## The Speed of Change

## **Literacy Rotary Action Group - Remember Niger**



What a webinar, on July 16th, by the Literacy RotaryAction Group. It featured Lidia Oxi and Ted Ning of MAIA Impact in Guatemala, Anand Seth (Rotarian from Bethesda) on Edu Girls in India and Nepal, Razia Jan of Razia's Ray of Hope in Afghanistan and Kara VanderKamp and Raymond Panczyk (Rotarian from Montgomery Village) of Remember Niger. Our foundation has given two small grants to that organization.

The speakers emphasized the sad state of girls' education in most developing countries and the immense benefits of helping girls through secondary school. One point was that, in at least one project, the first thing girls are taught is **to write their fathers' last names**. The girls demonstrate at home, and their fathers, many illiterate, instantly change their attitudes toward educating girls.

Kara, of **Remember Niger**, said that just 2% of the girls in that country attend high school, and the average marriage age is 15. Schools sponsored by the project are changing that dramatically. Lidia, of **MAIA Impact**, said their school had a retention rate of 96%, in rural indigenous Guatemala. All agreed that **education wa**s the key to better lives, stronger families and more viable countries.

## Our Club in the Food Bank

On July 16th, it was our club's turn in the Gaithersburg Help Foodbank. Three or four people can do the job. We had five, and more were "on deck" in case we needed them. Hooray for Rotary! Thirteen families - perhaps 50 people in total - came for packaged

## Haiti - Water for Life



July 14th, **John Kolm and Kenric Brooks**, Rockville Rotary Club, briefing on a valuable project.

**They made it visual.** They showed how the water supply for a small city in Haiti, including a school built with help from Rotary, has run out. Water is vital for cleaning, food production and sanitation. Kids are walking miles to carry water, often missing

school to do it. All that is needed is an artesian well, which, in Haiti, will cost just \$10,000. Twenty percent of that is in the bank - just eighty percent to go.


John said a few words in German and Chinese and then showed a dramatic video of **the earthquake in 2010.** It was the first in generations, and people didn't know what to do. There were huge destruction and loss of life. Just six months later, John and a few companions traveled to the **hard-hit town** of Leogane and decided to replace a school that had been destroyed. Leogane is beautiful, he said, but was the dengue fever and malaria capital of the world.


**A new school** was built in record time for just \$15,000. It opened with 100 children, and there are now 200, many of whom were orphaned by the earthquake. They receive uniforms, shoes and one meal a day and do not pay tuition. There are adult literacy classes in the evenings.

At happy dollar time, Bob announced interviews for the Hanson Scholarship and a goal for CART of \$40 per member during the Rotary year. Note: A winner of the scholarship has since been selected. Sara donated \$30 and Ken \$25. There were other happy dollars for the club and our speakers. Richie moved, and Ken seconded, that all the money collected - \$86 - be given to the Haiti Water Project. Every bit helps. Note: Other funds have since been earmarked for that project.
