was in law enforcement in Harris County, ♦ she said. ♦He suggested to our club that we get involved in a turkey project because he had been so successful with it in Houston. ♦

Rivas said he and Rotarian Celeste Sanchez headed the turkey giveaway.

♦Many of the cans of food were donated by some of his former co-workers involved with law enforcement in the Houston area and many others were donated by local residents, ♦ Rivas said. ♦When we contacted the school district, they were very happy that we were going to do this. ♦

According to Rivas, the Rotary Club has close to 71 turkey donations promised for next year by local community members wanting to make a contribution to the project.

San Benito is not a large community, but it so not too small, Rivas said. It is just right and everybody pitches in.

Abundant Harvest takes home nearly \$700 of items during Rotary Grocery Grab

Grocery shopping can get a bit crazy for anyone during this time of year; just ask local resident Scott Shreves.

Representing Abundant Harvest as part of the Emporia Rotary Club s Grocery Grab at Good's CashSaver Saturday morning, Shreves secured a grand total of \$683.13 in food items for the organization over the course of a frantic, five-minute race against the clock.

The opportunity began with a single-minute pit stop in the store s meat section before opening to a more free-form exploration of each aisle, which, for Shreves, meant a chance to focus on finding the highest-quality boxed meals, canned foods and other non-perishable food items typically needed and requested by visitors to the pantry.

♦I actually came in here with a game plan just in case I was selected for the actual grab, \$\infty\$ Shreves said, referring to the five other contestants that went home with \$50 gift cards as part of the drawing. \$\infty\$There were things I was able to get a lot of, like spices and boxed meals, which are going to go a long way for us and are always something we need. I think our people are really going to appreciate some of the meat products I was able to grab, too. It was hard not to feel a bit overwhelmed, but I just wanted to stay focused and grab as much as I could, because every little bit helps. \$\infty\$

We all know Rotary's tremendous power to transform our communities and ourselves. However, in every community, people have been left out, and we have not made a strong enough effort to reach them.

The RI Board of Directors is taking action to make Rotary more welcoming and diverse. We formed a task force to promote diversity, equity, and inclusion to help clubs attract new members regardless of gender, race, religion, age, or other factors. This will help us speed up the change we all want and need. The selection of Jennifer E. Jones as Rotary president for 2022-23 the first woman to lead our organization to is another step in this direction.

At the grassroots level, clubs drive inclusion and diversity. Alia Ali • who serves on the board of directors at the Big West Rotaract Multidistrict Information Organization and is a Rotary Youth Leadership Awards alumna and past president of the Rotaract Club of Surrey-Newton, British Columbia • offers her perspective.

I still remember the relief I felt as a RYLA participant four years ago. I had finally found my people: people who cared as much as I did. All over the world, Rotary has the same heart. We serve our communities and take action where others feel paralyzed by the size and scope of a problem.

Let's continue that spirit, especially when the conversation is difficult. Racism, prejudice, and discrimination take on different forms but exist in every country, in every city, and in every person. How do we root it out?

As a diversity, equity, and inclusion consultant, I help organizations create a culture that empowers and attracts everyone using the power of empathy. When we feel with others as if they were ourselves, we cannot hold prejudice in our hearts. When every child reminds you of your own child, when every woman or man reminds you of your mother or brother, you start seeing the world differently.

We can apply The Four-Way Test through the lens of empathy. Are we building goodwill and friendship with everyone in our area, including women? Are things fair and beneficial to people of all ages? Who has to make choices that you don't have to make?

I made a heartbreaking choice between Rotary and my religion when a Rotary convention was held during Ramadan. I wondered: When we ask if this is fair and beneficial to all concerned, did that not include me as a Muslim? Would the convention ever be held over Easter? Only by asking difficult questions can we begin the work of creating a more inclusive and diverse Rotary.

We already connect so many people across the world. Imagine the possibilities when we bring even more people along for the ride. That's the future of Rotary I want to see: one where we are unstoppable in our service, relentless in our kindness, and intentional in the change we want to see.

Rotary has a big enough heart. If we open our door wider, we might find a lot of interesting people with new voices and new perspectives. We already have a variety of clubs offering different styles, cultures, and opportunities \diamondsuit and those who do not feel welcome in any particular club might be great candidates for new clubs created on different models. It's important that we make sure every new Rotary member is a good fit for their club. *Rotary Opens Opportunities* through diversity.


Rotary Foundation Month
