One Day. One Focus: End Polio NOW

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. Our goal of ridding the world of this disease is closer than ever.

As a founding partner of the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u>, we've reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.1 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary s advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion to the effort.

Today, polio remains endemic only in Afghanistan and Pakistan. But it scrucial to continue working to keep other countries poliofree. If all eradication efforts stopped today, within 10 years, polio could paralyze as many as 200,000 children each year.

The Jacksonville office of Catholic Charities has a refugee resettlement program and is resettling 200 Afghan refugees through March 2022. (*Note: Catholic Charities is committed to serving everyone regardless of faith* • 97 percent of its clients are non-Catholic • and does not proselytize to its clients.)

- An appointment is necessary, however the process normally takes less than 15 minutes once we have all required documents:
  - Government issued photo ID (SF Student ID does not qualify)
  - The discrimination and harassment training certificate of completion (training available at: <u>https://learn.ue.org/</u> QV8DU191622/SFCEmployee).
  - You will also be fingerprinted at this time. Please let me know what day/time you are available between the hours of 9:00am and 3:30 pm, and I will see what we have available on our calendar, in order to find a date and time that works for both of us.

- Fellowships must be international in nature with active members in at least three countries
- . So Each fellowship elects at least three officers to oversee the group s administration.

Fellowships are expected to facilitate communication among their members and maintain regular communication with RI.
