CRUTCHES4AFRICA

On Saturday, June 5, about 20 to 25 Rotarians from districts 7280 and 7210 will gather in Smethport, Pennsylvania to load a 40 foot sea container with 3300+ mobility devices. The mobility devices are crutches, walkers, wheelchairs rollators, canes as well as back, knee and leg braces. This container will then be shipped to Uganda, Africa. Devices will be the distributed in Uganda and Tanzania to individuals that are currently unable to walk and participate in daily life activities. Rotarians in both the districts have been collecting these devices for the past 18 months.

Crutches 4 Africa was started by Rotarian David Talbot from Colorado in 2007 after visiting Africa and seeing the need for mobility devices. There are approximately 20 million people in Africa that need such devices. In Uganda alone there are 6 million people that need them. To date C4A has shipped approximately 160,000 + devices.

There are currently two collection barrels located in District 7280; one at the **Zelienople Library** and a second at the **Mars Planet Mart**. Please drop off devices for donation at anytime. If you would like to make a financial donation go to the website www.Crutches4Africa.org.

WHY IN THE WORLD WOULD I DO THAT?

I have asked several Rotary clubs to start a satellite club, and invariably one of the first questions is "why would we want to do that?" So, I'll start by answering WHY? I am going to answer the question from the perspective of a cause-based virtual club, rather than a geographic, in-person club, but many of the answers will apply to both scenarios.

TOP TEN REASONS your Rotary club benefits from starting a cause-based satellite e-club...

- 10. You will LEAVE A LEGACY AND STRENGTHEN ROTARY by sharing the gift of Rotary to a demographic that may not find our current clubs' style, meeting time, or culture appealing.
- When compared with Rotary Action Groups and Rotary Fellowships, CAUSE-BASED ROTARY CLUBS OFFER ADVANTAGES of regular meetings, opportunities for grants from The Rotary Foundation, and protections of the Rotary Clubs' insurance policy.
- 8. Cause-based e-clubs are an inexpensive and relatively EASY WAY TO START A NEW ROTARY CLUB. Affiliate members (Rotarians from other clubs) provide expertise for the new club and reduce the need for mentors from the parent club.
- 7. One of the benefits of being a Rotarian is the development of leadership skills. A satellite club will offer more opportunities to DEVELOP LEADERS, probably in a less formal and more comfortable environment than in a traditional Rotary club.
- 6. An e-club can invite members from around the world, reinforcing the INTERNATIONAL FLAVOR of Rotary and providing new opportunities for service around the globe.
- 5. YOU WILL MAKE A DIFFERENCE by attracting new people to Rotary and expanding the number of Rotarians 'doing good in the world'.
- 4. Current Rotarians may be honorary or affiliate* members and participate in both their home club, and the cause-based club, CEMENTING MEMBERS' COMMITMENT TO ROTARY.
- Members of the satellite club are also members of the parent club and can participate in projects of the parent club. This multiplies your CLUB'S OPPORTUNITY TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE.
- People who follow their passions in Rotary are Rotarians for life. This makes cause-based clubs a MEMBER RETENTION STRATEGY.
- 1. YOUR CLUB WILL BE ENERGIZED by an influx of new people and fresh ideas.

A cause-based club can be built around almost anything. Ideas include entrepreneurship, environmental issues, food insecurity, health and wellness, international service, literacy, social justice, peace building, veteran's issues, maternal and child health, water and sanitation, and... This short Anytown video does a great job of explaining WHY we should all start new clubs in our towns. Figure out WHERE to start a club by exploring Grow Rotary.

They inducted 23 members (pictured below) at their first meeting in September 2019 and have grown to 37.



MEET THEM WHERE THEY ARE

You're reading this newsletter because you care about Rotary's growth. You know our membership number has hovered around 1.2 million people for decades. You know we need more Rotarians to increase our impact.

But it isn't about the numbers.

As another Rotary year comes to an end, it is the time to fall into step and march out our traditional district membership growth plans. We promote a District-wide challenge to increase numbers and instruct membership chairs to "Grow Rotary." Essentially, we create sales quotas for Clubs.

But it isn't about the numbers.

The higher leaders rise in any organization, the more often we risk losing sight of what is happening on the front lines. We forget that our membership roster is broken down by Clubs, then further into individual names. Do we know these people who are serving our mission on the front lines? What are their goals? What do they want from Rotary? What do they hope to achieve?

It isn't about the numbers; and it shouldn't be. Because it is about them.

I'd bet there are very few Rotarians who care if Rotary membership increases from 1.2 million to 1.3 million. I'd also bet many club leaders would prefer to have a smaller group of more dedicated Rotarians than just a deeper roster with more casual members.

We know how Innovative Clubs can help them grow, but if they aren't ready or it isn't their goal, it may have the opposite effect we are hoping for and encounter even more resistance to change. Innovative ideas draw a mixed bag - A few clubs may be ready to dive right in. Others may need to dip a toe in and test the water. Still others won't even look at the water.

The leadership intent should be to facilitate simple movement from one step to the next.

How?

First, we need to meet the clubs where they are. This means communicating with the clubs individually, understanding their goals and challenges, and then bolster them to choose their own way.

Proposed changes should always be about the needs of the individual Club. Change doesn't have to come at the cost of what dedicated Rotarians have come to know and love about their club. For some clubs it may be creating multiple satellite clubs. For others is may be as simple as offering a new membership type without meals cost.

Getting that club to offer a new membership type needs to be recognized and celebrated because they have taken a step outside of their comfort zone, which took a lot of hard work. Give them credit for success because they have done something brand new.

As membership advocates, we all want to see Rotary grow in members and impact with new satellite clubs or cause-based clubs. However, our priorities are not everyone else's. It is up to the clubs to determine what is best for them.

To truly help Rotary grow, we must meet Clubs where they are.

WILD POLIO VIRUS SUMMARY:



You will see below and attached, that the numbers are still unchanged since February 24.

The number of wild polio cases for 2021 as of May 19, 2021 is 2. There was 1 in Pakistan and 1 in Afghanistan.

The total number of wild polio cases in 2020 were 140. There were 84 in Pakistan and 56 in Afghanistan.

The total number of wild polio cases in 2019 were 176. There were 147 in Pakistan and 29 in Afghanistan.


