For over 20 years, Tina has been enabling programs around the world to maximize impact and reach out to those most in need. A native of Reidsville, Georgia, USA. She attended Georgia Southern University. After graduation, she moved to Atlanta and continued her education and worked in the financial sector and eventually made her way into real estate. She is a licensed agent with Coldwell Banker Lake Oconee Realty serving the Lake Oconee area. In addition, she continues to operate Barefoot Mountain Farms providing Fraser fir Christmas trees and greenery to schools and civic clubs throughout the Southeast. An advocate for reforestation she established the DavisHollcroft Family Forestry Scholarship at the University of Georgia. This scholarship is presented annually to a student studying at UGA s Warnell School of Forestry & Natural Resources.

In her spare time, she enjoys running, golf, spending time with family and friends and serving in her community and around the world. Instead of letting a pandemic cancel its annual charity fundraising event, Smyrna Rotary improvised with a "drive-by" format for this year's Wings of Freedom Fish Fry on Saturday.

Cars lined up on the road in front of the Smyrna Airport for curbside meals instead of gathering inside a hangar.

"It looks different this year, but we're making it successful," said Amanda Johnstone, Smyrna Rotary Club president.

The goal this year was \$125,000, and Johnstone said she would be "over the moon excited (if the goal was met)."

This year the club plans to give the biggest portion of funds raised to build an <u>all-inclusive playground</u> that should be ready sometime in 2021. Johnstone said they hope to break ground by the end of 2020.

Proceeds from the fish fry also benefit local nonprofits like the Boys and Girls Clubs of Rutherford County and Nourish Food Bank. Since 2003, Smyrna Rotary has raised \$1.4 million for local charities.

"Organizations that benefit the most need our help more than ever. Many of these organizations have really stepped up and filled the needs of the community. We knew if we canceled the event, it would have devastating effects on other people," Johnstone said. "We couldn't let our organizations down."

Encinitas Rotary Club helps build new exhibit at Heritage Museum

A nearly century-old postal wagon will be sheltered in a structure built by Encinitas Rotary Club members.

The Encinitas Rotary Club made some sidewalk repairs and helped construct a new exhibit at the San Dieguito Heritage Museum on Aug. 29 for the club s Rotarians at Work Day.

The new exhibit includes an approximately 100-year-old postal wagon that used to be carried by horse. The Rotary Club members built a small wooden enclosure where the wagon, which had been in storage for a long time, will be housed.

The project was originally scheduled to be completed in April, but it had to be postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The museum�s new additions will complement the replica row of old fashioned storefronts that adorn the property.

♦Our vision for this is that this area here would be wonderful for family events and gatherings such as weddings,♦ said Kerry Witkin, a Rotary Club member, referring to the area by the museum♦s general store replica.

About 15 Rotary Club members worked on the new sidewalk and exhibit from about 7:30 a.m. to noon. The club has more than 80 members total.

♦For some of the people who have been in town for a long time, it ♦s a reflection of their childhood memories, ♦ Witkin said about the various displays and artifacts at the museum. ♦They come in here and they see things that may have belonged to their grandparents or great grandparents.◆

The display already in place at the Heritage Museum includes the facades of a barbershop, cafe, real estate office and fire station

♦ People can come by here and they♦II recognize things from their past or from their ancestors♦ past,♦ Witkin said. ♦ And that♦s just the modern era.♦

The historic Teten House, for example, is located on the museum sproperty. Named for Fred Teten, a blacksmith who bought the home in the 1890s, the house served as a school when it was built the decade prior. It was restored about five years ago by Dave Oakley, an Encinitas resident and Rotary Club member who died last October.

The Heritage Museum also has artifacts, including tools made from stones and bone, that date back to Native American inhabitants of the land.

One of the Rotary Club so goals is to make sure local residents know about it and make a point to visit.

♦We want the community to, No.1, know that it♦s here, know that we♦re here, and they can come by and tour the museum and discover something that♦s been in their backyard for a long time,♦ Witkin said.

Rotary youth exchange � one of the many programs for youths and young adults that we celebrate this month � was my path into true engagement in Rotary. My wife, Susanne, and I began hosting exchange students soon after I joined, and the experience helped me go from simply being a member of my Rotary club to being a true Rotarian. Now Rotary Youth Exchange is a family tradition, and a strong one: Over the past 24 years, we have hosted 43 students!

From the start, we loved it so much that, in addition to hosting students in our home, we became involved with the program by helping to organize student summer camps. During one such camp, I met Christine Lichtin, who was a German high school student at the time and whose father is a past president of my Rotary club. To try something new during this year of embracing change, I am turning this space, normally reserved for the president of Rotary, over to Christine so she can share her story.

My first contact with Rotaract was about 13 years ago, when I was with Susanne and Holger at a barbecue for the summer youth camp. Holger turned to me and said: "Why don't you visit a Rotaract club? You'll meet a lot of great young people who come together to have fun and to make a difference."

A few years later, when I was at Trier University, his words came back to me and I decided to give it a try. That was more than eight years ago, and I'm still at it. Once you are in Rotaract, you just don't want to get out. Rotaract has accompanied me everywhere, starting with the Trier club and then on to a club in Bologna, Italy, during the year I studied there. When I was in Kiel for my master's degree, I got involved with Rotaract there before landing at the Rotaract Club of Hamburg-Alstertal as I began my career. Each of those clubs has its own identity and focus, but all have the same intrinsic motivation.

I am now taking on a senior advisory role in my Rotaract club, which I really enjoy. I carry Rotaract in my heart, and it shapes my values, even as my interests evolve. One day, as if she had sensed this evolution, Susanne knocked on my door, wanting to introduce me to a young, modern Rotary club located between Hamburg and Melin, my hometown. The E-Club of Hamburg-Connect, which Susanne helped charter, holds e-meetings, all of them very relaxed and personal. With members of different ages, everything just seemed to fit, so I thought, why not try it out? After all, time is precious and should be filled with fun whenever possible; the rest happens by itself.

Now I am in both worlds � a proud member of Rotaract and a Rotarian. And my small personal goal is to build a bridge between these two parallel worlds. All of us have very similar reasons for being part of the Rotary family.

It took some persistence to persuade Christine to become a member of Rotary, but it was well worth the effort. It is our duty to put in this kind of effort with youth program participants and Rotaractors so we can keep them in the family of Rotary. I hope you were inspired by her story. It's up to each of us to ensure that more young people like Christine can experience the many ways Rotary Opens Opportunities for us and for the people we serve.
