The district Polio Plus Committee will hold a virtual luncheon on Saturday, October 23rd, and every Rotarian in the district will be invited. The event is free, but the committee is asking each participant to donate at least \$45. This will be recorded as contributions from each club to Polio Plus. Go to Rotary7620.org, then About, then Calendar, then October 25th, then More, then Polio lunch and, finally, Register. There are several ways to pay.

While in the calendar, check out "Pints for Polio" in Frederick on October 24th. Now, that is a FUN way to contribute.

Also, the committee is asking each club to hold its own Polio Plus fund-raiser. In our October 19th luncheon, we will have a virtual speaker (a polio survivor) and will dedicate the 50-50 and happy dollars to Polio Plus. Members, please attend and invite guests.

Contributions to Polio Plus will be matched at 50% by Rotary s World Fund and then at 200% by the Gates Foundation. That means that, for example, \$45 will turn into \$202.50 @ enough to vaccinate 202 children.


pleased to have a visitor, Ray Panczyk, from the Montgomery Rotary Club.
