Debbie was named President of the Newton County Chamber of Commerce June 1, 2020. Prior to that, she has filled several roles at the Chamber since starting there in 2013. In that time, membership has grown by approximately 35%, the Chamber became a Georgia Certified Chamber in 2015 and a 4-Star United States Accredited Chamber in 2018. Only 3% of Chambers in the county have this honor. In June 2019, Debbie graduated from the United States Chamber Institute for Organizational Management, earning her the IOM designation. IOM is a four year program designed to enhance individual performance, elevate professional standards, and recognize association professionals, chamber of commerce professionals, and other non-profit professionals, who demonstrate the knowledge essential to the practice of non-profit management. In addition to her chamber responsibilities, she is also serves on the Georgia Association of Chamber of Commerce Executives Board, the Newton County Industrial Development Authority, Newton County Tomorrow Executive Board the Newton College & Career Academy Advisory Board and the Newton County Drug Free Community Coalition.

Debbie has BS degrees from Berry College in Family and Consumer Science and from the University of Georgia in Textiles Merchandising & Interiors. She was a REALTOR serving Newton County and the surrounding areas for 20 years before joining the Chamber team full time.

Debbie & her husband Lance are life-long, 4th generation residents of Newton County, where they are raising their three sons: Dos, a Junior at the University of Georgia, Lucas, a Freshman at Georgia Tech and Sam, a Sophomore at Eastside High school. Debbie & Lance have strong family roots in Porterdale & Covington and are active members of Stewart Community Church.

Rotary Club Donates StoryWalk At Peoria Library's Lincoln Branch

Officials from the Peoria Public Library and the Rotary Club of Peoria hold a ribbon-cutting ceremony for a new StoryWalk feature Friday at the library's Lincoln branch.

Officials from the Peoria Public Library and the Rotary Club of Peoria believe a new feature at the library's Lincoln branch serves as a testament to a shared commitment to literacy.

A new outdoor StoryWalk leading to the building's entrance will make a difference for thousands of children in the area, according to Peoria Public Library Executive Director Randall Yelverton.

◆ It will become an extension of the library ◆ a place where, like our other StoryWalks, we can host strolling story time, picnics and outdoor crafts, ◆ Yelverton said Friday during a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

◆ It will be an attention grabber, and it will remind those of all ages the pleasure of reading a beautiful illustrated storybook. ◆

The outdoor attraction has already caught the eye of some residents from the area.

◆I've already had some neighbors come out, and they're wondering ◆what is this?◆ and I say, ◆it's a StoryWalk,◆◆ said Cynthia Smith, Lincoln branch manager. ◆So, it's another way of sharing the story with the child. We're excited about it and the neighborhood is excited about it.◆



Current Rotary Club President Brad Stegall and past president Maggie Freidag joined Yelverton, Smith and others at the ceremony.

◆The theme of Rotary is service above self, and one of those ways that we serve the community is through literacy. This is a perfect example of that,◆ said Stegall.

Freidag said the feature will be especially beneficial for students from Trewyn Middle School.

◆Being able to partner with the Peoria Public Library and install this storybook walk really is a great fit for our club, and also the library,◆ said Freidag. ◆We look forward to bringing our Trewyn kids here that we read with and share that with them. I know I look forward to bringing my children here and sharing the stories.◆

Freidag said the StoryWalk at the Lincoln branch had been planned for a little more than a year but was delayed by circumstances surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.

◆So being here today and seeing it all finished is really, really wonderful,◆ she said.

Yelverton said accepting the donation to the library made him gracious, while also making him proud to be a Rotarian. He touted the StoryWalk for its accessibility and noted it is free for everyone to enjoy.



◆ Rotary has a strong commitment to education and to literacy, and that really dovetails well with the library's ongoing mission, ◆ he said. ◆ It's been a great partnership, and we're glad it was able to reach some fruition with this installation. ◆

Burnsville Breakfast Rotary golf event a success

The 26th annual Burnsville Breakfast Rotary Golf Tournament and Fundraiser was held Aug. 12 at the Crystal Lake Golf Course. The day started with rain and delayed the start for the 100 golfers until about 12:30 p.m.

The event raised over \$13,000 that will be given to support the COVID-19 relief initiatives of the following local organizations: M.O.M.S. Program, Community 191 Food Pantry, 360 Communities Burnsville Food Shelf and Burnsville YMCA Community Meals Program. Since March, these organizations have provided over 40,000 meals, served over 27,000 individuals, and provided over 500,000 pounds of groceries in the Burnsville area. Since inception, this tournament has helped to raise over \$500,000 to support various local programs and scholarships.

Rotary youth exchange ♦ one of the many programs for youths and young adults that we celebrate this month ♦ was my path into true engagement in Rotary. My wife, Susanne, and I began hosting exchange students soon after I joined, and the experience helped me go from simply being a member of my Rotary club to being a true Rotarian. Now Rotary Youth Exchange is a family tradition, and a strong one: Over the past 24 years, we have hosted 43 students!

From the start, we loved it so much that, in addition to hosting students in our home, we became involved with the program by helping to organize student summer camps. During one such camp, I met Christine Lichtin, who was a German high school student at the time and whose father is a past president of my Rotary club. To try something new during this year of embracing change, I am turning this space, normally reserved for the president of Rotary, over to Christine so she can share her story.

My first contact with Rotaract was about 13 years ago, when I was with Susanne and Holger at a barbecue for the summer youth camp. Holger turned to me and said: "Why don't you visit a Rotaract club? You'll meet a lot of great young people who come together to have fun and to make a difference."

A few years later, when I was at Trier University, his words came back to me and I decided to give it a try. That was more than eight years ago, and I'm still at it. Once you are in Rotaract, you just don't want to get out. Rotaract has accompanied me everywhere, starting with the Trier club and then on to a club in Bologna, Italy, during the year I studied there. When I was in Kiel for my master's degree, I got involved with Rotaract there before landing at the Rotaract Club of Hamburg-Alstertal as I began my career. Each of those clubs has its own identity and focus, but all have the same intrinsic motivation.

I am now taking on a senior advisory role in my Rotaract club, which I really enjoy. I carry Rotaract in my heart, and it shapes my values, even as my interests evolve. One day, as if she had sensed this evolution, Susanne knocked on my door, wanting to introduce me to a young, modern Rotary club located between Hamburg and Mönchen, my hometown. The E-Club of Hamburg-Connect, which Susanne helped charter, holds e-meetings, all of them very relaxed and personal. With members of different ages, everything just seemed to fit, so I thought, why not try it out? After all, time is precious and should be filled with fun whenever possible; the rest happens by itself.

Now I am in both worlds ♦ a proud member of Rotaract and a Rotarian. And my small personal goal is to build a bridge between these two parallel worlds. All of us have very similar reasons for being part of the Rotary family.

It took some persistence to persuade Christine to become a member of Rotary, but it was well worth the effort. It is our duty to put in this kind of effort with youth program participants and Rotaractors so we can keep them in the family of Rotary. I hope you were inspired by her story. It's up to each of us to ensure that more young people like Christine can experience the many ways Rotary Opens Opportunities for us and for the people we serve.
