The following Rotary History bites are from a booklet published by Clifford L. Dochterman, Rotary International President 1992-3 called, "The ABC's of Rotary."



RI's General Secretary

Day-to-day operations of Rotary International's Secretariat are under the supervision of the general secretary, the top professional



officer of Rotary. Although the general secretary is responsible to the RI Board & president, he/she provides ongoing management for nearly 650 staff members at RI World Headquarters and the 7 international offices.

The general secretary serves as secretary to the RI Board and is also the chief executive of the Rotary Foundation, under the supervision of the Foundation Trustees. He is the secretary of all Rotary committees as well as the Council on Legislation, regional conferences, and the annual RI Convention.

The general secretary is appointed by the RI Board for a term of not more than three years, which may be renewed by the Board for a term of up to four years. Since 1910, 10 men have served in that position. Ed Futa was appointed in 2000.

The personal influence and administrative skills of our general secretaries have significantly shaped the course of Rotary programs and activities.

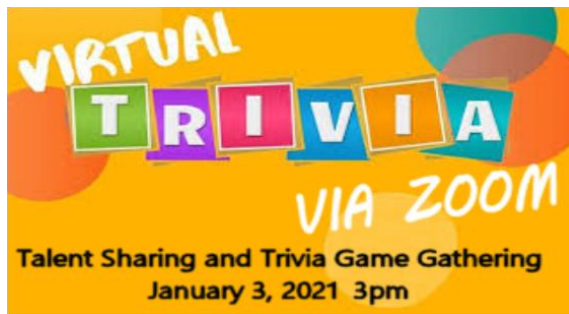

Message from DG Cheryl Matt

Your District 7150 leadership team recently met to discuss our budget for this Rotary year. We are almost halfway through and we have seen a decrease in expenses because of the COVID-19 situation. We are no longer traveling for meetings or events and have moved to virtual for most everything. In addition, we have been notified

by the Empire MDPETS group that they will be holding the Multi-District President-Elect Training this coming spring virtually. As a result, we felt that we should be giving funds back to the clubs.

The following decision has been made for a ONE-TIME deal for the Clubs as follows:

For the January 1 through June 30 period, we will be charging clubs only \$ 5 per member District dues, instead of our normal \$ 20 per member. We will be crediting each club \$ 50 of the \$75 fee they paid for MDPETS with their fall dues. After this credit is applied, in the event a small club owes no money or has a credit coming, that credit will remain on the books for that club to use for their July invoice.

Earth Day Watershed Project

The Rotary Districts that border the Great Lakes have partnered in an international, multi-district service project cleaning up the shores of our waterways. Looking at the watershed maps, the Great Lakes Watershed includes the **Finger Lakes, Oneida Lake, the Erie Canal** and other streams and rivers that empty into the Great Lakes. Did you know that the Great Lakes account for



more than 20% of the world's surface freshwater? Your club can pick a river, lake or any water source that connects to Lake Ontario and plan your own Earth Day event on **Saturday, April 24th**. We're also encouraging clubs to collaborate with other local groups in their clean-up efforts. It will also be a public image opportunity and we hope to have t-shirts for purchase to visually show our joint efforts and identify us as Rotarians. While we celebrate this great achievement, we look to the next goal: to eradicate the wild poliovirus in the two countries where the disease has never been stopped, Afghanistan and Pakistan.



Featured article Rotarian November 2020 Five questions: the right stuff What makes a great global grant application? Nikki Medanovic condensed

The Rotary Foundation introduced global grants in the 2013-14 Rotary year to fund large scale, sustainable activities that are aligned with one or more of Rotary's areas of focus. Abby McNear, a member of the Rotary club of Evanston, Illinois, and grants manager for the Foundation, has seen the program grow tremendously. The number of grants awarded increased by over 50 percent during this time; in 2019-20, 350 global grants were awarded, totaling over \$100 million. McNear, who has worked at Rotary for 23 years, shares her tips for a successful global grant application.



1. What does the ideal global grant application look like? The host community does a nice job with the community assessment. By talking to the people they want to help, Rotarians find out more about the residents' hope for their communities. Ideally, Rotarians will design the project with the people they want to help.
2. What is a common mistake you see in grant applications? Not focusing on the right goal. Rotarians should ensure their project falls within the Foundations goals for one of the areas of focus; these are outlined in or policy statements. These are big goals, but often applicants have much smaller goals in mind. For example, to provide furnishings for a community center. District grants are ideal for those kinds of projects. Ensure that your project aligns with one of the Foundations bigger goals and how you have thought through how to achieve it.

3. What kinds of ineligible expenses should people be aware of? Rotarians often run into a challenge when their projects are just a list of things that an organization needs. Projects involving schools, for example, frequently include equipment. However, the focus of the global grant project should be professional development for the teachers. If your school project is primarily focused on equipment, it won't be eligible for global grant funding. Involving community members in a project is one way to ensure that it is sustainable in the long run.
4. What is the top question you get from Rotarians? How can we find a partner for our project? We tell them to look on Rotary Showcase (rotary.org/showcase) They can research global grant projects in need of partners.
5. Where can Rotarians go for help during the application process? Start in your own district. Each district usually has an international service chair who can connect you to people with expertise in your area of interest. Applicants can also contact the Foundation directly. We have a list of grant officers for all districts who can vet project ideas and put you in touch with members of The Rotary Foundation Cadre of Technical Advisers, who are professionals in the areas of focus. They can do a preliminary review of project design and advise you on eligibility.

Rotary International Director for 2022-24

In accordance with RI Bylaws section 11.020., the Nominating Committee for RI Director in Zone 32 recently certified that it selected Rotarian Drew Kessler, a member of the Rotary Club of North Rockland (Haverstraw), as a RI director in 2022–24. Rotarian Kessler has stated that he is willing and able to serve as director, if elected. RI President Knaack will declare Rotarian Kessler as director-nominee from your zone on 1 December 2020 unless another qualified Rotarian has been duly proposed as a challenging candidate before 1 December. Any club in your zone at its regular meeting may adopt a resolution proposing a challenging candidate for RI director, provided that the challenger was among the candidates previously considered. The following procedures must be followed to propose a challenge to the Nominating Committee's selection:



1. The club must submit a resolution to the governor, signed by the club president or secretary, naming a candidate who was previously suggested to the Nominating Committee.
2. The governor, either at the district conference or through a ballot, asks each club in the district if it concurs with the challenge resolution. If a majority of clubs in the district concur, the governor will forward the challenge to the general secretary **by no later than 1 December 2020**. Any challenges received by the general secretary after 1 December or that are incomplete cannot be considered.
3. If a valid challenge is received, the Secretariat will prepare and distribute an electronic ballot by 31 December, listing the choice of your zone's Nominating Committee and any challenging candidates who were endorsed by a majority of the clubs in the district.

Please note RI Bylaws section 13.010., which in part states: Rotarians shall not campaign, canvass, or electioneer for elective position in RI, or allow any such activity, for either themselves or others. Unless expressly authorized by the board, this prohibition includes any distribution or circulation by themselves or others of brochures, literature, letters, materials, electronic media, or other communications to any clubs or members of clubs. Any candidate who undertakes, or on whose behalf is undertaken, unauthorized and improper activities to further his or her candidacy is in violation of the bylaws and may be disqualified by the RI Board.
