October 13 Meeting – Club Assembly

President Jake presided. He talked about the Thursday, October 21 performance of "Bright Star" at Riverside. The two Rotary clubs in Stafford have reserved 42 tickets (24 from Stafford and 18 from North Stafford)) for Rotarians and friends. It will be a great evening. This is also a way to show our gratitude to Riverside for their providing entertainment at Via Colori.

PDG Sandy announced that she arranged for the Stafford Board of Supervisors to make a formal declaration on October 19 proclaiming October 24 World Polio Day in Stafford. Several members of the club will attend the BOS meeting. Even better, Governor Northam will sign a statewide declaration of World Polio Day in Virginia. After she made this announcement PDG George talked about his experiences volunteering with many other Rotarians at National Immunization Days in India, Nigeria and Pakistan. Nelda reminded the younger club members what a sourge polio was in this country as recently as the 1950s.

In her report of our club's giving to the Rotary Foundation this year to date, PDG Sandy unhappily announced that we have only given \$2,800 to the annual fund (only 19% of our goal for the year.) Because of the loss of membership the number of Paul Harris Society members has dropped to 10 from 15. Our club needs to return to a 100% sustaining club. It only costs 28 cents per day to be a sustaing member (or \$2.80 to be a Paul Harris Society member).

President Jake saluted our wonderful Via Collori team leaders: Molly, Leigh Ann, Mike, Maria, Jamie, and Jack – and everyone else who helped! They did a great job, successfully presenting a family-friendly community art event.

Jake reminded us that our Rotary International President Shekhar Mehta has challenged all Rotarians to think bigger this year and to "grow more and do more". Read President Mehta's monthy message at https://my.rotary.org/en/news-media/office-president/presidential-message.

- Contact your <u>district community service chair</u>, who can advise you about developing local projects to address your community's needs. The service chair can also connect you to local organizations, district committees, and other Rotary groups that focus on service.

You can increase your impact by working with one of Rotary's service and project partners:

- <u>Ashoka</u> helps find creative solutions to social problems.
- Habitat for Humanity International provides safe and affordable shelter to families in need.
- The <u>Peace Corps</u> promotes peace and community development.
- <u>ShelterBox</u> provides disaster relief such as emergency shelter and aid to families.
