Ray Allen Trovillion



Bill Walker spoke in tribute of Allen Trovillion who recently passed away. Mayor, legislator, Rotarian – Allen was a man who reflexively embraced the concept of "service above self" in all phases of his life. No kinder summary can be given than to say "the world is a better place for him having lived". So it was with Allen.

Allen Trovillion was a good and decent man, who loved this community and its institutions. Allen died Tuesday, having been ravaged by cancer and dementia, at the age of 94. It is fitting that we bid him "farewell." Allen grew up in downtown Winter Park, the son of Ray and Pearl Trovillion. He gained his education in building construction at the University of Florida. Allen had eight children, the product of two marriages, and left Vicki as his widow. He had the title of being the longest serving member of the Audubon Park Elementary School PTA.Endorsed by his fellow citizens, Allen served our city as Commissioner and Mayor and our state as a legislator from our area. He was invited to be a member of our Rotary Club in late 1961 and served as our president nine years later. Allen was active until his health decline prohibited his attending. Throughout his life Allen modeled with excellence the values we endorse as Rotarians. Allen was a builder, not only buildings such as the Winter Park Towers (now part of Westminster Winter Park) and numerous churches and public buildings, but of our community and its institutions. Among his favorite construction projects was for his church, the sanctuary of First United Methodist on Interlachen at Morse, under the guidance of Gamble Rogers as architect. Allen was a devoted Christian, and generously and passionately promoted the faith. So, it is fitting to close with these words from Matthew 25: "His master said unto him: Well done good and faithful servant. Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

Zooming through the snow!




