

The Rotary Club of Erie will observe World Polio Day and the start of our Rotary International Foundation giving season with a special fundraising event designed to help RI close that 0.01% gap in polio prevention coverage. So far in 2021, only two polio cases were reported, one in Afghanistan and one in Pakistan. The Taliban has pledged to the World Health Organization (WHO) that it will permit and even safeguard the continuing vaccination program in Afghanistan.

For more than 30 years, Rotary and our partners have driven the effort to eradicate polio. Rotary's PolioPlus program was the first initiative to tackle global polio eradication by vaccinating children on a massive scale.

Vote on Proposed Changes to Club Bylaws October 27 Noon Meeting

To update our eligibility for Emeritus Membership and to streamline our processes for accepting new members and making amendments to our bylaws, the Board has approved changes to the Club Bylaws.



This information was sent to the membership in two emails and the current

bylaws can be accessed, along with our Club Constitution and many other documents, such as archived issues of the See-Way at https://erierotary.club under the News and Stories tab. We will vote on these proposed changes at our October 27 regular weekly meeting.

The proposed changes relate to the following Articles:

Article 11 would now read:

Section 1 � A member proposes a candidate for membership to the board

and/or the membership committee, or another club proposes one of its transferring or former members.

Section 2 • The board approves or rejects the candidate • s membership within 30 days and notifies the proposing member of its decision.

Section 3 • If the board approves the candidate • s membership, the prospective member is invited to join the club.

Article 12 only changes the Emeritus Membership eligibility from having to reach your 85th birthday to having served as a Club President. The Paul Harris Fellow and 25 years of membership remain the same.

Article 15 only removes the requirement of informing the membership of proposed amendments by mail and reducing the comment period from 21 to 14 days, due to the efficiency offered by electronic communication.



Emmy Hackshaw, All of Us Research Program



We welcomed Emmy Hackshaw of the All of Us Research Program, as our speaker for the October 20th Rotary weekly meeting.

A self-proclaimed connector, Ms. Hackshaw works doing community engagement and participant recruitment for the All of Us Research Program through her alma mater, the University of Pittsburgh (Master of Health Administration in Policy in Management). Hackshaw seeks to engage and educate the community through public health research.

Emmy explained to the audience that creating the right health approaches and care for the right person is called precision medicine.

Getting the right information to make that happen is the goal of the All of Us Research

Program funded by the National Institutes of Health (NIH), one of the more ambitious health research efforts in U.S. history, with a participation goal of 1 million Americans from diverse backgrounds. The program will examine how biology, lifestyle, and environment intersect to influence the overall health of both individuals and communities.

It's the first study of its kind to come to Erie, and researchers hope to use its insights to develop improved treatments and preventatives for a variety of diseases. Additional Information about this research and participation options may be found at https://joinallofuspa.org


A Moment in History: Rotary Club of Erie Contributions to Bicentennial Tower Time Capsule

On October 13, the Sunday <u>Erie Times News</u> provided an interesting retrospective on the development and construction of the Bicentennial Tower on Dobbins Landing. The City of Erie was founded in 1795 and in 1995 the

City celebrated its 200th Anniversary. A key feature of this celebration was the erection of the 187-foot tower at the foot of Dobbins Landing to provide a focal point for the still-developing Bayfront skyscape.

A time capsule was placed in the base of the tower to be opened in 2095 on Erie \$\displays 300th anniversary. The placement of the time capsule coincided with
