Beth, from Housing Families First, received a check for \$30,000 from the Rotary Club of Richmond. The mission of Housing Families First is to provide families experiencing homelessness with the tools to achieve housing stability. But they do so much more... the following is from their website: "Our emergency shelter, commonly known as Hilliard House, gets families off the street and offers housing-focused services to help them access the best permanent housing options available. Providing a temporary home for over 200 children and adults each year, our shelter is the largest family shelter in Greater Richmond and is the only fully handicapped-accessible shelter for families. Our rapid re-housing program moves literally homeless families and single women to staying in our own shelter, other local shelters, and the streets **a** into safe, affordable homes. Then, our case management team works with families to connect them with community resources that help them keep their housing, increase income, cope with stress, and achieve long-term housing stability. Our newest program is the regional Homeless Crisis Line, which is operated in collaboration with three other nonprofits. The goal of the Homeless Crisis Line is to help families draw on their own support system to re-stabilize their housing, when possible, and to gather information for referral to homeless services, if needed."

River City Club





Huguenot Trail Club









Grant Management Seminar 2020 on the Horizon

The District 7600 Grants Management Seminar (GMS) will be held on Saturday, March 28, 2020, from 9 am -12 (check in and breakfast beginning at 8:30) at the Colonial Heritage Club, 6500 Arthur Hills Drive, Williamsburg, Virginia. The cost is only \$25 per person and includes a world-famous full Southern Buffet Breakfast. Remember, attendance is a requirement for qualification to apply for a grant.

During the Seminar, Club Presidents-Elect will be learning more about the district and global grants requirements for the 2020-2021 Rotary year. And yes, there are always a few updated changes to work into the clubs plans for grant funded service projects, whether local or global.

The super-interesting thing is that the district will have about \$50,000 more to award in district grants this year than last year. The District Rotary Foundation Committee (DRFC) is looking for grants with significant impact. The maximum amount any club may receive for a district grant remains at the \$5,000 level, but clubs with other clubs nearby should really consider how they might join in on a district grant to maximize the funding for a local service project of regional impact.

Anyway, don t wait to find out what your President-Elect learns at the Chesapeake PETS (Presidents-Elect Training Seminar) about the GMS 2020. Go ahead, get it on your calendar, and as soon as it is available for registration on DACdb calendar, do it, just do it. It may take a week or two for your President-Elect to recover from the awe inspiring training at PETS.

Where does the District stand, giving-wise, per the Rose Report? You may remember that David Rosenthal (Hampton Roads Club), the District Annual Giving Chair, produces a monthly report by club and by category of Foundation giving to track our year to date giving. Dubbed the Rose Report, he sends it to the club Presidents and club Rotary Foundation Chairs.

In the *Rose Report* for January, he noted that a couple of clubs had lowered their giving goals which lowered the total district goal to \$441,500. While disappointing, it is important that club giving goals be a careful balance of being achievable and being optimistic. Have you checked your own club s giving goals in *MyRotary.org*? Consider visiting that report and determining if you can be an asset in achieving the club goal.

As of the close of the January books (around mid-February), District 7600 had donated \$209,160 which is 47.4% of the district goal. Many clubs hold an end-of-year type fundraiser to help fund the giving goal for the year. Consequently, the district is often on tenterhooks to see if we meet our district **\$** s goal for the year.

Slowly, things are starting to change. Did we say \diamond slowly \diamond ? Many District 7600 Rotarians are setting up their personal giving online at *MyRotary.org*. It can be set up to be monthly, quarterly, or all-in-one fell swoop. The folks who had done that note that they don \diamond t miss the monthly or quarterly amount being charged to their credit cards and don \diamond t have to \diamond remember \diamond to make a donation. This method also makes it so much easier on the poor club Treasurers, those under-appreciated and underpaid (LOL) club stewards.

If you haven t done so already, create your *MyRotary.org* account. A few days after creating your account, you can set up the amount you want to go monthly or quarterly to The Rotary Foundation. Oh, you already have an account? Then nothing is stopping you from setting up your convenient contribution to The Rotary Foundation. Think about it.
