

Large Gathering Wednesday At Invitation Of Easton **Rotary Club**

JOHN NOBLE MADE THE TEMPORARY CHAIRMAN

Committee Of Thirteen Is Nominated And Asked To Act In All Matters

The Rotary Club on Wednesday imitiated a movement to organize a committee to represent Talbot on the occasion of the opening of the Chop-tank River Bridge.

Representatives were present from the County Commissioners, the Mayor and Council of Easton, the Commissioners of Trappe, of St. Michaels, from Cordova, Tilghman and Queen Anne, from the County Chamber of Com-merce, the Legion, the Business Men's

President Philip J. Hopkins was in charge of the meeting and J. Ells Meintzer, chairman of the Community Service Committee of the Rotary Club explained the reason for the meeting. President Hopkins was careful to explain that the Rotary Club was not sponoring the movement, but simply was, as Rotary always does, initiates the movement and then steps out of the victure in so far as taking credit. the picture in so far as taking credit or charge of it. He further promised the full cooperation of the Club in the plans that shall be developed.

Upon request John Noble started the discussion, followed by Mayor Wrightson and Ralph Sullivan and G. Elbert Marshall. Mr. Noble was of the opin-ion that Talbot was going to greatly benefit from the traffic of this bridge and he thought it was Easton's job to make itself more attractive, to be more make itself more attractive, to be more friendly and to be more helpful. Mayor Wrightson said that Easton's contribution as to better traffic lanes through the town was a problem that was fully discussed by the Council and himself and that the thought now was to see just now the new traffic adjusted itself and then take steps to improve if necessary. He told of the suggestions to connect Aurora street to Transpare and nect Aurora street to Trappe road and also to extend North Harrison Street out to the main state road. He assured the meeting that the town authorities were awake to he traffic needs.

Mr. Sullivan advanced the idea that the present road from Trappe to Easton is insufficient to care for the traffic it will have to endure and that steps should be taken to widen this road, which though was given united approval.

Mr. Hopkins asked for nominations for a standing committee to represent Talbot in the Bridge opening ceremony and also to advise as to traffic needs. The committee named is:
