Welcome PDG Cynde Covington to Present Haiti HANwash Project

PDG Cynde Covington lives the Rotary way of life! She has been a Rotary International Training Leader, a Member at Large of the Council of Legislation Operations Committee, GETS Trainer, a Zone 34 Assistant Rotary Coordinator, and the Zone 34 End Polio Now Coordinator. She has led multiple International NID Teams to India to deliver the polio vaccine. She has led multiple Governor Elect and HANWASH teams to Haiti, and has personally participated in TRF projects in India, Haiti, Nicaragua and the USA, She is a frequent speaker/presenter at convention breakouts, conferences, training workshops, PETS, and clubs. Her enthusiasm is contagious as she educates, mentors, encourages, and inspires Rotarians in all aspects of Rotary. Cynde is currently an integral part of the HANWASH Steering Committee serving as the Vice Chair for the HANWASH 501c3 as well as serving on the Zone 33/34 Executive Committee.

Half of Haiti's water and sanitation infrastructure is simply not functioning. The country has been a frequent recipient of aid funding, most of which sadly only focuses on creating relief providing temporary fixes to the problems that exist rather than building the systems necessary for the country to function. The end result of aid funding is this: A survey of 1,096 water kiosks and 2,266 water fountains by DINEPA in 2013 showed that more than half of existing water kiosks are out of service and only 58.4% of existing water fountains inventoried are functional. Haiti Outreach in 2004, stated that over 40% of wells are non-functioning. A sustainable solution is needed for Haiti that can serve as a blueprint for other developing countries as well.

As Haiti work towards meeting the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDG 6), they need partners to help build the systems that will move the country forward. This will stabilize the rapidly changing political climate in Haiti and is a significant reason why the HANWASH initiative is needed and the reason why so much time and effort has been invested in building a resilient relationship with the Haitian Government WASH agency DINEPA, along with its Directeur General and Team. Despite political changes, HANWASH's relationship with DINEPA remains strong.

The intention of HANWASH is simply to facilitate the creation of safely managed access to financially sustainable, potable water and sanitation to every household in Haiti. More specifically, by 2030, HANWASH would ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all through:

- Universal and equitable access to safe and affordable drinking water
- Access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene
- Long term commitment and engagement of local communities to support and strengthen improvements and management

This task requires a systems approach, not simply creating infrastructure, but establishing a framework of accountability, responsibility and transparency that works to enroll partners and create clear lines of authority and responsibility that result in technically sound, revenue and positive, safely managed infrastructure.

Did You Know?

THE OFFICIAL ROTARY FLAG...

An official flag was formally adopted by Rotary International at the 1929 Convention in Dallas, Texas. The Rotary flag consists of a white field with the official wheel emblem emblazoned in gold in the center of the field. The four depressed spaces on the rim of the Rotary wheel are colored royal blue. The words "Rotary" and "International" printed at the top and bottom depressions on the wheel rim are also gold. The shaft in the hub and the key way of the wheel are white.

The first official Rotary flag reportedly was flown in Kansas City Missouri, in January 1915. In 1922 a small Rotary flag was carried over the South Pole by Admiral Richard Byrd, a member of the Winchester, Virginia Rotary Club. Four years later, the admiral carried a Rotary flag in his expedition to the North Pole. Some Rotary clubs use the official Rotary flag as a banner at club meetings. In these instances it is appropriate to print the words "Rotary Club" above the wheel symbol, and the name of the city, state or nation below the emblem.

Why Do They Call A Cup of Coffee A Cup Of Joe?

Josephus Daniels was appointed Secretary of the Navy by President Woodrow Wilson in 1913. Among his reforms of the Navy were inaugurating the practice of making 100 Sailors from the Fleet eligible for entrance into the Naval Academy, the introduction of women into the service, and the abolishment of the officers' wine mess. From that time on, the strongest drink aboard Navy ships could only be coffee and over the years, a cup of coffee became known as "a cup of Joe".
