



The Rotary Club of New Kent is selling *Two Drops Jewelry* as a Polio Fundraiser. Two drops of the oral Polio vaccine are given to children under the age of 5 in countries at risk for wild polio. Two Drops Jewelry came about as a way to raise awareness and funds for the Polio Eradication efforts. The jewelry incorporates two drops into each piece. Most are upcycled designs from vintage pieces combined with some new parts, others are new pieces that have been altered to incorporate the two drops, each is unique in their design. The pieces are assembled by Rotarians and **100% of funds** go directly to the Polio Plus program at the Rotary Foundation. The pieces range from \$10 to \$30, so each piece will protect 100-300 children from the risk of Polio. Pictures and prices are available on the RC of New Kent's Facebook page.



Dr. Tunji Funsho, chair of Rotary & S Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee

Dr. Tunji Funsho, chair of Rotary s Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee, joins 100 pioneers, artists, leaders, icons, and titans as one of *TIME* s 100 Most Influential People. *TIME* announced its 2020 honorees during a 22 September television broadcast on ABC, recognizing Funsho for his instrumental leadership and work with Rotary members and partners to achieve the eradication of wild polio in the African region.

He is the first Rotary member to receive this honor for work toward eradicating polio. A Rotarian for 35 years, Funsho is a member of the Rotary Club of Lekki, Nigeria, past governor of District 9110, and serves on Rotary s International PolioPlus Committee. Funsho is a cardiologist and a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians of London. He lives in Lagos, Nigeria with his wife Aisha. They have four children; Habeeb, Kike, Abdullahi and Fatima; and five grandchildren.

TIME 100 comprises individuals whose leadership, talent, discoveries, and philanthropy have made a difference in the world. Past honorees include Bono, the Dalai Lama, Bill Gates, Nelson Mandela, Angela Merkel, Oprah Winfrey, and Malala Yousafzai.


♦ I ♦ m honored to be recognized by TIME for my part in ensuring that no child in Africa will ever again be paralyzed by wild polio, a disease that once disabled 75,000 African children every single year, ♦ said Funsho. ♦ Eradicating the wild poliovirus in Africa was a team effort that required cooperation and dedication of governments, partners, Rotary members, hundreds of thousands of health workers, and countless parents who chose to have their children vaccinated against polio. ♦

As the chair of Rotary s Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee, since 2013 Funsho has led PolioPlus efforts in the country, building upon the work of his predecessors. He has worked alongside Rotarians in Nigeria to raise awareness about the importance of polio immunization, encouraged governments and public figures to support polio eradication, and served as a vocal leader and advocate for Rotary and its fight to end polio. He works closely with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative partner organizations: the World Health Organization (WHO), UNICEF, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.

As a member of Nigeria so Presidential Task Force on Polio, he has coordinated immunizations and advocacy campaigns with the Minister of State for Health and the Inter-Agency Coordination Committee for Polio Eradication. He has also worked closely with the Sir Emeka Offor Foundation, the Dangote Foundation, the Traditional Leaders Council and the Federation of Muslim Womens Association of Nigeria.

In August 2019, Nigeria reached three years without a case of wild poliovirus. Nigeria s progress, led by Rotary, its partners and local and national governments, was the result of decades of sustained efforts, including domestic and international financing, the commitment of hundreds of thousands of health workers, and innovative strategies to immunize children who previously couldn to be reached due to insecurity in the country s northern states. On 25 August, the African region was certified wild polio-free. This historic announcement means that five of the WHO s six regions, representing more than 90 percent of the world s population, are now free of the wild poliovirus. The virus is still endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

With Africa s milestone, Rotary and its partners took a major step forward toward their goal of global eradication. Funsho told TIME magazine of the achievement: The polio eradication program in Nigeria has gone through some difficult times, but I never once doubted that this day would come. Any time that we ve experienced a setback, Rotary and our partners have been able to find solutions and develop strategies for reaching vulnerable children. He added: One thing I know for certain is if Nigeria could eliminate the wild poliovirus, any country can eliminate it.





John Nanni and His Ironies

John Nanni is known or known about by most Rotarians. We hear him speak or perform from his wheelchair and we make assumptions about his story. He is such an advocate for End Polio Now, we don took much further to learn of some of the happier and the more delightful ironies here encountered in his happy life.

So, who is the John Nanni we know now? He and his wife, Christine, live in Middletown, Delaware. John is a member of the Middletown-Odessa-Townsend Rotary club in District 7630 having been a Rotarian since 2010. He is already a Rotary Leadership Institute graduate. John has been the PolioPlus Chair for District 7630 since 2010 and has given over 200 PolioPlus talks. He has two, now grown, adopted children, Allison and Adam. Allison is an Intensive Care Nurse in Baltimore and Adam owns a cleaning business in Cherry Hill, New Jersey. John has a degree in Hotel Restaurant Management.

A Few Months Too Early:

Perhaps the first irony in John s fabulous life is that he was born and raised in Binghamton, New York. What is ironic about that you might ask? Binghamton was one of the pilot-test sites for the Salk polio vaccine. John describes himself as a Polio Survivor of Class 1953. He was diagnosed with Polio just months before the distribution of the Polio vaccine. He received excellent care a Great Aunt and mom who had learned the massage and physical therapy developed by Sister Kenny an Australian nurse. He was paralyzed from the neck down for six months but was walking a year later. He played sports in high school and life carried on until age 40 when he felt the renewal of muscle weakness and pain of Post- Polio Syndrome. Muscles that worked so hard to compensate for the muscles damaged in the acute polio period start wearing out. According to John, he uses the wheelchair as a way to conserve to preserve the muscle strength he has.

John Discovers He s a Tenor:

Another happier irony in John s life. He is a tenor. What is so ironic about that? He started singing in a church choir when he was about 40. With his deep baritone speaking voice, you guessed it, he was thought to be a baritone singing voice as well. He decided to take some opera singing classes and learned that he has a tenor, not a baritone, voice. John and Christine are professional singers who perform as the Rhapsody in 2 Cabaret Act, www.rhapsodyin2.com.

As part of his professional life, John has been active in the nonprofit music organizations, as well as Rotary. He believes being a professional performer brings benefits to Rotary and Rotary brings benefits to his and Christine so professional career.

John and Christine s Marriage Thanks to a Music Camp:

Well, that might be hyperbole, but they did meet at a music camp which they attended each year. The camp offered a one-week free stay to any couple who met at the camp and married. Guess what? John and Christine were able to take advantage of that one-week free the next year!

More About the John We Know:

We know about John so commitment to a polio free word. Though unable to personally participate in National Immunization Days in India, Africa, and other places, he nonetheless participated in other ways to celebrate India Polio Free and Africa Polio Free announcements. In fact, in the years 2015, 2016, and 2017 he completed 800 plus volunteer hours annually. He is also now a platelet donor after a triple bypass surgery and has donated over 316 donations of platelets.

Some Things You May Not Know About John:


He is an avid New York Yankees Fan and is a 4-seat season ticket holder in the infamous Bleacher Creature Section of Yankee Stadium. John collects Rotary Pins (no surprise) and baseball pins and has an extensive collection in both categories. He also collects Donald Duck memorabilia. He has been a Donald Duck fan since the age of 7 when he learned how to talk like Donald Duck, nearly driving his dad nutty at times.

What is Ahead for John?

He will continue his collecting, professional singing, and attending Yankee s games. He will also continue to put a face on Post-Polio Syndrome and the accompanying polio fatigue; along with working hard to help Rotary End Polio Now so that no kid ever suffers again with this horrible disease. These are his most immediate Rotary goals. John is an organizer, performer, and participant in the World Polio Day Virtual Telethon on October 24, 2020.
