Past District Governor Earl Haywood Hale, Jr. August 10, 1926 - December 20, 2019



The Rotary Club of Prince George Rotary County and Rotary District 7600 sadly announce the passing of Past District Governor Earl H. Hale, Jr., on Friday December 20, 2019 survived by his wife Patricia C. Hale.

Earl was a man of heroism, dignity, talents, volunteer spirit and humor. He began his life in Florida ultimately graduating from college with a degree in forestry. World circumstances interrupted his love of horticulture. He served in two uniforms, first in the U.S. Navy and then in the U.S. Army. While on active duty, he saw action in three wars, World War II, Korea, and Vietnam. After retiring from the Army, LTC (Ret) Earl H. Hale, Jr took up his first love and established his own landscaping business which he operated for many years

He was preceded in death by his first wife of 42 years, Elizabeth Betzie Everett Hale; brothers, Walter Hale and Charles Hale; children, Gary Earl Hale and Cheryl Hale Kanak; and sons-in-law, LTC (Ret) Roy Turgeon and Ben Kanak. He is survived by his wife, Patricia Cole Hale; children, Marilyn Turgeon Poole and husband, Charles, Bradford Bryan Hale and wife, Anne, Melissa-Beth Gates and husband, Andy, and Kevin Alexander Foster; grandchildren, Kate Turgeon-Watson and her husband, Brandon, Emily Cambra and her husband, Josh, Natalie Turgeon, Elizabeth Gates, Russell Gates, Samuel Gates, and Hannah Hale; great-grandchildren, Sara-Hale Watson, Caroline Watson, Roy Cambra, and Tillman Cambra.

Rotary was at the very center of Earl so life. He became a Rotarian in October 1973 and was ultimately President of the Rotary Club of Hopewell. He served as District Governor of District 7600 (then 760) in 1988-1989. In 1996 he founded the Rotary Club of Prince George County with Pat serving as the Charter President of the club. He also served as president of the Prince George Rotary in 2001-2002. He remained in the club, serving in many capacities until the end. On the Monday before his passing on Friday, he and Pat had hosted an all-expense paid Christmas dinner and social for the club. In fact, he continued to serve the District as well, serving in a number of roles, including leading a Group Study Exchange team to India in 2001, making him a Rotary Alumnus, a designation for Rotarians who have served on Rotary Programs. He loved to tell stories and show souvenirs from that trip.

The Rotary Foundation was similarly very important to Earl. He was a Major Donor,

Sustaining Member, and donor to Polio Plus and a Benefactor. His generosity went beyond donating. He took delight in educating new Rotarians about The Rotary Foundation and the good works of Rotary throughout the world. In 2004 he was the recipient of the Meritorious Service Citation, a Rotary District Award endorsed by Rotary International, which a recipient may receive only once.

At the Rotary Zone 33 Level Earl served on a number of important committees for multiple years including the Nomination Committee for Rotary International Director and on the Zone Institute Committee which is the committee which designs training for district leaders in the zone.

While devoted to Rotary, Earl was also actively involved in the community serving in many capacities, particularly on the Prince George County Electoral Board and the Prince George County Grand Jury. He never lost his love of horticulture and gardening and as a result was the leader in the landscaping projects with Rotary for County facilities such as the Comfort Station at the Appomattox River Regional Park, the Prince George County Library, and the Prince George County Animal Services.

None of these words capture Earl s spirit and talent. He loved bow-ties, and tam-o shanters. He never complained, never whined, and was always ready to listen to the needs of others. He was an accomplished pianist and spoke French fluently. He did love adding little French side comments to some conversations. He was a kind, loving gentleman.

Going forward, the Rotary Club of Prince George County Rotary and District 7600 will be guided by Earl strue Rotary spirit and vision. We will all remember Earl so oft repeated saying, Its a great day!

Recently Churchland Rotarians met at the Bennetts Creek Food Lion to purchase groceries for seven families and delivered the food to Edmarc where the staff would deliver the food to families. Presents were delivered to Edmarc last week.

# Message from Stephen Beer: Exciting Improvements with the New Year!

### Key Takeaways:

- We have already raised over One Million Dollars toward our Million Dollar Dinner Campaign!
- District 7600 will have significant greater District Grant money available in 2020!
- We listened to Rotarians requests and are making changes to our grant training process.

During the Rotary Foundation banquet in November, Governor Clenise Platt announced the launch of our Million Dollar Dinner campaign. After less than six weeks, we already have pledges exceeding of over one million dollars! We will have more details on the campaign in next month s newsletter.

The next District Grant cycle will be starting in January with the grant training process. District 7600 will have about \$208,000 in grant monies available for local projects. Typically, we had \$150-160,000 available in past years. So, start thinking/planning to fulfill the needs in your community. Partner with other clubs to have a greater impact and create more visibility of Rotary in your community.

Over the past five or six years some Rotarians have asked if there is a way to do more online training. It is challenging for some members to travel long distances and dedicate their Saturdays to meet the training requirements. The Rotary Foundation Grants Seminar is held each year in March. We added an online grants webinar a few years ago to help those who need more flexibility with travel, time and cost. District 7600 has been working with Rotary International to develop an online one-on-one grant seminar module. We should be launching this training module in early 2020.

Foundation Grants Sub-Committee Chair Rudy Garcia has been expended a lot of effort to put this program together. Rotarians will be able to complete the online training on their own time schedule and at their own pace. We surveyed club leaders, and, based on feedback from the survey, the online grants module will replace the webinar. We will still have the seminar on March 28 in Williamsburg. There are advantages for Rotarians to meet face-to-face over online training. Having both alternatives is important. Please thank Rudy when you see him! Details on how to use the new online training tools will become available in

January.

Lynnhaven River Now is an organization dedicated to restoring and protecting waterways in Virginia Beach. In the summer of 2018, the organization teamed with members from the Cape Henry Rotary Club to build a shelter at the 64th Street end of First Landing State Park. Recently Lynnhaven River Now asked for an addition to the District Project.

The shelter provides a place for hikers, bikers, or visitors waiting to load or unload boats a place to relax and enjoy the wonderful views of Broad Bay. It's purpose to also to inspire others with "green" building by minimizing land disturbance and improving stormwater quality. This final goal was achieved by the *green roof* that was installed when this collaboration re-convened in November. They added a grass roof with the help of one of the club members, Charles Hall, who is also an environmentalist. Next up, a rainwater harvesting system will be added to collect rainwater for distribution back onto the green roof during dry spells.

Marshall was there every night since Saturday setting up the Soap Chips mobile shower facility. I was able to help him five nights. Each night we had four to six folks use the showers. Marshall is a member of Churchland Baptist Church, a Rotarian with the Churchland Rotary Club, and a retired state trooper. ♦

Editor: Soap Chips was one of the more unique district grant applications in the 2018-2019 year. This project which provides hot showers, toiletries, socks, and some basic under garments, hearkens back to the first Rotary Project • public toilets in downtown Chicago in the early days of Rotary.





Each year since the 2013-2014 new grant process began, the grant funds available have

grown as have the size and variety of district grants. District grant policies have fostered multi-club grants, regularized the grant application process, and auditing procedures have improved the stewardship of district grant funds.

In the 2019-2020 Grant year, District 7600 had almost \$153,500 in designated funds to dispense and hosted two rounds of district grant applications. The second round of grant applications allowed the District Grants Team to award almost all of the district designated funds (DDF) available. With clubs joining each other on grant projects and partnering with other nonprofits and governmental agencies, the total financial impact of this year so district grants totals \$263,364. This represents a significant and lasting impact for the communities in central and southeast Virginia.

In total there were 20 district grants awarded. But three clubs double-dipped in interesting ways. South Hill came back in Round Two to purchase more benches for its project and the clubs of Warwick at City Center Newport News and Virginia Peninsula joined together in two separate district grants. Double-dipping is possible, though any given club may not be awarded more than a total of \$5000 DDF.

There were 13 multi-club grants in five of the Areas of Focus. There were ten grant applications which listed Economic & Community Development as the area focus. One club listed both Economic & Community Development as well as Maternal & Child Health as its areas of focus. There were seven grants in the Maternal & Child Health Area of focus, and one each in Basic Education & Literacy, Peace & Conflict Resolution, and Disease Prevention/Treatment. There weren t any grant projects in the Water & Sanitation Area of Focus. In the early days of Future Vision the marketing description of our current grant module, most of the district grants clustered in the Maternal & Child Health and Basic Education & Literacy Area of Focus.
