Fellow Rotarians,

DIVERSITY (the 3rd of my 5 Points of Enduring Light)

Fourth, this month my senior advisor of organizational strategy, myself, and with the support of Zone Assistant Rotary Coordinator PDG Janet Brown, we will begin the outreach to organizations that represent diverse segments of the population in our communities to collaborate with and find ways to increase diversity among our membership. There will be opportunities to have the organizations come and speak to your clubs and work together on community based projects.

VISIBILITY (the 4th of my 5 Points of Enduring Light)

Fifth, my public image chair just released a video (posted on the district website and Facebook) of me speaking about my vision for district 7610, he is starting an Instagram account to connect with younger members of our community, and is sharing inspirational and useful information about Rotary's impact in the world.

INNOVATION (the 5th of my 5 Points of Enduring Light)

Sixth, my district conference team is working hard to develop a one-of-a-kind conference that will be fun and informative and will bring together Rotarians, NOVA businesses, and other community based organizations. This will be a conference where we will be hearing from, speaking directly to, and working with our brothers and sisters outside of Rotary. We will be bringing the community to the conference and learning more on how Rotary 7610 can connect to the passions of future members.

Additionally, my administration continues to promote innovation when it comes to club operations, membership, and community engagement. Clubs like Great Falls that is using its club to be the defacto chamber of commerce for their area. - ✓ Have the club TRF Chair and/or PE attend TRF Seminar in September 2019


