Air Show is Back!

Sam Carver gave us a quick update on the role the airport plays in our county, Our facility is one of the top 80 general aviation airports in the country. Covering over 900 acres the airport has been a fixture in the area for almost 90 years! The Kruegers flew their fishing buddies in to chase the elusive Sailfish! Today we have private aircraft, charters and Coastguard and Sheriff personnel on the site.

Sam estimated that over 3,000 jobs



are connected to the facility including Triumph, Paradigm and their support staff. The personnel onsite provide services to all aircraft. General Aviation fuel sales are up 20% (\$5.5 million) over last year. Economic Impact is \$700 million to the community. The facility is self-reliant with fees, grants and state funds covering the improvements.

The Customs facility continues to be a major tenant and the traffic is increasing each year.

Sam introduced Skylar Gorman who is the Exec. Director of the Stuart

Air Show. She grew up in the area and attended Clark and South Fork. She stepped into that role in January 2019 and has had her hands full as the only paid staff member of the nonprofit.

Skylar said that they plan to have 600 volunteers working that weekend and the interest is building. The fundraiser earlier this spring raised \$100,000 and sponsors are lining up to help.

She has been working with JDParker teachers to help their STEAM team to use the program as an educational tool for the community. Over 150 highschoolers got a free plane ride last weekend.

Plans call for the Military to provide an F-16, an F-18 and a C17 for static display. RedBull aeroteam will also be performing along with many of your favorites. Check stuartairshow.com for updates!

Using images to create club's visual stories:

Images are used to visually describe one's mission.

Tips for good images:

Shows diversity; club members in action; interacting with one another; smiling (look for joy and connection)

Use composition techniques - clean images; shoot from different angles; get close (use telephoto if needed); take both vertically and horizontally

Lighting - use a well lit space, shoot outdoor scenes after sunrise and before sunset - avoid mid day

You don't need expensive equipment - a cell phone works very well; explore tips online for use of cell phone

Have fun; get people involved with helping you take a good image; they can chat with person while you shoot

Remember:

When photographing people - get permission. This is especially important when taking images of children before posting to social media.

A good source of images is at the RI website - Brand Center.

Another way to create your own is by going to www.poaphotos.com. The People of Action (POA) Editor is a web application to edit and modify photos, particularly for the Rotary International #PeopleOfAction Campaign. The app is designed to work through your internet browser on your desktop or mobile device.
