### Taking a WWII Submarine to Erie for Repairs -- What Could Go Wrong?

A humorous look at the first drydocking of USS COD SS-224 in nearly 60 years by a group of civilians who have never done such a thing. It's aimed at the casual non-ship expert and includes some behind the scenes information that may still be top secret. Or not.

Paul Farace is the president of the USS COD SS-224 Submarine Memorial, a role he has filled since 2012 and caps off a 45-year continuing involvement with what many consider the best historic submarine restoration in the world.

Paul is a former newspaper reporter and technology magazine editor with experience in daily newspapers, as a NASA public information officer, and trade magazines. He is a 1981 graduate of Cleveland State University with a BA in journalism. He holds the Henry Vadanais Award from the Historic Naval Ships Association in curatorship.

When not directly involved with the care, operation and promotion of this National Historic Landmark submarine he's usually asleep. But the 63-year-old will list travel, photography and Italian cooking as his other interests. He is married to Teresa Lazusky, a former resident of Cochranton, PA.

#### PeaceJam Ghana

The Board approved Wisdom Addo's request for continuing funding for his <u>PeaceJam</u> program as a memoriam to our friend Dr. Joyce Miller, a Rotary Peace Fellow. PeaceJam is an annual Youth Leadership Conference built around Nobel Peace Prize Laureates who work with young people to impart their skills, knowledge, and wisdom for community and sustainable development. Wisdom will visit our club in September to give us an update on this program. During its August meeting, the Board will determine whether this will become an recurrent budget item.

#### Gannon Business Student Scholarship

Gannon Business Student, Janyssa Berrios, approached the club for support for her planned study abroad program. Due to hardships imposed by COVID-19, Janyssa was unable to maintain her 4.0 last year as required for an Honors Scholarship she had been counting upon.

The Board approved \$500 for Janyssa's trip and Director Dr. Joe Kuvshinikov will take the lead in discussion with the Gannon Business School, Honors College, and our club's Scholarship Foundation to make this an annual scholarship for a worthy local student. Janyssa will attend an upcoming club meeting to tell us about her plans and will check in with our meetings periodically via Zoom to apprise us of her progress.

### Merida, Mexico Nueva Vida School International Project

The Board approved a request of \$1,000 from native Erieite, David Keelan, a graduate of St Mark's Seminary and Gannon University, who is now a member of the Merida Mexico Rotary Club. David approached us to support installation of solar panels on the roof the Nueva Vida pre-school and daycare center in that city. The project will enhance electricity availability and enable the school to sell back excess power generation to the Mexican grid, providing sustained income for school programming.

He trained as an accountant and founded a real estate development company, Skyline Group, which he also chairs. But his professional title tells only a small part of the story of who he is. He is also a director of the India arm of Operation Eyesight Universal, a Canada-based nonprofit focused on preventing avoidable blindness. He helped establish more than 15 eye hospitals, in several Indian states, that together carry out nearly 50,000 surgeries each year. And he started Saving Little Hearts, a project that has facilitated more than 2,500 heart surgeries for children from India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal, and some African countries and that is now an India-wide program.
