Rotary Club of Covington's Pandemic Project

In early March, when the Corona Virus Pandemic hit the U.S. many retailers across the country were at a loss for what to do with excess inventory as the economy came to a standstill and shoppers were being asked to stay home. One major national retail store so overstock warehouse immediately felt the impact.

The warehouse had an overwhelming quantity of goods that had been returned form the regional stores that were either seasonally out of date or not moving off the shelves.

Previously, the warehouse manager had sold the items at a fraction of the cost to another company to maintain a slight profit rather than taking a loss on the overstocked items. As the pandemic continued, that company no longer wished to purchase or haul the excess inventory and the retailer s warehouse

became overwhelmed as it continued to collect the excess goods from the region s stores.

That s when opportunity made its way to the Rotary Club of Covington, Georgia, Club Administrative Chair Doug Bolton said. One, actually two, of the club s members own trucking companies. A driver for one of those companies just so happened to be on a delivery when a friend who was the director of a nonprofit asked if the driver could pick up a load of donated goods nearby. The driver asked permission from the owner and the owner, being a Rotarian, immediately agreed if it would help someone in need.

However, he told his driver he wanted to make contact with the warehouse manager to ensure the request was valid. Contact was made, and the manager assured that they did want to donate the goods. Then the Rotarian was asked if he knew of any other nonprofits in need.

That Rotarian happened to be Tarrence T. Houston, the club s foundation chair, and he worked with the manager to provide all of the 501(c)3 information needed to start taking in the excess inventory for donation.

♦Almost immediately the manager asked if a tractor trailer could pick up a load, ♦ Bolton said. ◆Tarrence said absolutely and went to pick up the load himself. He returned to the city of Covington to his trailer lot. He had a full trailer load of just about everything the retail stores sold ♦ clothes, household goods, cleaning supplies, over the counter medicines, books, school supplies, food items, etc. While the club board was excited and knew they could help a lot of people in the community in need, the logistics of where to store, sort, organize, and distribute became quickly obvious. ●

As fate would have it, the other club member who owned a trucking company the club s GRSP Chair Wayne Pugh - advised that he just happened to have an empty warehouse that could be used.

The generosity of the two trucking company owners to use the trucks and trailers and the warehouse cannot be understated, Bolton said.

During the following two months 10 trailer loads of goods were donated by the generous warehouse manager who asked not to be identified by name or company.

Approximately a quarter of a million dollars worth of goods were distributed to more than 50 nonprofits by the Rotary Club of Covington and thousands of individuals in need were served during a time when many could not afford to purchase those items. As the virus became less of a threat, the company that had been purchasing goods from the warehouse resumed its routine, and the donations to the Rotary Club of Covington ceased, but not before a huge impact was made on so many lives.

Rotarians are people of action and in a time where there was an uncertainty for the future, our members took action, Public Image Chair Jackie Gutknecht said. We are grateful for all of the volunteers who gave of their time and resources to make this massive undertaking a huge success for our community and region. Donations from this partnership spread far and wide and the impact will be felt for years to come.

Many beautiful and interesting gardens will be available for a self-guided tour in West Dover and Wilmington. Musicians will be playing at most of the venues and strict guidelines will be in place due to the coronavirus situation.

Only 250 tickets will be sold, to ensure the safety of all participants. Advance tickets are \$25. "Day of" tickets will be for sale if available. The club hopes that even if people are not able to attend, they will purchase a ticket as a donation to Rotary.

Rotary International is an organization that works globally to help people around the world in many different ways. There are thousands of clubs in the United States, and thousands more around the world. However, this pandemic has created a problem in regards to the way that Rotarians are able to help people.

The Rotary Club of the Deerfield Valley is comprised of 45 members, who gather at the Deerfield Valley Rescue Building on Wednesdays for breakfast meetings. The bulk of their fundraising activities normally begin Memorial Day with a BBQ, Memorial Hall ceremony, and parade. Throughout the summer they host a plant sale, car wash, pancake breakfast, golf tournament, jazz concert, and Farmers Day Fair booth. They also deliver free lunches throughout the summer for summer programs to kids in need. The club provides volunteers for Chamber of Commerce events, Mount Snow events, and the Southern Vermont Wildlife Museum events.

Due to COVID, all of this has changed drastically. Every Rotary fundraising event has been canceled for the summer. All volunteer projects have also been canceled or postponed. Instead of meeting in person, meetings are held weekly on Zoom, which has been a learning curve for many Rotarians. The Deerfield Club had to find a way to continue to serve the community without putting any of it's members at risk.

The first project initiated was purchasing art supplies for kids in need, who were suddenly not able to attend school. This was

done in conjunction with the Food for Kids Program.

The second project was the collection of Thank You and Cheerful cards for first responders and nursing home residents. Hundreds of cards were collected and delivered.

The next project was in collaboration with the Lions Club. Banners were made up which thanked First Responders and Essential Workers, and were hung in locations in three towns.

A phone chain was set up to check on seniors or those living alone, and a resource guide made up with phone numbers for various help organizations

From the beginning of COVID, though, the main project of the Deerfield Club was making face masks and providing them at various locations in Wilmington and West Dover. Each mask was packed in a bag with cleaning information and the Rotary address. All donations benefited the Deerfield Valley Food Pantry. More than \$2,500 was collected for the food pantry and more than 1,000 masks were made.

Planned parade canceled due to rising COVID-19 cases in county

The ongoing presence of the COVID-19 pandemic has forced all traditional Fourth of July events to be canceled or moved to socially distanced or virtual formats. But even a coronavirus can t wipe out the patriotic spirit of proud Americans, as witnessed by all the red, white and blue decorations going up and all the proudly displayed U.S. Flags.

The Rotary Club of Healdsburg Sunrise thought they had a really good idea to replace their traditional Family Fourth in the Healdsburg Plaza. But their plans to have a citywide parade of city of Healdsburg public safety vehicles and decorated cars with selected viewing areas in a half dozen locations has now been called due to recent increases in COVID-19 positive cases.

Now that plan for this Saturday, July 4 is to have a **\$**Roll-Thru Rotary 4th**\$** where families are encouraged to drive to the Healdsburg Community Center from 10 a.m. to 12 noon to pick up patriotic goodie bags form volunteering Rotarians and city workers. Everyone is encouraged to decorate their vehicles and the event will be live-streamed on the city of Healdsburg**\$** YouTube channel.

Strict adherence to the COVID-19 safety rules followed by the city for distribution of food at the same site will be followed. Cars will be appropriately spaced, all participants will be wearing masks and gloves, and as much as possible social distancing of at least 6 feet will prevail. The activity bags will be placed in the rear compartment of vehicles as they pass through the line in an orderly fashion.

Rotary club holds 100 Holes of Golf Tournament

A New Hampshire rotary club held its annual golf tournament Friday, but it was far from a routine round of golf.

The Amherst Country Club played host to the 26th annual 100 Holes of Golf Tournament on Friday, the biggest fundraiser of the year for the Milford Rotary Club. To adhere to COVID-19 guidelines, there were alterations, but with 56 golfers, it was the event's biggest year yet.

"The social distancing caused us to be creative and pivot, think out of the box on how to still have our event," said tournament chairman Doug Knott.

Each golfer has to sell \$1,000 worth of raffle tickets to play. The tournament will raise more than \$100,000 this year and close to \$1.5 million in its 26 years.

The money is distributed monthly to local charities and also funds scholarships for area students.

"So, we have high school students that apply every year, and we try to help them the best we can," said Paula Telage, of the Milford Rotary Club.

In order to fit 100 holes of golf into one day, the groups play 18 holes in about 2� hours. The entire tournament takes about 13 hours to complete.

"It is a long day, but if you're having a good day, you get in a rhythm and everything flows nicely," said golfer Julie Chareth. "We're working on that rhythm, but it's worth it for the Milford Rotary.

Joe Clement, 85, of the Henniker Rotary Club, consistently raises the most money of all golfers.

"This is year number 23, and so far, I've made them all," he said.


