RAIN BARREL OFFER

Want to help conserve and preserve our precious water?
CHECK THIS OUT!



ALACHUA COUNTY, FL - The Alachua County Environmental Protection Department is pleased to announce they are now offering Ivy rain barrels at a discounted price to encourage residents to conserve precious water resources and to protect water quality.

Rain barrels capture rainwater from rooftops that would typically be sent down the storm drain carrying potential contaminants and contributing to flooding. Water collected can be used for watering landscape plants and can help conserve water for our springs and rivers. The cumulative effect of rain barrels implemented throughout a geographic area can have a positive impact on stormwater management and water quality.

The retail price is \$129.00, but through this special promotion, Ivy Rain Barrels are on sale for \$75. The rain barrels must be purchased directly through the [program's website](https://www.rainwatersolutions.com/products/alachua) using a credit card by December 6, 2020.



Ivy rain barrels are made in the USA of 100% recycled plastic. The dimensions are 42.5" high x 22" wide by 18" long. All parts are included (including a 3/4" ball valve, which connects to a garden hose).

Rain barrels will be available for pick up on December 12, from 9 a.m. until noon at the Alachua County Hazardous Waste Collection Center (5125 N.E. 63rd Ave., 2 miles north of 39th Avenue, off Waldo Road). While picking up rain barrels, visitors can take the opportunity to drop off hazardous wastes such as paints, CFLs, broken holiday light strings, and old electronics at the collection center. This will be a drive-thru event, and masks will be required.




Rotary Citation


Small Club Fund Giving

MONUMENTAL ACCOMPLISHMENT

African region declared free of wild poliovirus



Rotary and its GPEI partners celebrate a monumental achievement, say global eradication of wild polio is possible with the continued dedication and persistence of Rotarians

The World Health Organization (WHO) on 25 August announced that transmission of the wild poliovirus has officially been stopped in all 47 countries of its African region. This is a historic and vital step toward global eradication of polio, which is Rotary's top priority.

After decades of hard won gains in the region, Rotary and its partners in the [Global Polio Eradication Initiative](#) (GPEI) ♦ WHO, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and Gavi, the vaccine alliance ♦ are proclaiming the milestone an achievement in public health. They offer it as proof that strong commitment, coordination, and perseverance can rid the world of polio.
