2. History | Our Founders

Rotary Club of Coral Gables was chartered on March 4, 1946.

ROTARY CLUB OF CORAL GABLES

In the beginning...

The Club of Coral Gables was chartered on March 4th, 1946. It was Club Number 6200 on a worldwide basis. The first Rotary Club in Florida was in Jacksonville in the year 1912. It was assigned Club Number 41. Five years later in 1917- The Rotary Club of Miami received its charter and became Club Number 271.

In 1945 the Rotary Club of Miami "gave up" a huge piece of its territory - west of 27th Avenue - extending north and south – to a group who wanted to form a new Rotary Club in the southwest section of the Miami area. W. Keith Phillips-a Miami Rotarian-acted as Special Representative of District Governor Fred M. Bultman; 167th District; in the pre-formative days of days of the Rotary Club of Coral Gables.

Countless meeting were held in the pre-charter months under the leadership of W. Keith Phillips and Dr. Otto J. Sieplein. They patiently explained the aims and objects of Rotary to prospective charter members. These meetings were mostly held at the Country Club of Coral Gables. Gradually a fine group of men was gathered together and application for a charter was presented to Rotary International. W. Keith Phillips acted as Master of Ceremonies.



At the 1917 Rotary International Convention, outgoing Rotary president Arch Klumph proposed setting up an endowment �for the purpose of doing good in the world. � That one idea, and an initial contribution of \$26.50, set in motion a powerful force that has transformed millions of lives around the globe.

The Rotary Foundation is organized as a public charity operated exclusively for charitable purposes and governed by a Board of Trustees. The operations of Rotary International, a member organization, are overseen by its Board of Directors.

The headquarters of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation are in Evanston, Illinois, USA. We have associate foundations in Australia, Brazil, Canada, Germany, India, Japan, and the United Kingdom.

The Paul Harris Fellow Recognition

Our club is official a Paul Harris Club. The Paul Harris Fellow recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name, of \$1,000 to The Rotary Foundation.

Rotary established the recognition in 1957 to encourage and show appreciation for substantial contributions to what was then the Foundation so only program, Rotary Foundation Fellowships for Advanced Study, the precursor to Ambassadorial Scholarships. 4. Why the Pins?

Rotarians are expected to wear a Rotary pin ... not just to club meetings, district meetings and events, and when you travel but everyday. People recognize the emblem. It connects you with other Rotarians throughout the world. Remember, Rotary is an international organization with 1.2 million members world-wide. And for those who are unfamiliar with Rotary, the pin gives us the opportunity to tell the Rotary story and perhaps influence others to join us.

5. What Happens during a Meeting?

- 1. **Invocation**: Members stand for an inspirational message usually without reference to specific religious denominations or faiths.
- 2. Pledge of Allegiance: Members stand and recite the Pledge of Allegiance.
- 3. President's Time: President will take this brief moment to make any announcements or address any matters.
- 4. Happy Dollars: For \$5, Rotarians can have the microphone to tell the club what they are up to, something good that's happened in their lives. It gives our members a chance to share a happy event, i.e. birth of child, marriage, promotion, retirement, being honored in print, an upcoming event they are involved with, or just that they're glad to be alive and with their friends. At the same time, they are donating to our Scholarship Fund, since the proceeds from Happy Dollars all go to fund scholarships for worthy Coral Gables High School Interactors.
- 5. **City Employee of the Month**: The City of Coral Gables recognizes an employee every month who has demonstrated great service to their department or the city residents. We honor those employees at a luncheon with their supervisor. They receive a recognition plaque from Rotary for their vocational service.
- Introduction of Visitors and Guests: A member will introduce all visitors and guests.
- 7. Speaker Program: The Program Chair will introduce the Speaker for the meeting.
- 8. **Announcements**: The President will make any necessary announcements.
- 9. **Thought of the Week**: A Member will say an inspirational thought for the week.
- 10. Dewitt Law Silver Dollars: A member gives out two, dollar coins: the tradition is, one coin goes to the member who first greeted him/her and the other to the fifth member, however, who gets them is always at the discretion of the person making the acknowledgement. This is named for one of our members (who has since passed away) who always provided the dollar coins for this reward.
- 11. **Pin Drawing Gift:** To encourage members to wear their Rotary pin, those who wear one receive a raffle ticket when the official greeter welcomes them to the club meeting. At the end of the meeting, a ticket is drawn and the winner receives a small gift.
- 12. **50/50 Raffle Drawing**: Before the meeting starts, one of the members goes around selling raffle tickets for \$1 each, three for \$2, seven for \$5, etc. It is called 50/50 because 50% of the day's proceeds are awarded to the winning ticket holder and the other 50% goes into a "pot" that continues to grow until is it won. The ticket is drawn, the winner gets the cash from the day and the opportunity to draw the King of Hearts from a deck dedicated to the current pot. Sometimes the pot is won when there's just a few hundred dollars in it. One time the pot got up to \$4,000. The higher the amount in the pot, the more tickets members buy, in an attempt to win it all. If they get the King of Hearts, the winner takes ALL. Often times they donate the money back to the Club, or purchse a Paul Harris Fellowship, or donate it to a specific project. If any other card is drawn, it's discarded and the winner may choose to keep the 50% from the day or donate it back to the club.
- 13. Closure with the Five Way Test: A member closes the meeting by reciting the Five Way Test of things that Coral Gables Rotarians think, say and do. The Four-Way Test is used by Rotarians world-wide as a moral code of ethics for personal and business relationships. In Coral Gables we added a 5th IS IT FUN FOR ALL CONCERNED! Because Coral Gables Rotarians like to have FUN.

6. Types of Memberships

5 Types of Memberships:

- (1) Active Rotary Member: Must attend at least 3 of the events per month. An event may include: weekly meetings, socials, committee meetings, service projects. Fees include the Annual Dues and all lunch meetings. Active Rotary Members receive a Permanent Badge.
- (2) Associate Member: Must attend at least 2 of the events per month. An event may include: weekly meetings, socials, committee meetings, service projects. Fees include the Annual Dues and any lunch meeting the Associate Member attends (pay at the door). Term is one year. At the end of the one year term, it is expected that the associate member become a Rotary Member. Associate Members receive a Temporary Badge.
- (3) Corporate Member: A company may elect a Corporate Membership and name a Primary Member to represent the company. The company may also elect no more than two Alternates to fill in (\$30 registration charge for each alternate). The Primary Member or at least one Alternate must attend at least 2 of the events per month. An event may include: weekly meetings, socials, committee meetings, service projects. Fees include Full Initiation, Annual Dues and any lunch meeting the Primary Member or Alternates attend (pay at the door). If more than one person attends a meeting on behalf of the company, each attendee must pay registration at the door. Corporate Members receive a Permanent Badge.
- (4) Rule of 35 Member: Must be under 35 years old at the time of induction and expires at the 35th birthday (max 10 years). The Rule of 35 Member must attend at least 2 of the events per month. An event may include: weekly meetings, socials, committee meetings, service projects. Fees include reduced Annual Dues and any lunch meeting the Rule of 35 Member attends (pay at the





door).

(5) Rule of 85 Member: Active Rotary Members who meets the following: (1) the sum of his/her age AND the total number of years of membership in one or more clubs equals 85 or more; (2) has been a member of one or more clubs for at least 20 years; and (3) has notified the club Secretary in writing of his/her desire to elect to be a Rule of 85 Member. If approved, participation in events is not required. Fees include the Annual Dues and any lunch meeting the Rule of 85 Member chooses to attend.

7. New Member Application

We take great honor in our members and carefully review all applications to assure each applicant will be a good fit while meeting the expectations of each potential member. We are looking for dedicated and innovative members who represent leadership and committeent to service in the local and/or international communities. 

11. TRF Fundraiser | The Chris Morrison Memorial Golf Ball Drop





In 2010, Bill Gates challenged Rotary International to match his \$25 million donation to eradicate polio. Rotary in turn, challenged every Rotary Club around the world to come up with a fund raiser to answer that challenge. But long before that, one of our past presidents, Christopher Morrison (2004-2005) came up with the Helicopter Golf Ball Drop to raise money for The Rotary Foundation. The idea is to sell numbered golf balls for \$25 each to members throughout our District (6990 runs from the Broward/Palm Beach county line to Key West and includes Grand Bahama Island - some 2,200 members) and then drop them, from a helicopter, onto The Biltmore Golf Course. The three balls that land closest to the 9th hole win the three prizes. Since it's inception in 2004, the Helicopter Golf Ball Drop has raised more than \$500,000 for The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund. Chris passed away unexpectedly in 2016 and District Officials named the Ball Drop in his honor.

12. Fundraisers | From the Old Days

The Rotary Club of Coral Gables has always been known for our generosity. We work hard to raise money for lots of worthy causes beyond Rotary Initiatives. And we do that by coming up with fund raisers. For 15 years, from 1992 through 2007, we produced the annual Rotary Promenade, a progressive dinner that visited different locations throughout Coral Gables. There was food and entertainment at each of the sites. Partiers were taken from one site to another by Trolley. We gave 85% of the proceeds from the Promenade to the Beneficiary of the year. The remaning 15% remained in our Club's Foundation, to help fund the many grants that we give out.



With EWI straining and support, they have opened an agricultural cooperative, which they own, control, and manage. As a cooperative, they chose for their first project to increase their goat herd. A goat serves as a four-legged savings account.

• Project will purchase 13 female goats and 2 male goats. Farmers decided to pay 20% of the price per goat, which will go to the new cooperative to build-up capital. Each family will give the first-year kid to another family who will also pay 20% to the cooperative.


