Notes from our President

We had a wonderful program last week and it was one of our better-attended ones as well. David Hodgkins shared the news of his and Donna's recent trip to Peru for the dedication of the newly-built JHD Community Center, named in loving memory of their daughter Jessica. It will be a true community resource for the people of Alto Cayma and with its bright purple color, it can be seen for miles around. David also shared with us the trek he and Donna undertook to Machu Picchu, an adventure by any measure, and some of the terrain that they had to traverse. It was truly an engaging presentation and a reminder of the commitment our Club has made to this area over the course of many years.

During David's presentation, it became apparent that he has established a strong network of friends and associates in Alto Cayma. It is vital for all of us to have strong networks, people we like to associate with and share ideas with and people we can depend on for help in times of need. Rotary is an excellent networking opportunity but like any network, it needs refreshing periodically.

This is where we need your help. Have you thought about your networks other than Rotary and how you might be able to help us grow our membership by tapping into those networks? Do you recall what one of the most common answers is to the question, "Why did you become a Rotarian?" It's because someone asked that person, likely someone within their network.

We really don't know if someone will accept an invitation to visit our Club to see what we're all about until we take the time to ask. That is the beginning of the Road to Rotary and it's an easy one to tap into. I don't say all of this to give myself a pat on the back but just to illustrate that we have opportunities *through our networks* to get people involved with Rotary. I hope you consider doing this and help us to grow OUR network and grow our club.

Lynna's application is on file in DACdb but please consider this the first week of the two-week notice to members we require for your review and input.

Patricia Shafer is Executive Director of NewGen Peacebuilders, Senior Fellow for Peace Education at the Alliance for Peacebuilding, an IEP Global Peace Index Ambassador, and a Rotary Peace Fellow. She is also a Rotarian.

NewGen Peacebuilders was officially founded in 2014 in Charlotte. The program has been delivered or is in the

program has been delivered or is in the pipeline in six state in the US, as well as countries including Argentina,


Lebanon, Serbia, Ethiopia and South Sudan. High school students who have become certified NewGen Peacebuilders in Charlotte have described their impact in ways that resulted in more than \$250,000 in higher education scholarships to date.

Patricia is also Chief Catalyst and Executive Director of US-based international nonprofit Mothering Across Continents, through which school and education projects are managed in several countries in East Africa. Her work in South Sudan was recognized with a nomination for UNESCO Prize for Girls' and Women's Literacy.

Previously, Patricia held senior positions in two global Fortune 500 companies. She holds an MSc in Consulting and Coaching for Change – a joint-venture of Oxford University, UK, and HEC France; an MBA from the Northwestern University Kellogg Graduate School of Management; and

Alto Cayma, Peru

David Hodgkins, Charlotte Dilworth South End Rotary Club



As many of you know, the Dilworth South End Rotary Club has had a long relationship with the village of Alto Cayma, Peru. While my wife Donna and I were in Alto Cayma, in 2012 on one of our trips, Gloria and Jim Hintz suggested we visit a man named Juan Pablo who had recently had a serious accident and possibly needed some assistance from our nonprofit organization.

Juan Pablo, in his early 40s, had been involved in a serious accident while driving a truck in the mountainous area around Arequipa. He worked in milling agricultural products to produce animal food. The accident resulted in his truck turning over, resulting in both of his legs being crushed. By the time he was able to get medical attention, the legs were beyond repair and had to be amputated.

He could not work and provide for his wife and three children and became very despondent. He had asked for help from family and friends, but to no avail. We were aware that he was contemplating suicide which in his mind would have been better for his family since it would alleviate his wife's responsibility for taking care of him.

Fortunately, he heard about a Dr. Salas in Cuzco, many miles away, who did

prosthetic replacement surgery for those

that could not afford the usual hospital route. Dr. Salas worked thru a Foundation that had enough supporters so that the work could be done for a fraction of the cost. A friend arranged for Dr. Salas to come to Alto Cayma and interview Juan Pablo to determine if he could be served by the program. But again, the cost of this was beyond Juan Pablo's financial reach. Our visit coincided with Dr. Salas' sojourn to his residence, and we were present when Juan Pablo was told that he could be a part of the program.

We were told that it would be about \$8,000.00 US for the entire procedure, including new legs, physical and occupational therapy. The cost was still prohibitive for Juan Pablo and his family. We discussed this as a group and I told Jim that I would refer this to the Dilworth Club as a potential project. While Juan Pablo was ecstatic about this, it was difficult to comprehend who we were and why we wanted to help him.

I presented this at our next Board meeting and it was accepted as a club project. In a matter of a few months, we were able to raise the entire amount necessary for the surgical procedure based on individual donations as well as a donation from Dilworth Charities, our nonprofit organization.



We remained in communication with Juan Pablo through Jim to ensure he knew the status of our fundraising efforts. The money was subsequently sent to Alto Cayma, and the surgery was successful. He went through rehabilitation and training and after some time was able to, once again, become a wage-earner and a productive member of his community.

He now lives in the agricultural area of Peru, La Joya. The coast is about a two hour drive from Alto Cayma. A car, retrofitted so he could drive it with his arms rather than his legs, was donated to him. He shared with us how he is so proud of his life now and how he owes it all to us in Rotary.

It has been six years since he got his new legs and as might be expected, obsolescence has set in. Many parts need replacing; however, Dr. Salas has indicated that he can accomplish this. Juan Pablo has been told that \$4,600.00 US will cover the cost of the enhancements to his prosthetic legs. Unfortunately, Dr. Salas requires the payment upfront and although working, Juan Pablo does not have the capacity to pay for these enhancements.



I am now reaching out to Rotary to determine if we can provide assistance to this man and his family once again. 

What's All the Buzz About Bees?

Rotary Voices, July 2019



Recently, Rotaract clubs throughout Germany were looking for a signature project and decided to concentrate on the environment. After watching a Swiss documentary on bees, "More than honey," one Rotaractor became passionate about focusing our attention on protecting these little superheroes. Did you know, for instance, that wild bees are responsible for pollinating more than 80 percent of our crops and wild plants? We can't survive without them.

Most of the dangers to bees are manmade. Climate change, monotonous agricultural landscapes, and pesticides are just a few of the many reasons why our little yellow friends are dying in everincreasing numbers.

With the project "BeeAlive," German Rotaractors began to support wild bees by building bee hotels, educating people about the threat to the bee population, and sowing wildflower meadows. All German Rotaract clubs participated, starting with the most northern club of Flensburg, which visited a beekeeper with their sponsor Rotary club. The southern-most Rotaract club in Germany, Kempten Allgäu, planted a meadow of more than 32,000 square feet for bees to pollinate.

The Bundessozialaktion (BuSo) project, as it is called in German, is divided into three parts:

<u>Inform</u>

All the Rotaract clubs in Germany worked together to education the population about bee mortality and the associated consequences for the environment, organizing theme days and informational events. They found many opportunities to cooperate with beekeepers' associations and nature conservation associations. Efforts ranged from the Rotaract Club of Berlin organizing an online presentation that was promoted across the country, by Dr. Kaspar Bienefeld, a renowned scientist and professor in the field of insects and bees at the Humboldt University of Berlin, to the Rotaract Club of Rheda Wiedenbrück holding a local fair.

Fundraising

Many of the projects are costly. Therefore, fundraising is an integral part of their efforts. The Rotaract Club of Duisburg-Niederrhein organized a Bee-Pong tournament, raising over \$1,000, and the Rotaract Club of Paderborn hosted a Pub Quiz on the topic of bees. Clubs also got creative by selling homemade products, from beeswax chapsticks by the Bad Wörishofen-Mindelheim Club to bee-hotels (Herne-Wanne Eickel). There are also many organizations that do great work with our fundraising, like the NaBu; the German Nature and Biodiversity Conservation Union, or the local beekeepers associations.

Hands-on

By building bee hotels and diversifying local beds, they made room for wildflowers and created a better environment for insects. Over 100,000 square feet of meadows were planted by clubs in District 1841 and by the Rotaract clubs of Lemgo-Lippe and AC Landshut-Trausnitz. In many of these, Rotaractors, Rotarians, family, and friends joined together.

Building a few thousand hotels, they were able to surpass their goal of 500. The reason is simple. All you need for a hotel is a wooden frame for the outside, hardwood with holes drilled into it, and hollowed out bamboo for the inside. The best part is that you can put up a plaque reading "Made by Rotary/Rotaract" and you have the perfect ambassador for Rotary in your local community.

All in all, they hope to make the world a better place by raising awareness of this important issue and working to solve the problem in local communities. But this is not an issue that can be solved locally. It is a global problem and they need to make a global impact. Join them in our efforts.


