#### Club banner exchanges showcase local flair, global friendship



One of Rotary s most colorful traditions is members exchanging club banners. Clubs display their own decorative banners at meetings and district events, and Rotarians who travel to other countries often take these banners to exchange with the clubs they visit.

The banners often include symbols or images of a club stown, region, or country. Some represent local cultural traditions or artistry by featuring leatherwork, weaving, embroidery, or hand-painted designs. Many of the banners are works of art in themselves.

Exchanging banners became so popular that the Rotary International Board of Directors was concerned that the practice would place a financial burden on clubs. In 1959, it urged members to �exercise discretion, moderation, and measured judgment in making provision for such exchanges. �

Today, the tradition continues as a way for clubs to express their friendship.

The approximately 20,000 banners in Rotary s archives reflect clubs hometown pride and their connection to Rotary International.

What is the Rotarian of the Month award?

This award is designated for the Rotarian who has clearly stood out in demonstrating "Service Above Self" and commitment to the Four-Way Test each month.

A nominee should be an outstanding club member who has made significant contributions to the mission and operation of our club, and to one or more avenues of Community or International Service. The Actarian of the Month award should be given to a member who exhibits Service Above Self in their daily activities and who promotes Rotary by their actions and involvements.

#### Eligibility

The candidate must be an active member of the Rotary Club of Englewood, and in good standing.

The Rotarian making the nomination must provide a completed form in order to support his/her nomination.

Each question will be scored through a point system (1-5) for a total of 20 available points.

If nominee(s) are not selected all nominations will roll over to the next month to be considered with any new applications that are received.

Starting out as a parent volunteer, she soon began to assist behind the scenes. When the Englewood YMCA was founded in 1994, she was hired as an employee and her responsibilities grew over time, helping the YMCA develop and implement ways to meet the needs of individuals and the community and has been Executive Branch Director since 2019. Kids are her passion, so one of her favorite programs is being able to support the Y Reads program to assist children struggling with their reading skills. She built relationships with donors to support the organization of growth and organized the annual fundraiser, Topical Nights, which has provided millions of dollars in scholarship assistance to those in the Englewood community. She was instrumental in programs such as swim lessons through the Rotary so losh the Otter Water Safety Program, Back to School resources, and summer camp through Kids Needs of Greater Englewood.
