Birthday memories: Mel Ora is the only member with a birthday in July. His favorite memory? Every birthday, because he's still here!

Member Spotlight: Welch Agnew was born in Memphis, TN, and was in the hospital for 6 weeks with polio in 1949. Growing up, he played basketball and baseball, with a little football thrown in. He received an appointment to West Point, graduating #1 in his class...alphabetically. He was assigned to Ft. Bragg (NC) where he learned to jump out of airplanes and become a trained killer as a ranger. Assignments in Washington and Detroit followed, along with flight school as he tried to figure out what he wanted to do. 1200 hours in the sky flying a fixed wing in Vietnam came next before he returned to CA and played a lot of golf. Grad school in Madrid for a Masters in Spanish allowed him to return to West Point as an instructor. Vet School at University of TN and a health professional scholarship to Puerto Rico were followed by a position in Copenhagen, where he inspected sardine plants in Scandinavia. Inspections in Greenland, which is huge and NOT green, were toughest, as roads were scarce and planes and boat schedules might

only be weekly. Norway was his favorite country. Back to San Antonio for a Master in Public Health, followed by War College, back to Ft. Bragg, then Ft. Lee (VA) where he was responsible for the safety of commissaries throughout the world. Two years in Korea preceded his assignment to the surgeon general's office in DC. Retirement followed, with a house in Dunedin and another career heading up Pinellas County Animal Services. Welch retired from Pinellas County but still volunteers his vet skills in spaying and neutering cats and dogs. Welch and his wife, Carol Ann, celebrated 55 years of marriage—40 of them together. She went everywhere with him but Vietnam. Asked about moving so many times, welch said it was a breeze, because the army loads up everything for you. The 23 years spent in Dunedin is the longest he has lived anywhere.

Foundation Awards: Welch is also Foundation chair and segued into giving out recently received awards. **Jaquelin Nuila** received her PHF+2 and Prez **John Tornga**, his PHF+1.

Program: Roy Jones of Eckerd Connects gave an update on services provided by the organization. While many of us are familiar with Raising Hope, the clothing and supply closet, Eckerd Connects provides much more to troubled youth. A sad statistic: 1/2 of kids in foster care will be homeless, 1/2 of those in prison and 1/2 of those will lose their own children into foster care. Skid Row began in LA, where the services for the poor and hungry were limited to a 4-block radius, stretching 16 blocks today. But Skid Row is not just in LA. It happens everywhere. Eckerd Connects has a presence in 20 states with 140 unique programs and over 2000 employees, whose mission is to connect at-risk kids with opportunities to learn skills and a work ethic to break the cycle of poverty.

Joe Mackin, another of our newest Rotarians, did a great job leading us in our 5-Way Test.

Food bags fill void left by pandemic

I am on a small boat fully loaded with food bags headed for the people of St. Helene, a small island about two miles long and one mile wide, separated by a canal from the island of Roatan. Roatan is the largest of the Bay Islands located off the northern coast of Honduras.

As the waves are striking our boat, my thoughts wander to the approximate 1,000 people in 218 households who are in need of the food we're delivering. Many of whom have no income because they lost their jobs due to the COVID-19 pandemic. St. Helene has no roads and no infrastructure. Its people are descendants of African slaves brought by the British to Jamaica and the Cayman Islands who then migrated to Roatan after gaining their freedom in the 1830's.

Last year they got electricity for the first time. And 14 months ago, as the first part of a Rotary global grant, members completed a fresh water project. Phase two of the grant has been approved.

We landed on a Friday in September 2020 at a dock that was built by grant money and the effort of Rotary members. Our trip could not have happened without funds from the Rotary Club of Oakville Trafalgar (Ontario) and the Rotary Club of Evergreen (Colorado).

In addition to the food, we provided 600 N95 masks and 250 face shields to residents of

St. Helene thanks to a donation from Michael McCarry of Mount Sinai Hospitals in New York City. A special thanks to Sterling Lucas and his boat captains who brought us to the island.

The islanders received their bags of provisions as they were checked off of a list. They then loaded into their boats and flipped up their umbrellas and went back to their homes either by sea or along crooked paths around the island. The bags will provide each family with enough food to live on for about a month.

Rotary Around the World

USA: In October, about a dozen Rotarians from the Rotary Club of Eau Claire Morning, Wisconsin, along with some of their family members, used a product called Invisible Spray to stencil temporary, water-activated artwork on sidewalks throughout the city. Rainworks, manufacturer of the hydrophobic, nontoxic liquid spray, donated the product, which allows users to create designs that only appear when the sidewalks get wet. At a cost of about \$130, 16 ounces can cover up to 110 square feet. "We thought in the difficult times of the pandemic, we could bring smiles to our community" and inspire other organizations to do the same, says Sarah Stackhouse, a co-president of the



club. A "thank you" below an image of a firefighter's hat was traced outside a fire station, while a drawing at the entrance to a theater featured musical notes and suggested "singing in the rain."
