

### June 21, 2022


The regular Washington Rotary Meeting took place on Tuesday, June 21, at Washington and Jefferson College. Joining by Zoom were **Rich and Mary Jo Podgurski**. Guest was our speaker, **The Honorable Leo Trich**.

The invocation was given by **Susan Priest**, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

## **Announcements**

- **Jim Uram** announced that people who will be helping with the set-up for Presidents Night, which will be held next week at 5:30 in the Kiwanis Pavilion in Washington Park, should plan on being there at 4:00. Attendees will be billed for the \$35.00 cost. There will be a 50/50, tickets \$10. The proceeds will be used to help pay the gratuity for the servers from Krency's. Right now 34 people have signed up, but there is room for late registrants.
- **Dorothy Tecklenburg** asked if anyone going to the District Conference would be willing to take a one-page handout about the proposed joint project in Kenya which we are pursuing with the Applecross Rotary Club in Perth, Australia. Many small clubs which cannot manage an international project on their own might be interesting in piggybacking on this project. She is committed to a family reunion, whose date she had no control over, and had intended to hand these out in person. Several persons who will be attending expressed a willingness to help out.

## Program: Leo Trich - World Affair Forums



At this point **President Brand**i asked **Karen Reese** to introduce our speaker, **Leo Trich**.

**Karen** said that she has known **Leo** since he was a student and that he began working with **Roy Gillespie**, her father, at Pony Baseball, a job he held for 15 years. **Leo** later became a member of the Pennsylvania Legislature for 14 years, and worked with pro teams in minor league baseball. He now is associated with the World Affairs Council in Pittsburgh, which was founded by the Pittsburgh Rotary Club. He is also Founder and President of Ballpark Scholarships, Inc. **Leo** began by saying that when he began to work with Pony, he was pulled in two directions. **Roy Gillespie and Bill Amos** would often invite him to Rotary meetings and urged him to join Rotary. However, his boss, **Lew Hays**, was a Kiwanian, and in the end Leo joined Kiwanis. His work now follows two tracks. Ballpark Scholarships, Inc (BSI) was founded to raise money to create the Wild

Things Ballpark. This year the field will celebrate 20 years. BSI was founded to raise the funds for the construction of the field, and raised 82% of the costs. The rest of the money came from a state grant. BSI uses the additional funds raised to provide scholarships to local students. To date \$100,000 has been distributed in scholarships.

His other work is with the World Affairs Council in Pittsburgh. He became involved in 2019 and met with high school students to discuss important issues with them. From the start he was in awe of the involvement of the students. They were discussing climate change and he was amazed at how they were thinking outside the box. They convinced him that they will do a better job in running the world than his generation. They will outdo us.

He hosted another forum in the spring where representatives from the elected sphere were joined by diplomats, peace activists, and even some from the UN. What was stressed was that public service is not only running for public office, but that there other ways to work to improve one's world.

He was chosen to represent Pennsylvania in a week-long event in Europe which included meeting members from the European Union Parliament and officials at NATO to show America's on-going support for our trans-Atlantic alliances. After two postponements because of Covid - last August he was one of 60 current and former state elected persons to attend the EU event. At one point many went to a United Nations facility in Austria, but Leo was one of those asked to attend a session at Maastricht University in the southern Netherlands. This was aimed at interacting with students of international studies, and again Leo came away with a feeling that this younger generation will do great things. He also became aware of how much these young people know about the US, and how little American young people know about them.

What **Leo** came to talk to us about, however, are two upcoming Virtual International Forums, one at Chartiers-Houston High School and one at Upper Saint Clair High School. They will be held this September and October. One person attending will be a young man **Leo** met in Europe, **Dominik Wrobel**, who greatly impressed him. **Dominic** is a German grad student who will be coming over to Pittsburgh for a 10-week study program with the World Affairs Council. He shows a great ability to connect with young people.

The cost of the two forums will be \$1100. They have secured a grant from Washington Federal for \$500, and Leo is asking that our board consider matching this amount. BSI plans to fund scholarships for some of the student participants.

**President Brandi** asked if volunteers will be needed at the forums, and Leo said that volunteers would be welcome, as well as anyone who would like to come and observe.

The meeting ended with the recital of the Four Way Test, led by **President Brandi**.

## **Blight Remediation Initiative**

Good morning,

Thank you for your willingness to aid our in our recruitment efforts! My name is Jordan Murray, and I am the intern this summer at the Washington Citywide Development Corporation. The WCDC is committed to serving our city and its residents and thinks that we can make a difference in our community. We intend to carry on with our efforts to combat out-migration and improve Washington this summer by continuing our multi-year Blight Remediation Initiative. Through this project, we hope to target areas of Washington that can be improved.

Using GIS, Volunteers will assist in this initiative by surveying the neighborhood, assessing buildings, homes, and/or lots, and answering survey questions.

They will not be knocking on doors.

We plan to examine ward 5 this year. We've set aside four weeks to go out and examine the neighborhood once a week. Lunch will be given, and volunteers will be able to earn service hours as well. We are also providing training materials virtually as well as tutorials before each day of volunteering. I've attached the flyer, which has further details on the times and dates. Please disregard the training date and location; we've decided to do the virtual method.

Any help in getting this information out would be greatly appreciated. We are looking for as many people as possible, as this is a larger area that we are surveying this year. We will be recruiting all summer through the dates listed on the flyer, so if being present next week is an issue, we will be retraining and refreshing on each date of surveying. Please let me know if there are any questions.
