Oct 21 - Dale Folwell - NC State Controller "State of the State"

Treasurer Folwell will discuss his insights into the economy, the vitality of our towns and counties and the businesses that help them to flourish. He will discuss the continuing record-setting growth of the state pension plans, which recently hit an all-time high of \$121.9 billion; the State Health Plan, which serves 750,000 members and has incurred many tens of millions of dollars in unreimbursed COVID costs; or the Unclaimed Property Division, which has been floating new ways to return \$919 million in safekeeping to its rightful owners.

Treasurer Dale R. Folwell, CPA was sworn in as State Treasurer of North Carolina in January 2017. As the keeper of the public purse, Treasurer Folwell is responsible for the state pension

fund and state health plan. In 2021 the state s coveted AAA bond rating was reaffirmed by every major rating agency, making NC one of only 13 states in the country to hold that distinction. Folwell was first elected to public office as a member of the Winston-Salem/Forsyth County Board of Education. He brought his problem-solving skills to the NC General Assembly in 2004, serving four terms in the House of Representatives including one term as Speaker Pro Tempore. Treasurer Folwell began his career as a blue-collar worker and became a Certified Public Accountant and investment advisor after earning Bachelor s and Master s degrees in accounting from UNC-Greensboro. Married for more than 30 years, he and his wife Synthia have three children and live in Winston-Salem.

Club invoices covering Dues, Foundation Contributions, Meals, and Maggianos Room Service Charge have recently been sent to members. Please check for accuracy and let Howie Fogel know if there are any questions. Timely payments would be greatly appreciated so that the Club can meet its financial obligations.

The board recently considered the issue of charging for meals now that we are back to meeting at the restaurant. At this point the club has paid over \$1500 for meals plus use

of the room.

Considering the unusual circumstances, what would be more fair for all?

Historically, active members (we currently have 9) paid for all meals offered in a quarter and paid in advance. Those who had achieved the status of R85 (15 members currently)

paid for the number of meals they actually consumed, and invoiced in the quarter after.



This decision was made with all 10 board members voting in the affirmative. So, going forward (at least during pandemic, hybrid meeting, time) we will be following this procedures:

- 1. We did not invoice active members last quarter for this quarter's hybrid meetings. So, we will be invoicing all members after this quarter (October) for meals eaten at \$17/meal. The actual meal charge is \$17 per person. Additionally, the club currently pays \$50 event fee every time we meet at the restaurant. Since having the event benefits everybody in the club, whether they choose to attend in person or not, we decided that it would be fair to spread that cost among the entire membership.
- 2. Members who took a meal in the current quarter (July-September) will be charged in October for meals actually eaten at a rate of \$17/person.
- 3. Every member will be charged a pro-rated amount for the event fee (renting the room). The charge will depend on the number of members (currently 24), the number of times we meet at the restaurant (currently planned to be 11), and the event fee (currently \$50). So, we estimate that charge to be about \$23 per member.
- 4. Beginning in October, the meal charge of \$17 will be accepted at the door. Alan will be happy to accept your payment.
- 5. Active members will be relieved of the obligation to pay for meals they do not consume.

World Polio Day - October 24, 2021



October 24, 2021, is designated as World Polio Day As of September 2, they are still reporting two (2) total cases one (1) each in Afghanistan and Pakistan. Rotary through the WHO has received assurances that Polio Eradication efforts will continue to be allowed in Afghanistan by the Taliban.

On Polio support in District 7680, Gastonia is leading the way with \$5,050 followed by Charlotte at \$3,333 and Lake Norman Huntersville at \$1,020 with a District total of \$10,978. A large number of clubs have \$0 support which I

hope will change in the coming months. Let **\$** s make sure every club and member give something to Rotary **\$** s longstanding program and we reach our goal of \$102,240.

CPR Food Drive - 40 Days, 4 Bins, and 400 Cans

The Second Harvest Food & Fund Drive Sept. 15 - Oct. 30 continues, in partnership with the Rotary District 7680 and the Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina, which serves our area. Food insecurity is a constant problem but has only increased with the pandemic and rising food prices. To celebrate Second Harvest Food Bank's 40th anniversary, our goals are: 40 days to fill 4 bins with 400 cans of food and raise \$400 online. As of this week, we are at 66% of the funds goal, with \$262 raised and have filled almost 1 Bin! East Meck's Interact Club will be supporting the effort starting this week.
