A Golden Opportunity for Rotary

Thousands of Rotary clubs are meeting virtually. This lets them have guests, and guest speakers, from **anywhere in the world.**

But, not everyone is interested in, for example, local affairs of Gaithersburg. The answer might be for a club to adopt a specific Cause - one that is relevant to its community **and the world**, such as clean water or Alzheimer's disease. This cause-based club could draw interested people from anywhere - could have scores of virtual members. **There are clubs like that.** They are not limited to a single issue, but they specialize in it.

Strong, dynamic Rotary clubs should not try to fix what isn't broken, but weaker clubs should seriously consider their *raison d'etre* and see if they need to adopt a laser-like focus on a single cause or problem.

What to look out for? He said: - Phishing - Ransomware and malware - Insider threats and other threats

Phishing is increasing fast, he said. It accounts for 90% of breaches in organizations and about \$115 billion per year in losses. He described the types ("spearphishing, etc.) and several countermeasures, starting with employee training and retraining.

Ransomware and malware are huge also, and not just for large organizations. In most cases, he said, the victim has to pay up or destroy his computers and use backup data to start again. About 15% of the victims pay. Normal antivirus software, he said, does not give enough protection.

Sajan discussed insider and other threats and then went into **risk management.** The idea is that, the more an organization has at risk, the more it has to spend on cybersecurity. He started with an example: How great is your risk from a bald car tire? Risky, of course, but what if the tire is not on a car but dangling on a rope? Not much risk? But, what if that rope swing goes over a stream? It can be hard to calculate the risk, but it is very important.

The **summary** was, if you're in a large organization, the question is not **if** you'll be attacked, but **when**. It is vitally important to analyze the risk and **get protected!**
