#### **School Daze Memories**

It was fall 1956 and the excitement of a new school year was heightened by the prospects of entering a brand new school building. The old Disputanta Training School for colored children was finally being decommissioned. Its old campus was comprised of 3-4 older buildings, several Quonset huts, some oddly placed basketball hoops and make-shift baseball/softball fields.

It had a government funded coop cannery which served the community via the home economics department. What it did not have was a gymnasium, a science lab, a music department or many other things needed to meet the mid-century needs of its young 11<sup>th</sup> grade graduates.

The new JEJ Moore High School was bright and fully self-contained, everything under one roof! The gym included showers; the equipment was limited but much more than we at the old school. The science lab looked really impressive but without equipment, specimens and other essential instruments necessary for experiments. Dissecting frogs would be delayed until college.

Roaming through the hallways of the rededicated Central Wellness Center (CWC) on October 30<sup>th</sup> brought back so many memories. I especially remembered how I had hoped the very strict older English teacher would have retired over the summer. Our previous English classes had been taught by the only music teacher; we knew of Mrs. Hall�s high expectations. She would make us write and write!

Well, Mrs. Hall did NOT retire. She sent us future graduates out with the skills necessary to pass the college required English entrance examinations. She has been thanked many times over, in absentia. While the building itself did not ensure a quality education for the colored high schoolers in Prince George, it gave us a sense of pride in our new building.

Thank you JEJ Moore High School! You served your African American High School students for more than a decade. Now, in a new capacity, you serve all of Prince George County as its Central Wellness Center.
