Fayetteville Rotary Club Meeting

Welcome: Club President Stephen McDavid opened this week's Fayetteville Rotary Club (FRC) meeting via Zoom at 1:00 PM, welcoming all to the meeting.

Meeting Prayer and Meal: The meeting invocation was given by President Steve. There was no meal.

Club Program: Ron Gunter introduced Christopher Cauley, Assistant Director of the Fayetteville Economic & Community Development Department. Chris Cauley provided a bit of his background. He was from the area, went to UNC Pembroke, earned a Master in Public Administration degree and been married for 11 years. After graduation and before coming to Fayetteville Chris had several different jobs, the most recent was working for the Charlotte City Manager. Chris sought the position and was hired as Assistant Director of Fayetteville's Economic & Community Development Department because he saw potential in the job and much opportunity for the area. Several years after taking the Assistant Director position the Director left and Chris has been the de facto Director since that time. The Economic & Community Development Department receives much of its funding from the federal government through the Community Development Block Grant Program t3 pus million hat benefits low and medium income communities like Fayetteville, NC. The funds currently equaling some three million dollars a year are used to covering a variety of requirements aimed at reducing slums and blight by supporting the building of homes for low income families and helping train individuals how to keep a home as well as open and run a small business. They provide funds for home revitalization and business improvement and the training of job skills. Chris noted that the department is operating short staffed.
