Over the past 18 months, the Fluvanna Rotary Club has been actively serving Fluvanna County. Listed below are just a few of the things the Club accomplished since March 2020:

Provided \$1500 worth of facemasks for the community

 Purchased \$7,000 of new equipment for MACAA including a new refrigerator, handheld radios, and scales and food bags.

- Food and toiletry drive for Meals on Wheels which yielded over 600 pounds of food and \$500 in cash donations
- 4 food drives for MACAA which yielded 34,000 pounds of food and over \$12,500 in cash donations
- The Rose Deborah Altschull Endowment for Youth, as part of our Fluvanna Rotary Foundation supported children in need through Central and Carysbrook Elementary Schools
 - Operation Warm provided 162 winter coats

He talked about how the stars aligned on that day for events to happen that led to having immediate police response, a high speed chase that ended in a car accident to the capture of three robbers.

He captivated his audience with his story of the early morning robbery, the pistol at his head, officers and robbers bullets flying, the car ride that saw high speeds, squealing tires, a locked gun flashing lights quick turns and bumps and hitting a pole and ditch. His heroic efforts and adrenaline rush allowed him to drop and flip the robbers on each side of him backwards in a quick thinking action that saw the



robbers get captured.

As he said many times before, in the end the money bag they picked up to carry out of the bank, risking

the lives of those involved, held only \$50 dollars in rolled up pennies.

Because things lined up the way they did - with law enforcement on the scene in street clothes, and minor glitches that aligned to slow down what seemed like a long heist - is why he is able to talk about it today. *Lisa Clary Photo*

The Rotary Foundation: Excitement is Contagious By Stephen Beer, District Rotary Foundation Committee Chair

Carl Davis, The Rotary
Foundation (TRF) Chief Giving
Officer of Zones 33-34, shared
his sanguine assessment of
and pride in being affiliated
with TRF. In this spontaneous
phone conversation, Carl was
asked his view about what
was on the horizon for The
Rotary Foundation. His
excitement could hardly be
contained.

First, he cited the international recognition of TRF as an extremely well-run nonprofit organization, certainly one of the top five such nonprofits in



the United States, if not the world. As a nonprofit professional he stated he has never seen an organization that better addresses obstacles that arise. Its flexibility allows it to tailor responses that are true to preserving the mission of The Rotary Foundation and continue to provide the long-term impact for which this nonprofit is known. He reports being immensely proud to be part of this well managed organization.

He went on to extol the continued growth of the Endowment Fund. He surmises there will be a time when earnings from the endowment fund will be the primary funder of Rotary s charitable projects, making dependence on short-term donations, though still important, less critical. Thus, the security of the Endowment Fund will have a generational impact as the next wave of Rotarians take the helm and embark on good works.

Finally, his confidence in The Rotary Foundation has even grown due to its response to the global pandemic. If anything, TRF has become more intentional in its adaptation to the crisis not only from a management perspective, but also in its commitment to projects within the seven areas of focus. Priorities change in crisis and The Rotary Foundation as an organization met those challenges while maintaining its core commitments.

Carl so optimism and pride was evident in the conversation. Thinking over the conversation later in the day, it reminded me of similar expressions I have heard from District 7600 Rotarians, if not in words, in their actions as they donate to TRF and do great projects in their own communities and internationally. We can all be proud of The Rotary Foundation and our part in it.

Global Grant - Hiamankyene School submitted by Shel Douglas

Hello Rotary D7600 and friends. The Signage for the six-classroom school in Hiamankyene has been drafted. It has been reviewed and now includes all of the clubs that have contributed. This global grant project is supported by \$20,000 District Designated Funds from D7600. The Prince George Rotarians provided approximately \$10,000 in support. Blackstone, Chester, South Hill, New Kent, Short Pump- Henrico, and Petersburg clubs also provided significant support. This was one of the last schools to be built under the Foundation s simple school project. This school is our partnership with the community of Hiamankyene and Rotarians & Rotarctors of Kumasi. The project allowed the Rotaractors to be involved so they can be prepared to lead their own global grant project in the near future.

The project will be dedicated in honor of several great Rotarians: Bob Sapp of the Myrtle Beach Club (Bob and the District were major donors to the project), and in memory of Rotary Director Ron Ferrill and PDG Mary Keely of D7570.

The arrival of the first peace fellows at the new peace center in Kampala, Uganda, heralds the beginning of a new era for Rotary and the continent

In the last week of February, in Kampala, Uganda, 15 Rotary Peace Fellows gathered at Makerere University for the inaugural session of Rotary International so new peace center. Among them, the peace center so first cohort represented 11 countries and spoke, in addition to English, a dozen African languages, including Luganda, Swahili, and Zulu. Coming from diverse backgrounds, and yet with a

shared desire for peace in Africa, they are the epitome of unity in diversity, said Anne Nkutu, a member of the Rotary Club of Kampala Naalya and the host area coordinator for the

Makerere University peace center. With an average age of 40 when they were admitted to the program, the fellows are not novice peacemakers. These are established professionals with a minimum of five years of experience in peace and development. They arrived at Makerere University & home to an established program in peace and conflict studies • already working on an initiative, or with an idea for one, that promotes peace or social change within their workplace or community. ♦ The fellows are more interested in the practical side of peacebuilding, ♦ said Helen Nambalirwa Nkabala, the director of the peace center. They want to see how things are done, as opposed to our regular students, who are more interested in the theoretical aspects. So the fellows come off as, and indeed are, change agents. Prior to arriving at Makerere, the peace fellows began their studies with a two-week online session, the first stage in Rotary s new yearlong certificate program in peacebuilding, conflict transformation, and development. (The peace center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, which previously offered a three-month version of the certificate program, has also adopted this new model.) Following the 10-week session in Kampala, they will return home to begin implementing their social change initiatives, checking in periodically with their instructors and fellow students. They will return to Makerere in early 2022 to complete the program. Earlier this year, as they prepared to depart for Kampala, Rotary magazine spoke with six of the peace fellows via Zoom and WhatsApp. The conversations were a crash course in African history and politics. They were also an inspiration, offering a glimpse of the possibilities that lie ahead for Africa once these peace fellows ? and those to follow in the years ahead ? complete their studies at Makerere and disperse across the continent to share what they have learned.
