We are competing on the wrong field of play if our identity is to compete against service clubs that do primarily local projects. Rotary has human and financial resources, which far, far outpace other organizations, to serve communities in every corner of the world. Josh the Baby Otter Water Safety Program

The "Josh the Baby Otter" Water Safety Program is designed to keep children safe around the water and to prevent accidental drowning of children, which is the #1 cause of accidental death in children under the age of 5 years old, and the second leading cause of death in children under the age of 14 (second only to the #1 cause: car accidents).

Beginning in early childhood, water safety education teaching children that they should **NEVER BE AROUND THE WATER WITHOUT AN ADULT** can help save lives. The children's book, Josh the Baby Otter, is a story about a young otter who learns to float on his back in the water by being taught by his mother. He also is never in or near the water without his mother or a buddy. Joshua's Foundation provides every child with a Josh the Baby Otter coloring book and sticker, to further reinforce this water safety message and remind the children of what they learned from Josh.

Led by Christine Moreno, our Stuart Rotary Club members are introducing the Josh the Baby Otter Water Safety Program to area children under the age of 6 at our local public libraries.
