DG David's Message

We all remember how it felt: the captains were selected, and they began to choose their teams. It was always a mystery to me as to how the captains were selected. Did the coach/teacher choose them because they were �cool�? Were they particularly savvy in team selection? Maybe they were just popular. I do remember that it was not because they were the nicest or fairest or even friendliest.

So how do we pick our leaders and our members? In Rotary, everyone can have a role. Anyone with a heart for service can contribute. It is our responsibility as the Team Captains to choose wisely, but it is equally important for us to look beyond the surface and see in a person the very qualities that make a true servant to humanity. Forget about politics, or race, or religion, or sexual orientation, or socio-economic class. These are not qualities that you can rely on to tell you whether someone will be a good Rotarian. We only need find those with good hearts and find them a role. That is all.

In terms of how to be a better Rotarian, a better person, and a better leader, I recommend the following attributes to recruit new team members.

- Learn what implicit bias means and how it manifests. It is not anyone s fault that you and I have implicit bias. It is a product of growing up in a culture. We just have it. All of us have it and that is why it is so easy to point fingers and say, Well, you do such and such too! Learn what it means to have implicit bias and learn to identify it around you without being critical.
- Search your own heart and mind. Today s world does not allow us enough quiet time to think and reflect. Think about how you really feel towards others who are different. Be totally honest with yourself s after all, you can keep it a secret if you don t like the answers.
- Make a plan to change your world to be a better place. Do not assume you are too old to change. All of us are growing a changing each day.
- Make a commitment to call out unfairness when you see it, but don to be mean. You can be gentle and kind in your rebuke of unfairness. There is
 no need to shout, curse, or pitch a fit. You only need to identify the problem and ask the offender to consider their actions and how they could be
 different.

Rotary should be a safe place for anyone with a heart for service. We can be more inclusive. We can expand our reach and increase our impact. As Rotarians who follow the 4-way Test, we should not only be mindful of how we pick our teams, but we must lead that team in a way that embraces differences. Together, we will open opportunities for service and do good in the World!




Most of us have social media accounts that we use to promote Rotary. In our network are Rotary friends, but also family, friends, and colleagues outside of Rotary. This is all very good.

Many of our profile banners include a stamp that says �Proud Member� or �End Polio Now� along with our mark of excellence, the Rotary logo. We have photos of club events we attended (from the time when we could attend events in person). Our posts go to both members and those outside the Rotary family.

What could be wrong with that?

Unfortunately, on more occasions than I delike to admit, I have seen posts come across my smartphone or laptop from a member who has resigned from their club and is airing a list of dirty laundry about their club in the form of gripes and complaints. They are right and their erstwhile club is in the wrong. They chose this forum to wage battle with their club president, district governor, or Rotary International leadership.

In all of these examples, our brand, and the public s understanding of who we are, is tarnished.

Personally, I ve never been a big fan of people who decide to take their ball and go home, tearing down an organization behind them on their way out. That is just ego.

A similar problem occurs when we use our social media accounts, the same ones with all of our Rotary branding on it, to share our deep-seated political views on divisive subjects. These posts are followed by endless comments which all too often spiral into something downright ugly.

Rotary is supposed to be apolitical. But to both our Rotary friends and those on the outside, that line is blurred as they see these posts and the ensuing comment



A message from General Secretary John Hewko

We all know that the coronavirus pandemic is still raging in many parts of the world, and extensive public health measures and travel restrictions are in place.

As an organization that is at the forefront of eradicating polio and fighting other preventable diseases, we have clear responsibilities in mitigating the threat of COVID-19

Out of an abundance of caution � and in keeping with our commitment to protect the health of our members, our employees, and our families � the RI Board of Directors decided not to fund any expenses (travel or otherwise) for in-person meetings for Rotary leaders for the rest of this Rotary year, other than for the president, president-elect, and trustee chair. This decision applies to directors, trustees, regional leaders, district governors, assistant governors, and other leaders. The Board also agreed to conduct all of its meetings and RI committee meetings virtually for the rest of the year; and we will also be holding the 2021 RI Convention virtually

I know this news will be disappointing to many of you. However, the board felt that we needed to adopt a uniform and clear policy.

As a humanitarian organization we must act responsibly to protect our members and the communities we serve, and the risks of the pandemic are still real and widespread. The Board advises regional leaders, district governors, club presidents and others to hold meetings virtually through the end of the Rotary year.

This is a rapidly evolving public health crisis, and I om sure that you law have many questions about the RI Board decision, so please consult the COVID-19 webpage on Rotary.org for further information or contact your RI staff liaison.

We all have an important role to play in the months ahead as we continue to do all we can to overcome COVID-19.

I want to thank you all for your Rotary service, and I look forward to the day when we can gather safely again in person.
