The lights go on: Rotary clubs install solar panels to bring electricity to Ghana district

A joint solar power project between two rotary clubs has made a difference in Ghana. (Accra-Spintex Rotary Club)

Light appeared and drowned out the darkness.

The Rochester Rotary Club and the Accra-Spintex Rotary Club recently completed a solar power project in the Alokpassta Chips Compound, in the Nkwanta South District of Ghana. That community is not alone. Approximately 1/4 of the world so population experiences negative repercussions to business, education and healthcare due to lack of electricity.

It also makes travel after sundown more perilous. The Rotary clubs said that lack of lighting in the evenings has led to residents being bitten by poisonous snakes.

A hospital in town serves between 150,000-165,000 people, with out-of-town patients often traveling up to 10 hours to get there. That hospital lacks electricity, which affects the ability to stock vaccinations and other medicines.

So, the rotary clubs did their parts to help. Due to \$15,000 in funding raised by former Rotarian Rhonda Panczyk, electricity was brought to Ghana in the form of solar power.

Under the supervision of the Accra-Spintex Rotary Club, the project was completed in October. Ronald Diliddo, president of the Rochester Rotary Charities 🗞 the philanthropic arm of the club 🐟 said the first baby born in that community following the project s completion was actually named Kwame Solar.

Pacific Island children to access three new life-saving vaccines through Rotary-UNICEF partnership

SUVA, FIJI (26 November 2021) - Children in the Pacific region are now able to access three new life-saving vaccines, pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV), rotavirus vaccine (RV), and the human papillomavirus vaccine (HPV), through Rotary Give Every Child A Future, a partnership between UNICEF and Rotary in Australia and New Zealand.

This multi-million dollar partnership is supporting the introduction of these vaccines to protect children against pneumonia and rotavirus as well as to protect adolescents against HPV reaching more than 100,000 children in total across Cook Islands, Kiribati, Nauru, Niue, Samoa, Tokelau, Tonga, Tuvalu and Vanuatu.

In the Pacific, pneumonia and diarrhoea are among the top three causes of mortality in children under five years of age. Around one-third of all pneumonia deaths are due to pneumococcal disease, which is usually transmitted through contact with infected children.

Rotaviruses are the leading cause of severe diarrhoea in children aged less than five years. Severe diarrhoea can lead to dehydration, particularly in young children, and if left untreated can be life-threatening.

Cervical cancer is one of the top three regional priorities of Pacific leaders, with over a thousand cervical cancer cases each year. Nearly all cases of cervical cancer can be attributed to HPV infection.

The rollout of these vaccines, is supported by Rotary Australia and New Zealand to celebrate 100 years of service as 2021 marks the Centenary of Rotary International in the region.

♦ This project is a further demonstration of the partnership between UNICEF and Rotary, ♦ said Rotary Project Director, James Allen. ♦ We have worked closely with UNICEF and others on the worldwide polio eradication campaign. We are so delighted that the implementation of Rotary Give Every Child A Future is underway after years of planning and preparation. It is a vital public health initiative that will have lasting and sustainable benefits for the peoples of these countries. ♦

The three-year partnership is also supporting an update of national immunization and supply chain management policies. It will also assist with an upgrade to cold chain equipment and the supply chain system. This will help improve the immunization reporting system and integrate other essential health system strengthening activities that will contribute to a reduction in PCV, RV, HPV infections and other vaccine preventable diseases.

UNICEF and Rotary Australia and New Zealand will also support public health authorities in Pacific Island countries to engage communities on the importance of being vaccinated to save lives, and address misinformation about vaccination.

YORK, Maine � Scott Ramsey didn't pay for his new Lexus, at least not full price.

Ramsey was this year's lucky winner in the York Rotary Charitable Foundation's "Car With A Cause" raffle. His winning ticket cost \$250.

With 875 raffle tickets sold, Ramsey's was picked at random during HarvestFest last month, and he picked up his keys on Tuesday, Nov. 16, at Berlin City Lexus, according to the foundation.



The winning number, 514, in the York Rotary Club's 2021 Car with a Cause raffle belonged to Scott Ramsay of York, who received the keys to his Lexus on November 16, 2021.

The raffle was sold out for the fourth year in a row, according to <u>York Rotary Club</u>'s Tim Pearson, who said the group typically raises about \$40,000 once expenses are deducted, including insurance, printing costs and a state license.

All funds raised go to support the charitable activities of York Rotary, including community services, food pantry, heat assistance, scholarships and many others, Pearson said. "The community and York visitors have been wonderful in their continued support even through these difficult months of the pandemic," he added.

I first discovered the value of service when I saw how a few simple acts can immeasurably change lives. It began when I joined others in my club for a project to bring toilets and clean drinking water to rural villages near our city. It moved forward when we promoted sanitation and provided opportunities for education across the country, thanks to generous gifts from supporters who believed in our projects as much as those of us on the ground did.

There is no better time of the year to be reminded of that generosity than November, which is Rotary Foundation Month.

As the charitable arm of Rotary International, The Rotary Foundation is the engine that powers so many Rotary projects throughout the world. The Foundation transforms your gifts into projects that change lives. It is the Foundation that helps us to get closer to our goal of eradicating polio, to show more people how we promote peace through tangible actions,

and to demonstrate the impact our projects have in our areas of focus.

Consider some recent projects that were made possible by the Foundation:

- The Rotary clubs of Guatemala La Reforma, Guatemala, and Calgary, Alberta, received an \$80,000 global grant to organize a comprehensive plan to train nurses and rural health
- care workers to prevent and treat cervical cancer and to implement a sustainable system of referrals in seven regions of Guatemala. More than two dozen hospitals in Honduras received personal protective equipment for their medical staff thanks to a \$169,347 global grant sponsored by the Rotary clubs of
- Villa Real de Tegucigalpa, Honduras, and Waldo Brockide-Kansas City, Missouri.
 The Rotary clubs of Cotonou Le Nautile, Benin, and Tournai Haut-Escaut, Belgium, received a \$39,390 global grant to provide agricultural training at an ecologically responsible permaculture mini-farm connected to a center for children in Sow, Benin. This will help a new generation of farmers become economically self-sufficient.


