


Here are several ideas to consider as we start the month of August.

NC State Treasurer, Dale Folwell Speaks to Morehead City Rotary

On Thursday evening, 7/2/20, members of the Rotary Club of Morehead City had the pleasure of hearing from NC State Treasurer, Dale Folwell via a virtual meeting. He focused his comments on the non-political financial facts of the Covid outbreak, the funds received from the federal government to help our state recover and the overall health of NC finances. He put a special emphasis on Eastern NC and the unique challenges that our eastern rural areas face.

Carteret County received \$1.38 mm in financial aid due to the covid pandemic. While this aid is certainly appreciated, this virus has the potential to create and exacerbate economic inequality in different parts of the state and that reality is something that Treasurer Folwell is mindful of in planning distribution of funds.

In addition, Treasurer Folwell spoke about the health and importance of the government employee pension plan. One out of every 10 NC citizens depends on this plan for income. For fiscal year 7/1/19 - 6/30/20 the pension fund had a 4% return on investment. This was achieved despite the tremendous drop in markets because of covid and the volatility that still remains. The fund currently distributes \$543mm/month and over 300k retirees receive these funds monthly. He also touched briefly on the state's progress in addressing the current unfunded liabilities for state employee medical plan.

At the end of Treasurer Folwell's presentation the forum was opened to questions. Most of the concerns voiced were focused on the current lawsuit filed by Lieutenant Governor Dan Forest alleging that the governor may be circumventing the Council of State with his dictates and directives.

Treasurer Folwell rounded out his presentation by recommending the movie, Monument Men and expressing the importance of, and gratitude for, those who are serving others. He encouraged everyone to visit NCCash.com to see if the state is holding money that might be owed to them and NCTreasurer.com for more info about our pension and healthcare systems.
