The City of Sulphur courtroom has a makeshift donation drop-off where food and water is currently being stored from a an 18-wheeler full of donated items from North Carolina.

♦ Saturday morning about 9 o clock I was sitting there and thinking about what can I do? I feel like the lord laid it on my heart. What can I do to help, ♦ said Tammy Mosteller. ♦ I ♦ ve got family down here and these are wonderful people. ♦

Mosteller, who used to live in Sulphur, wanted to help her community after the storm.

She got together with District 7670 Rotarians in Western North Carolina and her church.

She says the word quickly got out, within four hours, we already had donations rolling in.

Cases of water, chainsaws, non-perishable foods, and more were donated.

The company her husband works for, Brooks-DeHart Furniture Xpress, donated the 18-wheeler to transport it 900 miles to Sulphur.

From her time here, Mosteller says she knows how much this community cares for one another, especially after something as catastrophic as a hurricane.

From there, the donated items will be taken to other distribution centers across the city.

My Rotary story started in 1982 when I was chosen as Pisgah High School so Rotary Club Student of the Month by my principal. I went to a Rotary meeting for the recognition and ate lunch with a Rotarian who was an accountant. After graduation, I needed a part-time job while I attended Haywood Community College. I remembered the Rotary Club meeting and the accountant. I walked into his office, reintroduced myself and asked if he had any positions available. He remembered me, said his assistant had resigned to go to college and asked if I could I start on Monday! I worked Tom Wooten for three years before moving on to full time employment. After a while, that business moved to another county, and I decided to stay

home and be full time wife and mother.

In 1990, my husband and I went to the bank to apply for a loan to build a house. We barely missed qualifying for the loan because of income. The loan officer asked me if I would consider a part-time position. She mentioned that the United Way had an opening and encouraged me to apply. I got the job and was able to qualify for the loan. People retired and I moved up until I became the Executive Director of the organization in 2003. That same loan officer, Pat Owen, was serving on the United Way Board of Directors and was also a Rotarian. She asked me to attend a Rotary meeting with her and then sponsored me as a member.

Eventually, I was asked to serve as secretary, then my high school principal, Bill Upton,

asked me to consider being president after him. It was such an honor to accept my diploma and a president s gavel from him. I served as president in 2014-15 and 2015-16 and now in 2020-21.

Tour D'Apple A Huge Success

Unlike so many canceled events, the 8th Annual Tour d�Apple sponsored by Four Seasons Rotary Club took off on Labor Day, September 7, 2020, with �rolling starts� from 7-10 a.m. from Blue Ridge Community College (BRCC) in Flat Rock, NC. Participation was limited to 350 cyclists who rode from 25-100 miles on one of four scenic routes around the apple orchards and beautiful mountains of Henderson County.



The "contactless" event included drive-through packet pickups the day before and "to-go" meals from Chick-Fil-A for the post-ride meal. Hand sanitizing stations were at the hub at BRCC and each rest stop, and each participant and volunteer was given a complimentary Tour "buff" as part of their "swag bag."

Participants donated more than \$900 before the event began above and beyond their registration

fees, and that money will be used to purchase winter coats for children in Henderson County through Interfaith Assistance Ministry (IAM), according to club president Chris Johnson. Canned food donations were also collected at the event to go to IAM, as well as a recycle station for aluminum cans to raise money for <u>CART (Coins for Alzheimer's Research Trust)</u>.

The event was sponsored by <u>Hunter Automotive</u> <u>Group</u> and organized by <u>Idaph Events</u>, with support from nearly a hundred volunteers. Participants came from nearly every Southern state and some even rode "virtually" from as far away as Ohio, recording their time online.



Funds raised from this year's event will go to support Four Seasons Rotary service projects, including scholarships at BRCC, Special Needs Sports in WNC, and upgrades to a Four Seasons Rotary Park in downtown Hendersonville.

New RotarACT Community Club of Highlands Receives Grant to Provide Financial Relief and Remove Invasive Species

A grant from the Mountaintop Rotary Club of Highlands and matching grant funds from Rotary district 7670 will enable the new Rotar *ACT* Club of Highlands to launch its first project. The project has the goal to remove non-native



invasive plant species in and around the town of Highlands, community roadways, and local non-profit owned properties. In addition to the benefits to our shared landscape, the primary motivation of this plan is to provide financial relief to working people of the community who have been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic by employing them as workers in the project. The Rotar *ACT* Club of Highlands is also partnering the Highlands-Cashiers Land Trust, the Highlands Biological Station, the Women's Initiative at the International Friendship Center of Highlands, The Mountain Retreat and Learning Center, The Church of the Incarnation, the Peggy Crosby Center and the Highlands Plateau Greenway to host this action day.
