



Priscilla's life has four pillars: Strength for her mom, Courage for her father, Wisdom for time, and Faith with daily Bible readings. Her parents were born in the 1920's, with her father being a 3rd generation owner of an optical business in Syracuse. In the 1940's, when her father was shipped to France, her mother, pregnant with Priscilla, went to live with her parents in Rome, NY. Her father was assigned the duty of removing dogtags from the dead at the Battle of the Bulge. Priscilla was joined by a brother and sister and grew up in Manlius, a cow-kicker town, as she calls it. Her mother made them wear rubber galoshers to keep their shows clean, but being embarrassed, Priscilla stowed hers under the bushes at the bus stop, then

putting them back on to return home. The had two horses, a couple of dogs, chickens and vicious geese. Celebrate Community, a joint initiative of the four major volunteer service organizations, will launch this year with a focus on local community service during the week of October 10 to 16, which was last week.

The organizations – Kiwanis International, Lions Clubs International, Optimist International, and Rotary International – have collaborated during the past 18 months to share ideas on future collaborations. This first public effort encourages clubs to reach out to one another to work together on projects that improve and benefit local communities.

"All of our organizations serve our communities to change lives. We must ensure that our various clubs identify a local need and work together to provide the service to fulfill that need," said Shekhar Mehta, President, Rotary International. "We have so many common goals and objectives," said Peter Mancuso, 2021-22 Kiwanis International president. "The Celebrate Community initiative is one way to join together to work on a project that will have a measurable impact on communities around the world." "We can help the world recover in this time of need when many are still struggling," said Douglas X. Alexander, International President for Lions Clubs International. "If we let our passion for service shine through, there is absolutely nothing we can't accomplish together."

Patsy Garner, 2021-2022 Optimist International President, supports the effort to encourage all service clubs working together to help their communities. "Now, more than ever, collaboration is needed. Resources can be scarce and a joint effort could make a far greater impact in our

communities than a single act."

Clubs are encouraged to work together on projects such as health and wellness, food insecurity and hunger, education and literacy and environmental projects. Efforts could include community cleanups, food donations and distributions, walks or runs to raise money for specific causes and collecting books to help children build personal libraries. Clubs should follow all local guidelines for meetings and gatherings. Clubs that involve youth participants should follow organizational youth protection guidelines. All four of the leaders said this initial effort is a springboard to the future — they envision an annual project in which all the clubs around the world collaborate and bring their youth clubs along, too. The joint project also allows community members who are serving in different clubs to learn more about each other, their organizations and their combined efforts to help children and adults who are challenged by environmental or financial difficulties.
