THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM: BILL CAWLEY

Bill has lived most of his life in Virginia, graduating from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University in 1969 (B.A. Political Science). He later earned his master's degree from Old Dominion University. Bill served for 35 years in the public school setting—retiring in 2004—first as a teacher of Advanced Placement government students and later as elementary school principal. During his teaching years, Bill was head coach of the wrestling and cross-country teams at Kecoughtan High School in Hampton, VA.

Bill was known for his leadership in the integration of technology into the classroom. For his efforts, one of Bill's schools was named an Apple Distinguished School—one of only 100 K-12 public and private schools in North America and Mexico so named. The school was also recognized as the Virginia Elementary School Technology Program of the Year by the International Technology Education Association. Bill co-founded the Children's Engineering Convention which provides elementary teachers with skills necessary to teach technological awareness to children in grades kindergarten through five. He was also named the Administrator of the Year by the Consortium for Interactive Instruction.

After retiring from the school system, Bill worked for several years for the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation. In 2008, Bill and his wife PDG Juanita opened an antiques business in West Point. Recently, the store has been rebranded as The Exchange on Main offering rare and unusual books, specialty foods, home décor and coastal casual wear.

Bill joined the Rotary Club of West Point in 2007, serving as club president in 2010-2011. He served as the Middle Peninsula Area Foundation Advisor during the 2011-2012 Rotary year and assistant governor for the next two years. He has served as the chair of the District 7610 strategic planning committee and District 7610 Trainer. He now is a member and serves as club secretary for the Rotary eClub for Global Peacebuilders.

Bill is a Major Donor, Bequest Society member, a Benefactor, multiple Paul Harris Fellow, and a Paul Harris Society member. He is a Sustaining member and a Triple Crown recipient. He is a RLI graduate (all three levels). When not involved in Rotary projects, Bill and PDG Juanita enjoy their restored circa 1884 Victorian home and garden in West Point and their river cottage in Locust Hill, VA.

In addition to our guest speaker, Joshua Cole, our Virginia House Delegate, will attend to become a Paul Harris Fellow in appreciation of the work he did on getting the Governor to sign the proclamation declaring November 24th World Polio Day in Virginia.
